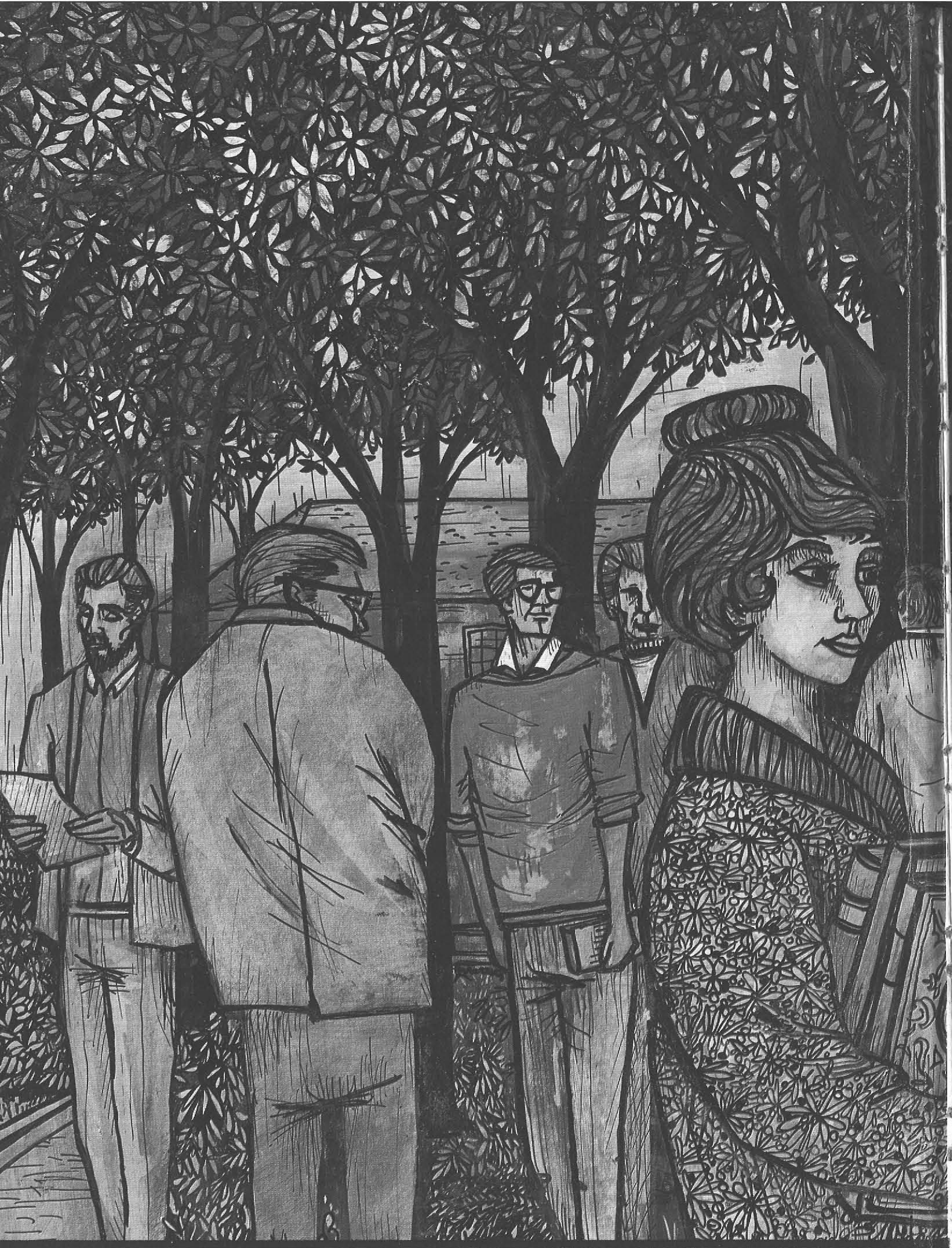


## *Foreword*

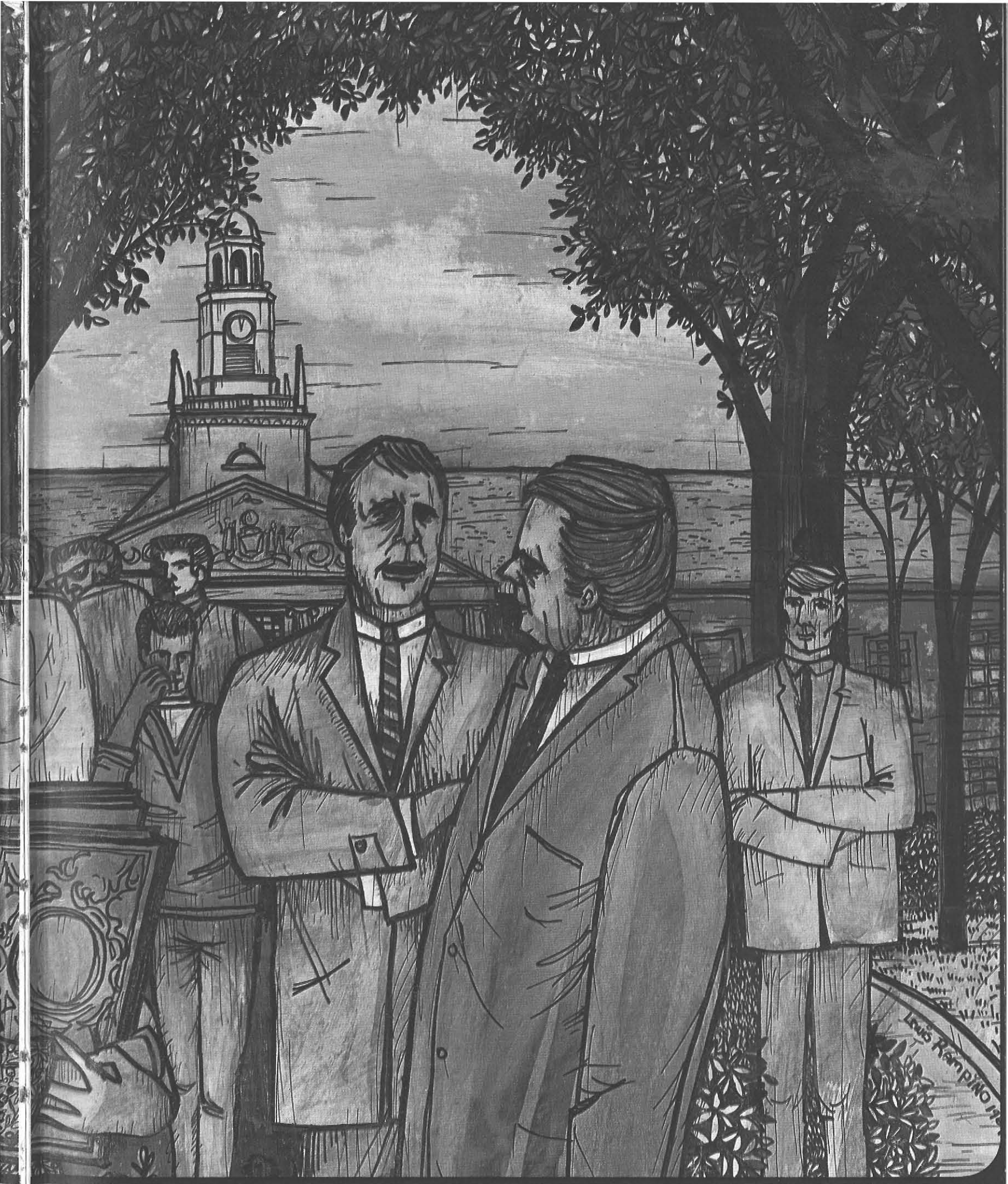
We pause for a moment . . . and think . . . on the meaning of life. We find that many thoughts rush to our minds, each with its own meaning, each with its own value.

## Arts and Sciences

*The Division of Arts and Sciences* is the administrative home for faculty members in the departments of English, Foreign Language, Philosophy, Social Studies, Geography, Science, Mathematics, Music, and Health, Physical Education and Recreation. The division administers the program in liberal arts and provides many of the required courses, and a variety of elective courses, for other divisions of the college. With the education divisions, it also provides programs of study for secondary certification in the areas of English, social studies, science, and mathematics.

*The English Department* offers two degrees, a bachelor of arts degree for students in liberal arts with a major in English and a bachelor of science degree for students majoring in secondary education with certification in English. The department is also responsible for providing all students in the college with basic work in composition, speech, and literature. As the English department reaches out to all the students at some time, it seeks to increase the students' knowledge and skill in the use of language and interpretation of literature. Students preparing to teach secondary school English also receive instruction in methods of teaching English. The department maintains an active interest in student publications and members of the English faculty serve as advisors to the yearbook, the student newspaper, and the literary magazine.

*The Foreign Language Department* is rapidly growing in size and in facilities. Students can elect French, German, Italian, Latin, Russian, or Spanish. These courses not only offer instruction in the language itself but concern also in the culture of the country. New this year is a language laboratory, where a student is able to select the tape or record of his choice, record his response and receive guidance from his professor by analyzing the recording made.

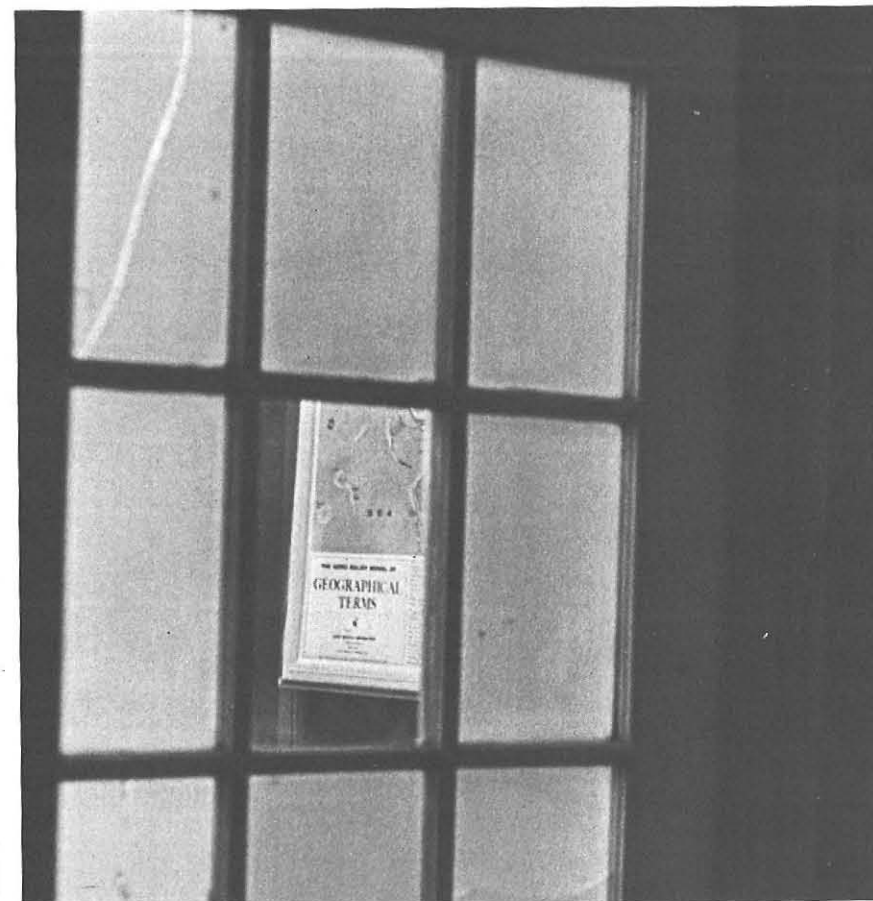
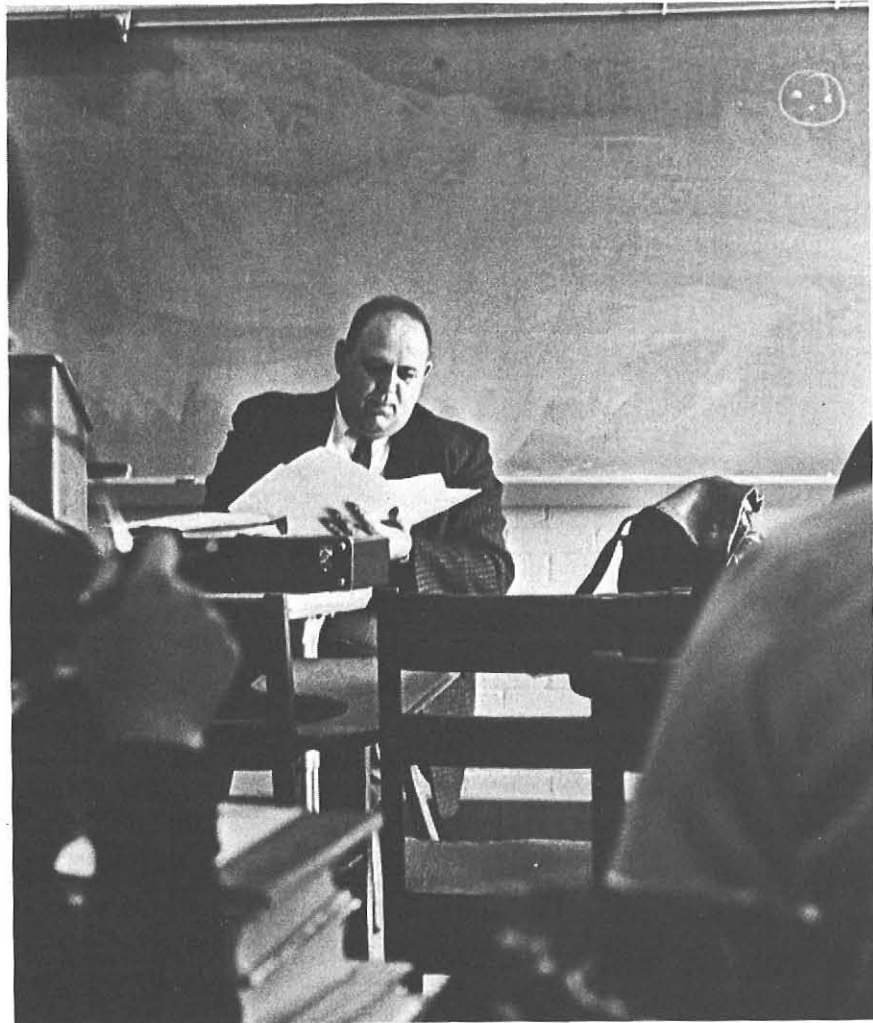
Twenty-four semester hours of a language qualifies a student majoring in elementary education to teach that language in grades kindergarten through nine. The department offers students in all areas the opportunity of electives in areas of personal as well as academic interest.

The *Philosophy Department*, the smallest department in the Division of Arts and Sciences, serves a vital function in the total program. It offers the basic course, *Ways of Knowing*, which is required of all students as an aid in establishing a solid base for their opinions and beliefs. Electives are also available. The new liberal arts program will result in a greater desire for more philosophy courses. No doubt, the college and the students will benefit from the expanded program.

The *Social Studies Department* offers a program leading to certification for teaching social studies in the secondary schools. Graduates receive a bachelor of science degree. Under this program, students take courses on various disciplines of the social studies and may choose electives to broaden a special area of interest. Liberal arts majors also may elect a concentration in one of the several fields. Under new certification requirements, elementary education students may elect a twenty-four hour concentration in this area. Students of all divisions elect the social studies courses needed for a broad academic background. Future plans of the department include the offering of additional courses in anthropology, sociology, economics, political science, and non-western area studies as well as several new courses in American and European history.

One of the future goals of the *Geography Department* is to offer a major in geography. At present geography courses, topical and regional, are part of the elementary, secondary, and exceptional children curricula.

Through the courses offered, this department gives students complete coverage to the field of world geography. In today's world of increased travel and scientific advances, the importance of geography is recognized, for knowledge of its principles leads to an increased understanding of people and their ways of life.



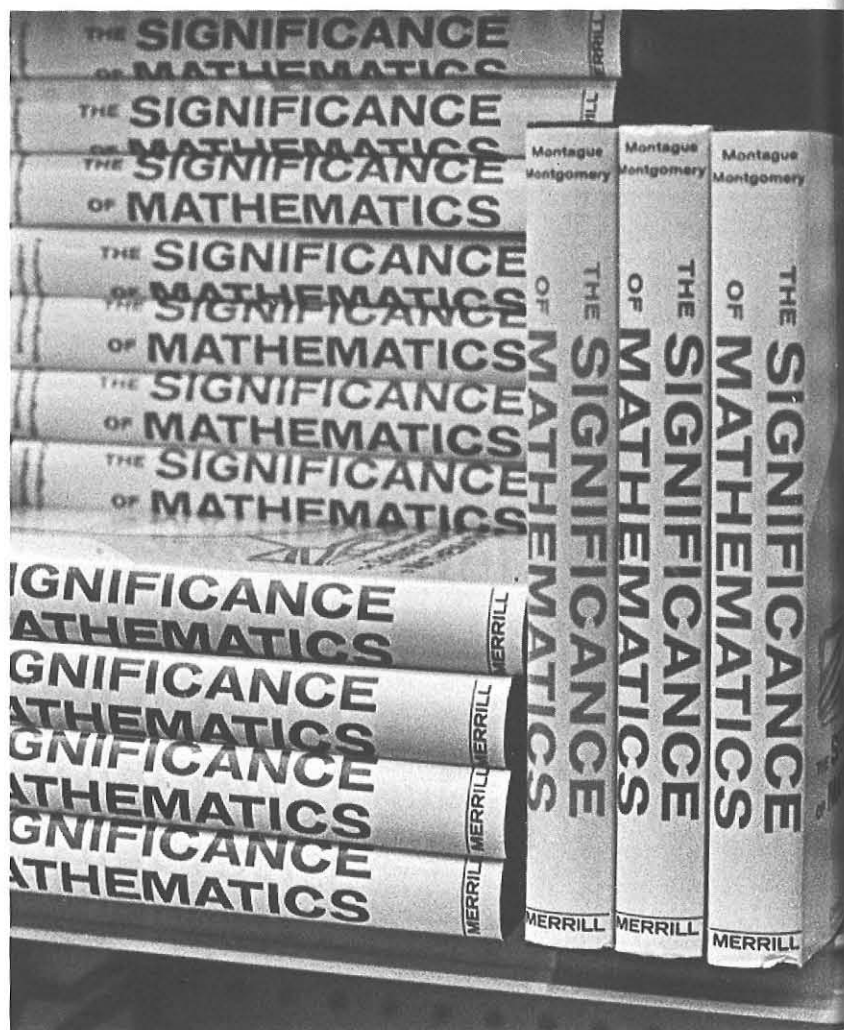


The *Science Department* serves students majoring in biology, chemistry, earth sciences, physics, and general science for teaching in elementary schools. Students majoring in other divisions find courses offered which give them a broader understanding of science concepts and their relations to man's life. One of the plans of this department is to incorporate a program for liberal arts students who wish to major in one of the sciences.

In the summer of 1964 the Science Department will move into a new building near Upton Hall. Plans for a second building are already in progress. The specialized faculty in the Science Department, together with these new facilities, will enable students to be competently prepared as teachers of science.

Twenty-three different undergraduate courses are offered to students of the college by the *Mathematics Department*. Students majoring in secondary mathematics education receive a bachelor of science degree upon graduation.

The new curricula for the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers will bring new advances to the mathematics program. Through its courses can be seen the growing importance of mathematics in modern life. The more intensive mathematics training will provide those courses needed for the adequate preparation of teachers today and for liberal arts majors in mathematics.





The *Music Department* offers a bachelor of arts degree with a major in music and a B.S. degree with a minor in music for students in the elementary education curriculum. The department also offers service courses for all curricula on campus. Students also have twenty-seven music electives from which to choose.

Future planning in the Music Department is for a full curriculum for music majors and music education majors. To do this effectively, it is hoped that a music building might be established. Through a more extensive curriculum, the department will be better able to fulfill its aim of guiding and inspiring students to develop aesthetic appreciation for all areas of music.



Although the *Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Department* does not offer a pre-professional curriculum of its own, it does administer the required courses in physical education and health for the overall college program. The offerings are designed to complement the professional preparation of all students through instruction in the development of physical skills and through instruction in health.

The purpose of the department is to provide a program that is broad enough to meet the interest of all students and comprehensive enough to aid in developing competency in a selected sport. The department hopes students will maintain a measure of fitness throughout life with good physical activity habits established.

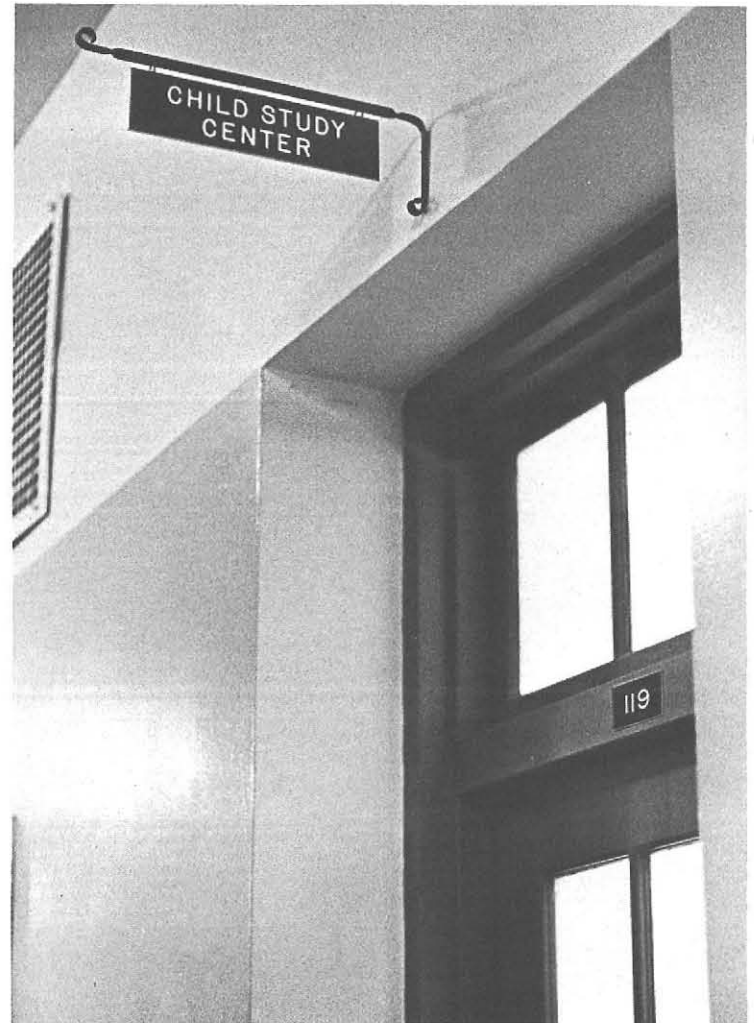


# Liberal Arts

Degrees in Liberal Arts with majors in various academic subjects were awarded for the first time in 1964. The program, developed over a period of several years, results from the State University policy to make teachers colleges into multi-purpose institutions. Students with junior-senior standing were admitted in September of 1963; plans call for the admission of freshmen in September of 1965. About fifty students are currently enrolled, and the eventual size of the division will depend on facilities, staff, and public demand.



The bachelor of arts degree is granted after a student has completed work in four broad areas—the arts, humanities, social studies, and science-mathematics—and a concentration in an area of major study. He must also demonstrate proficiency in a foreign language. With this background the graduate of the Liberal Arts Division is able to select from a wide variety of professions and fields the one that suits him best.



# Exceptional Children Education

Students majoring in the *Exceptional Children Education Division* specialize in areas of retarded mental development, physical handicaps, or speech pathology and audiology. Courses which develop abilities necessary to work with children having exceptional learning problems are the basis of the program in each area. Graduates who receive a bachelor of science degree have a substantial background in arts and sciences and in their professional education. To enrich the theoretical phases of the curriculum various community resources are made available to

supplement the laboratory facilities of the college.

Expansion of the curriculum for the training of teachers in the areas of deafness, blindness, and emotional disturbance, comprises the future endeavors in Exceptional Children Education Division. Electives in the division offered to students in other specialized areas include experiences which develop understanding, skills, and attitudes needed in appraising the nature and origin of disabilities in children as well as the types of school adjustments that might be made to educate them.

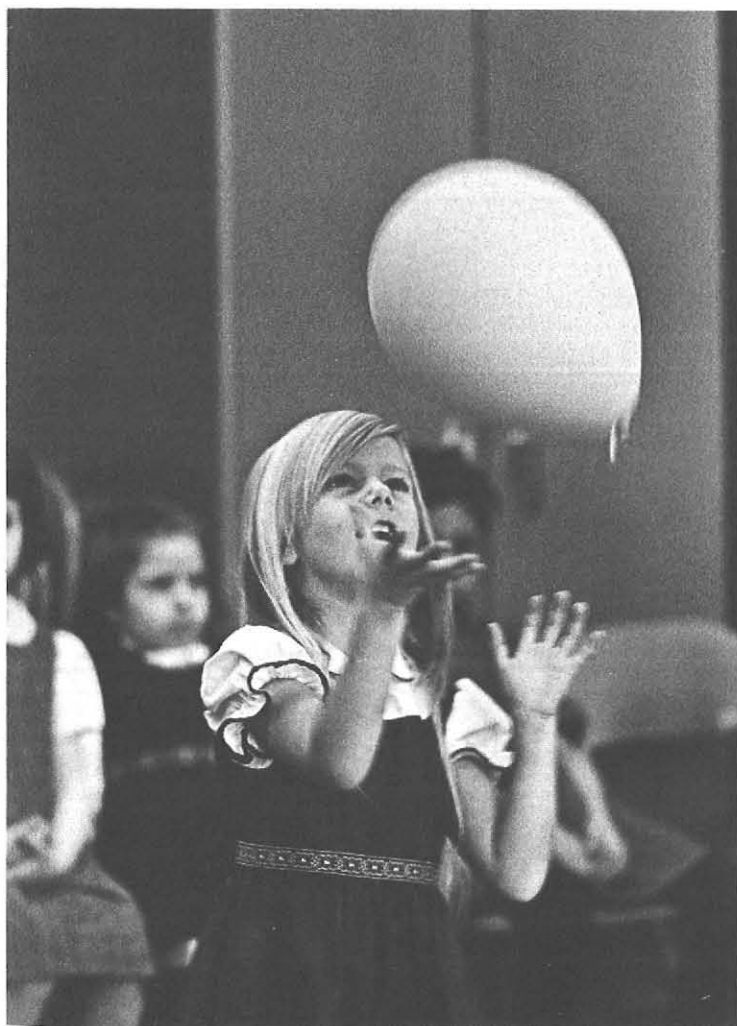
# Education

Responsibility for the education of children requires that teachers have the best education our culture can offer. The curriculum offered to students in the *Elementary Education Division* provides its graduates with abilities to meet the challenge of this responsibility. Courses are developed in general-liberal education, professional education, and electives which can form an area of concentration or a deepening of general interests.

Most important to the elementary education program is the supervised teaching experiences with children of various age levels in different types of schools. As a result of a comprehensive program, teachers achieve a degree of

professional competency which aids them in channeling their resources for the development of those whom they teach.

The curriculum for the Secondary Education Division provides for all phases of the professional program as well as specialization in mathematics, science, English, and social studies. Required hours in the major field are often supplemented by study in a minor. Students completing the requirements of the four year secondary education program will be certified to teach in grades seven through twelve. The certificate is made permanent upon the completion of a fifth year of study.



## Campus School

The *Campus School* at SUCB serves a dual role. It provides an educational program for children from the three-year-old nursery group through grade nine. It also provides observation and participation experiences for college students majoring in education. The Campus School participates in a program of experimentation and research. The school's program is based on the child development concept of education.

The facilities of the Campus School include classrooms,

a library of over 11,000 volumes, film-strips, recordings, pictures, and other materials used by pupils and teachers, a science laboratory, a home-economics room, a gymnasium-auditorium, an industrial arts room, and a nursery housed in Caudell Hall.

Serving the needs of its students and the college, the Campus School guided by its new principal, Dr. Benedict Surwill, provides a unique experience for everyone who participates.





## Art Education

The *Art Education Division* offers a curriculum for the preparation of teachers of art. Graduates of the division receive a bachelor of science degree. Those in the liberal arts program with a major in the visual arts or 'the arts' receive a bachelor of arts degree.

The art curriculum, the largest undergraduate program in the world, develops expressive and creative powers, and ability to teach, and a knowledge of the use of art in many aspects of living. It includes a broad program of general studies and provides opportunity for individual specialization. Upton Hall, the new home of the Art Education Division, contains specially designed equipment, a resource library, and extensive display facilities to enrich learning.

One of the fine contributions of the Art Education Division has been the foreign study program in Siena, Italy. This has now been extended to other divisions of our college. Through all the intellect and sensibilities given to man, the art students endeavor to pursue the powers of perception and creativity.

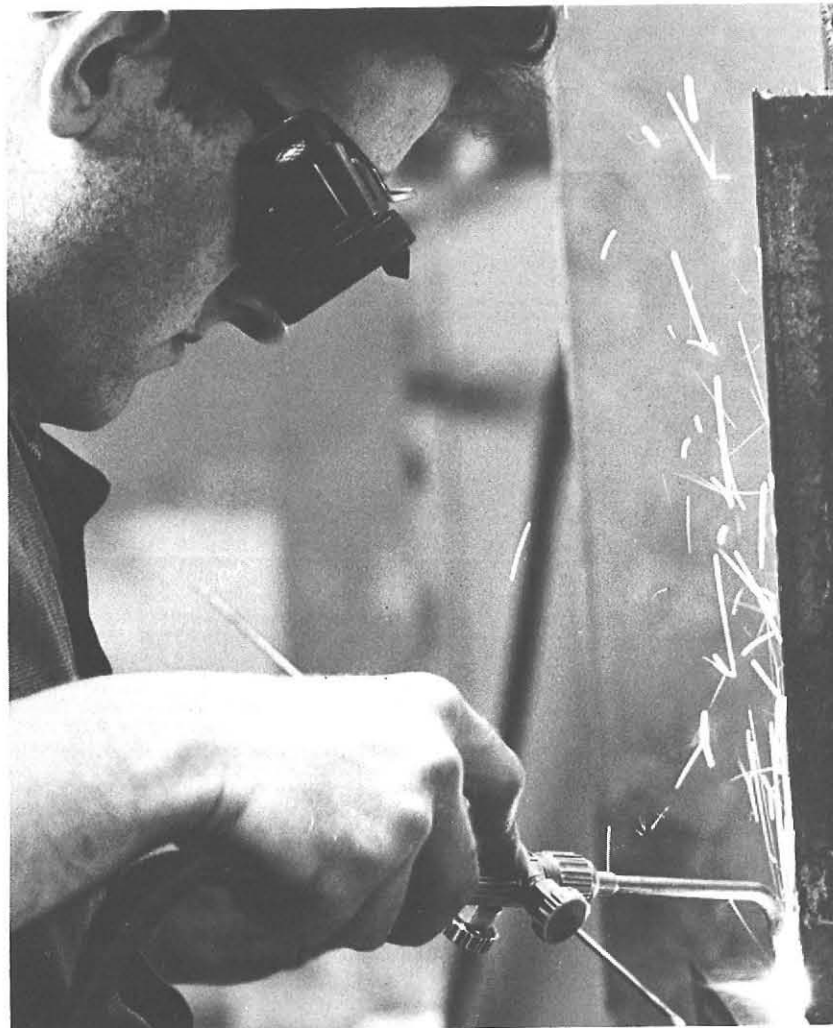
## Industrial Arts Education

The influence of industry on American life has added increased importance to the teaching of industrial arts. The *Industrial Arts Education Division*, based on this truth, has formulated a program of basic courses of technology, a professional phase in education and electives in areas of special interests.

Graduates of the Industrial Arts Education Division receive a bachelor of science degree. Through their preparation in industrial arts, these teachers are able to provide instruction in the intelligent use of industrial goods and services, and help many of their students to select careers or to develop wholesome recreational pursuits.

## Vocational-Industrial Education

The *Vocational-Industrial Education Division* prepares candidates to teach vocational and technical subjects in the public schools. Selection is made on the basis of trade and technical proficiency and personal qualifications. Skills of method and techniques in teaching, a knowledge of industry and technology, and progress in the profession form the basis of the academic program. Graduates of the basic program are eligible for certification and receive a bachelor of science degree for their achievements.



## Home Economics Education Division

The four-year program of the *Home Economics Education Division* prepares teachers who will be physically and mentally healthy, intelligent and informed, efficient vocationally and professionally, and cultured in gracious living. Graduates receive a bachelor of science degree and are qualified to teach homemaking in the public schools.

The laboratories of Caudell Hall provide students in the Home Economics Education Division with experience in such areas as food preparation and service, selection and construction of clothing, housing and home furnishings, and child development and family life. The college maintains an attractive, well-equipped residence, the Home Management House, located near the campus where senior students live for a five week period under faculty supervision to gain experience in the social and economic management of a home.

Future plans are for specialties in areas of home economics and a bachelor of arts degree program in liberal arts for majors in home economics. Realizing that the home economics field is a rapidly growing area of education, teachers need to continuously be prepared for professional advancement.

## Graduate Division

The *Graduate Division* offers an on-campus program throughout the academic year. Master of science degrees are given students in the same areas of concentration as represented by the undergraduate divisions and in Elementary Administration and Supervision. At present there are approximately 2700 active graduate students.

The Graduate Division prepares scholars and teachers who are capable of extending the frontiers of knowledge. The scope of its program is being broadened with plans for the inclusion of other degree programs, such as a master of science program for junior college teachers, a full-time graduate program, and, eventually, perhaps programs leading to the doctorate.

The Graduate Division encourages students who intend to pursue graduate work, at this institution or elsewhere, to visit the Graduate Office during their senior year to discuss graduate program possibilities and plans.

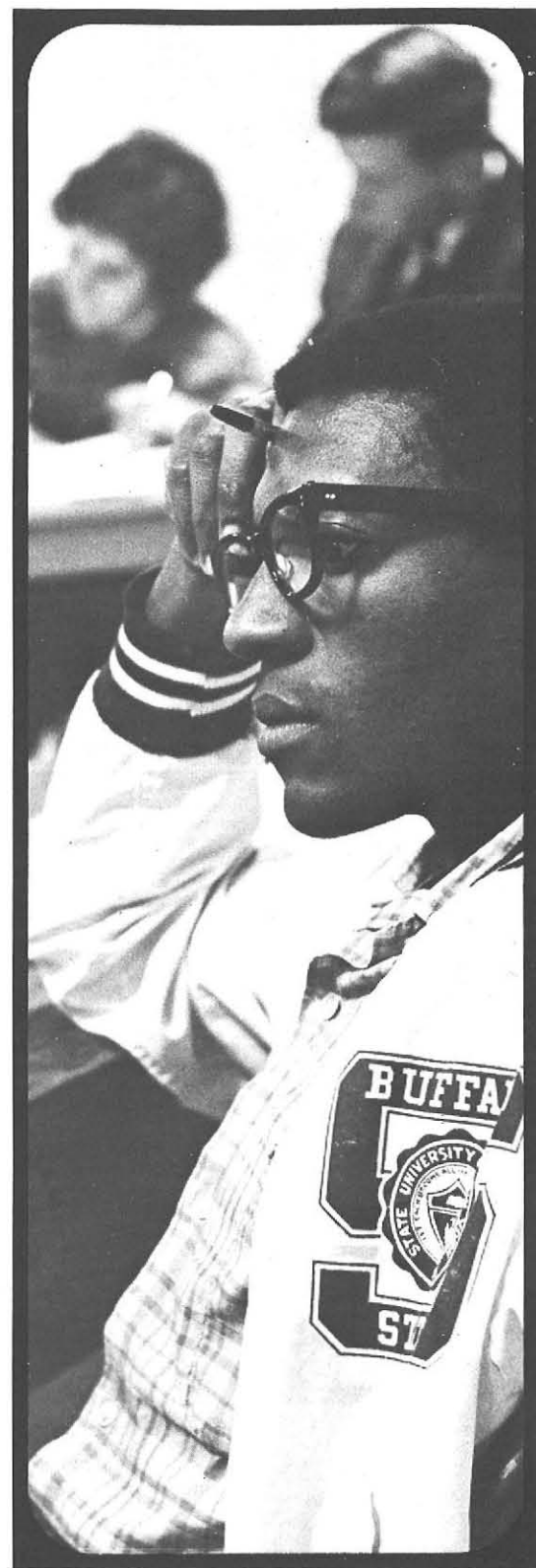

# Publications Board

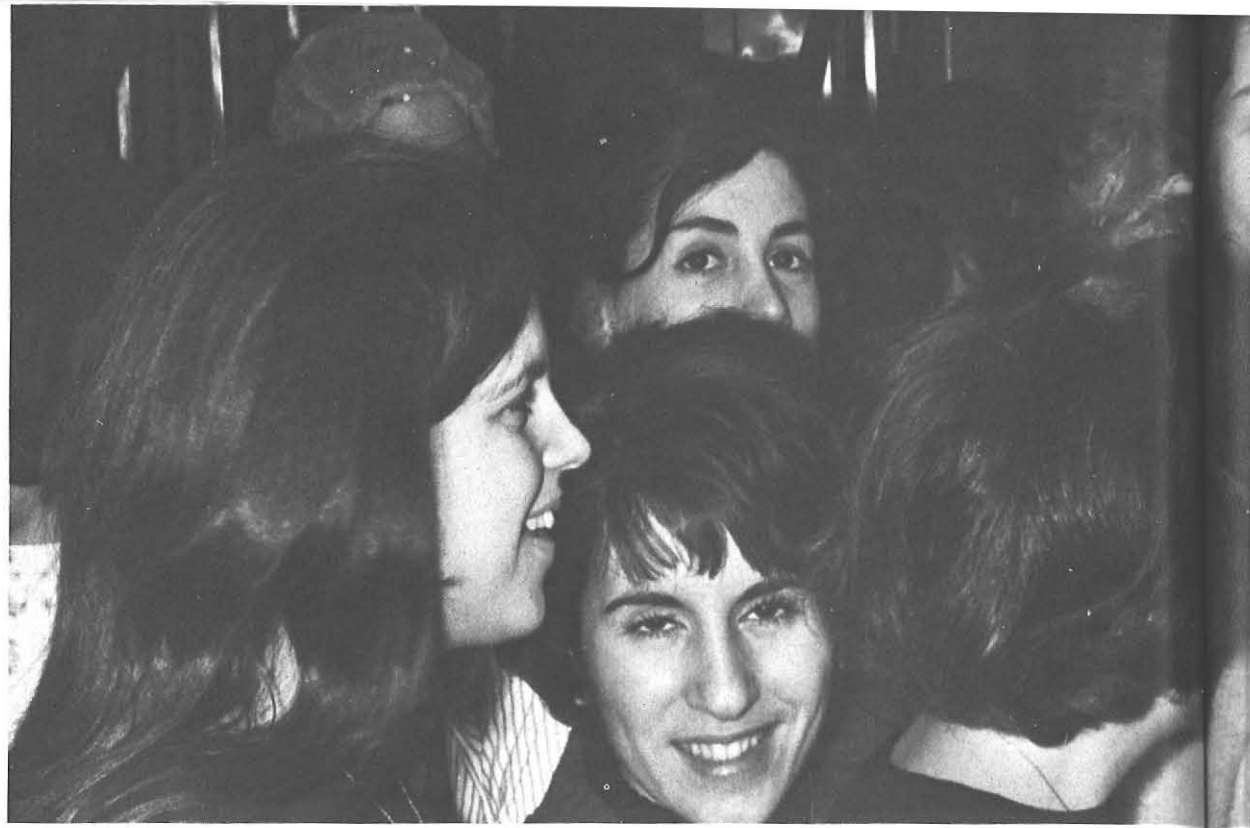

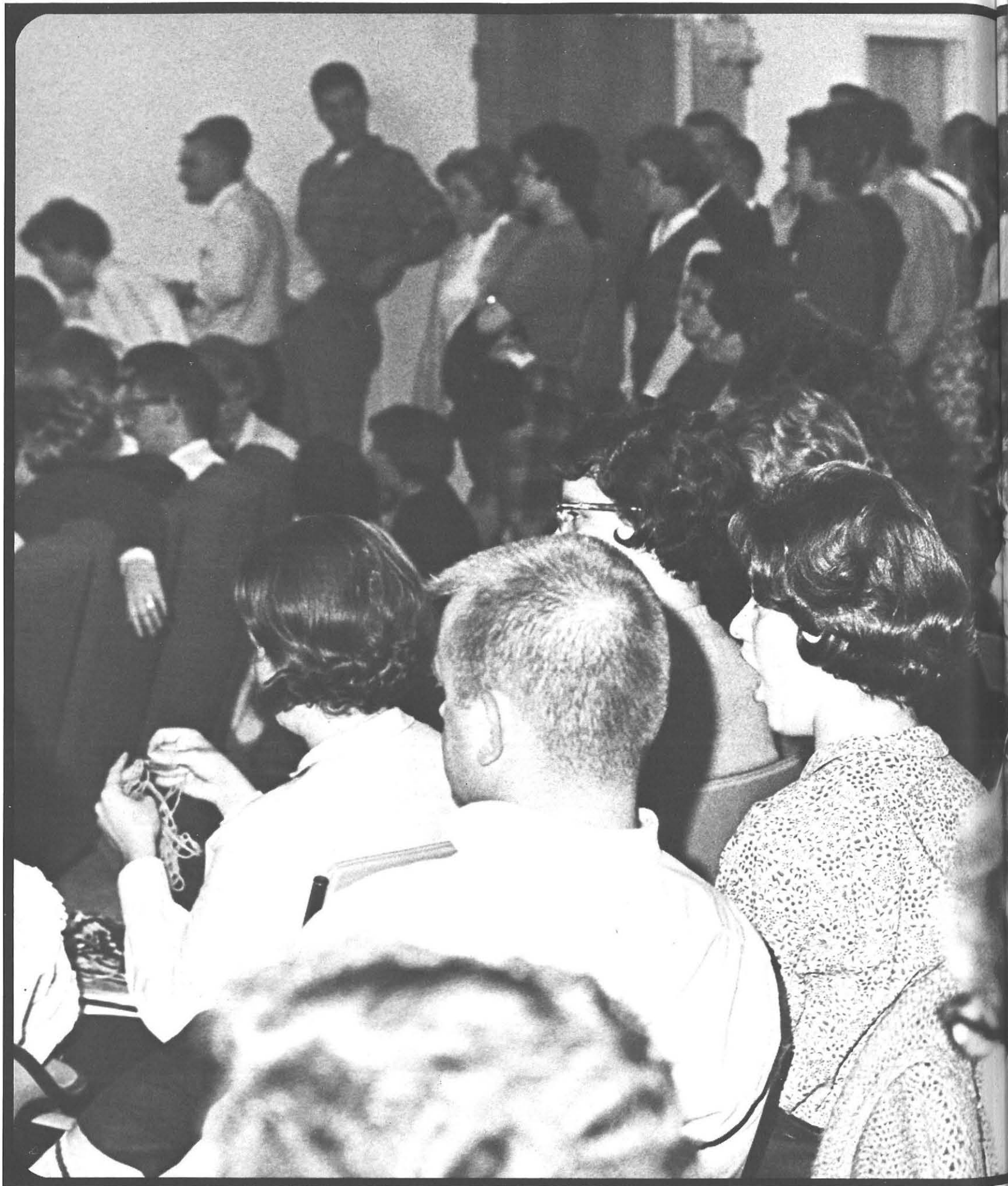
## Student Advisory Committee

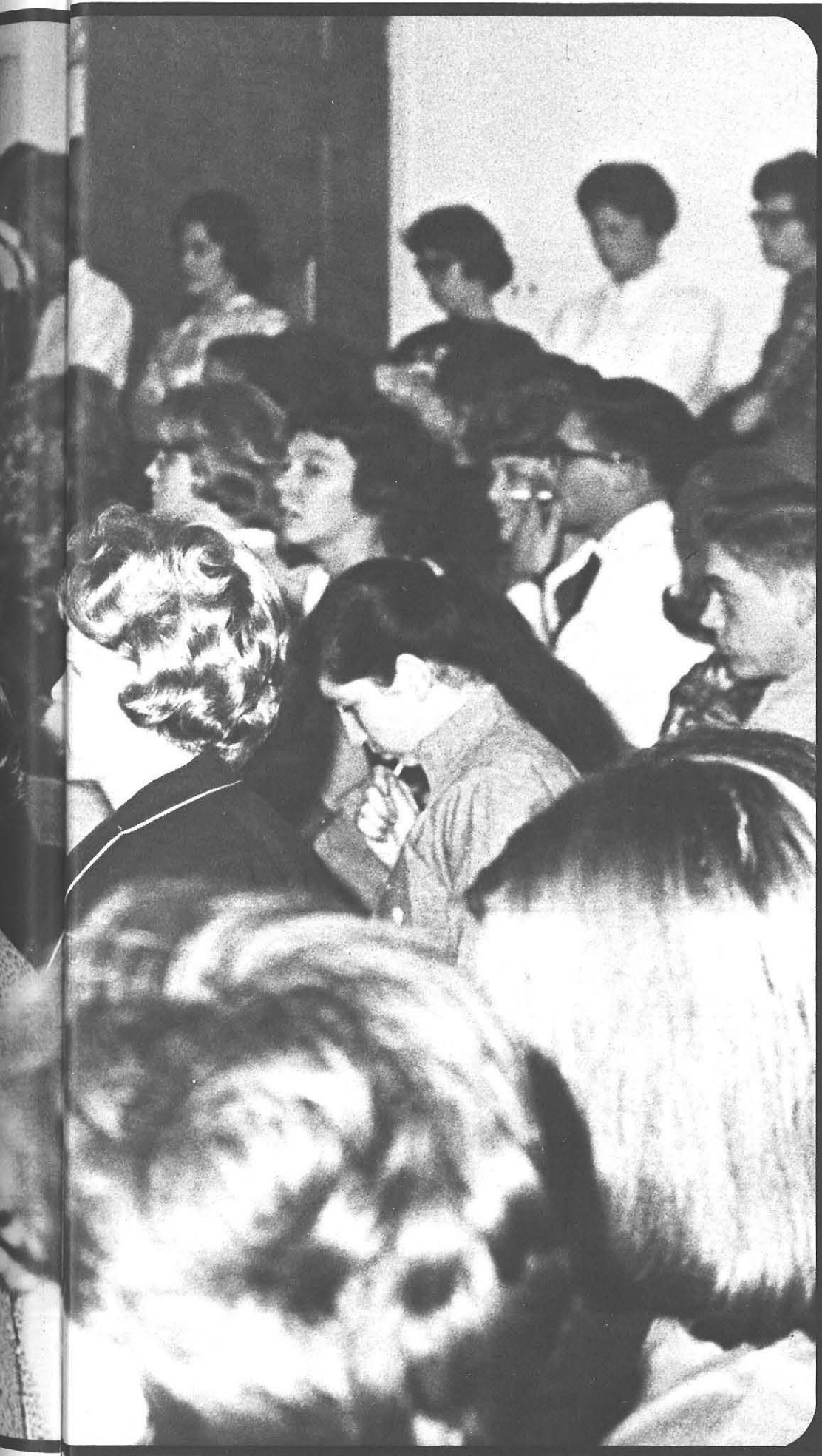

My brother is willing to grant the permission for such use but under special limitations in line with the following restrictions.

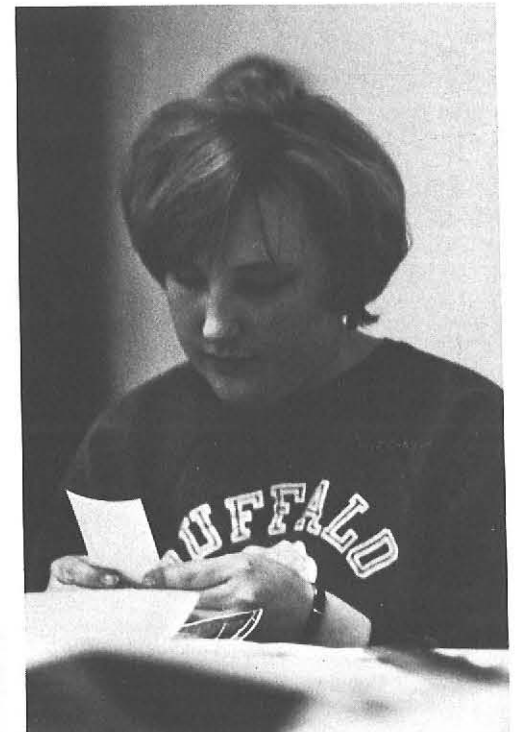

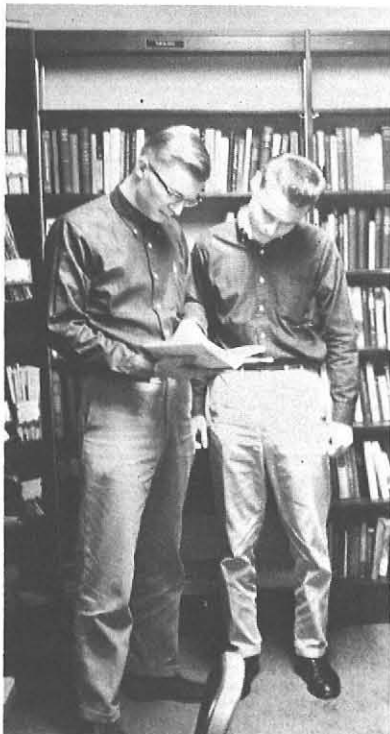
## Newman Club

campus concerts at schools and churches. Many long hours are spent at this task, and it has proven enjoyable for all who hear them.





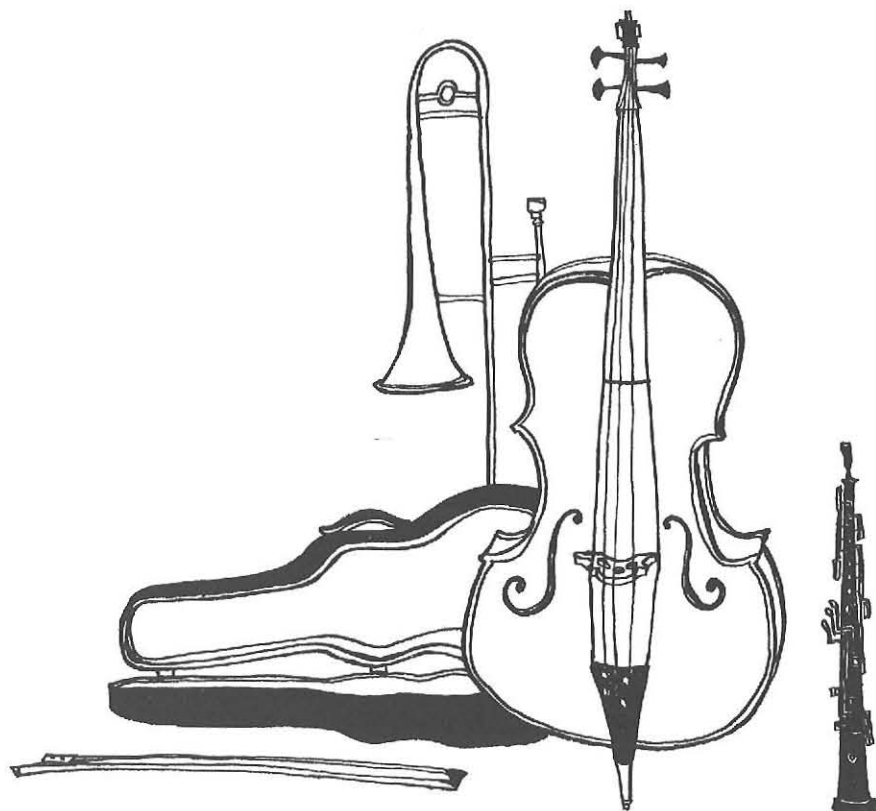

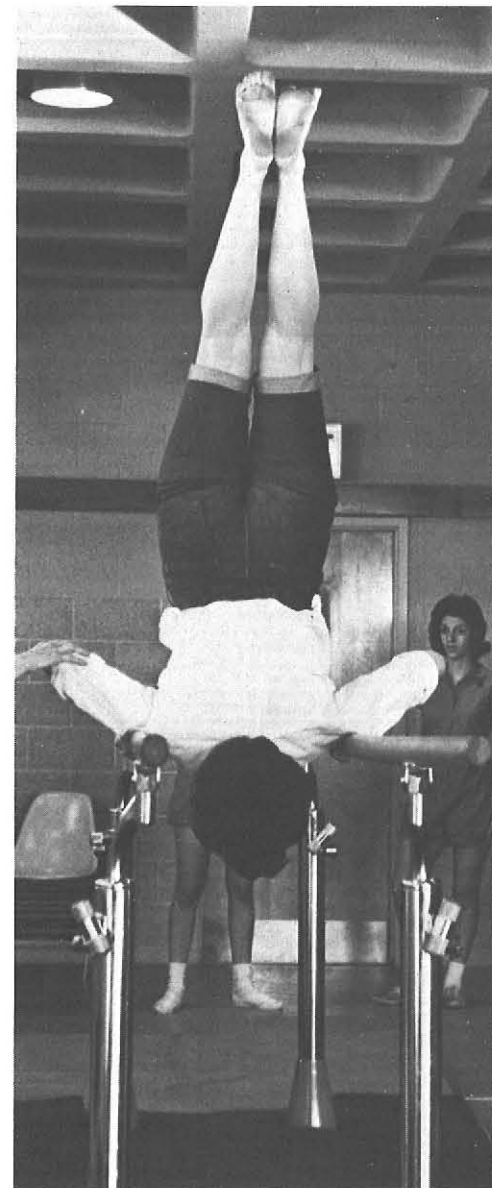

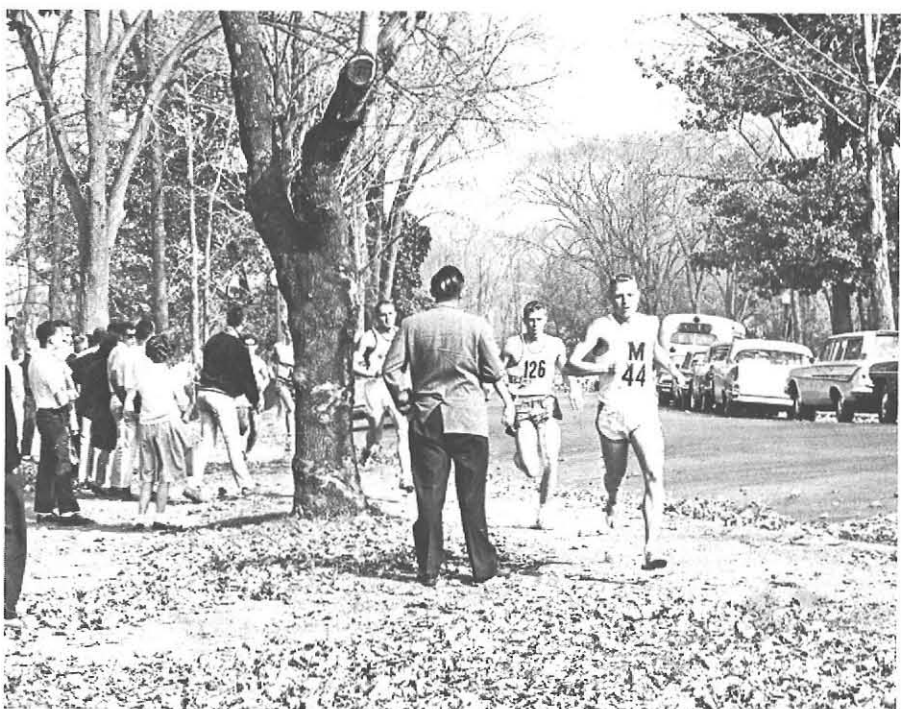
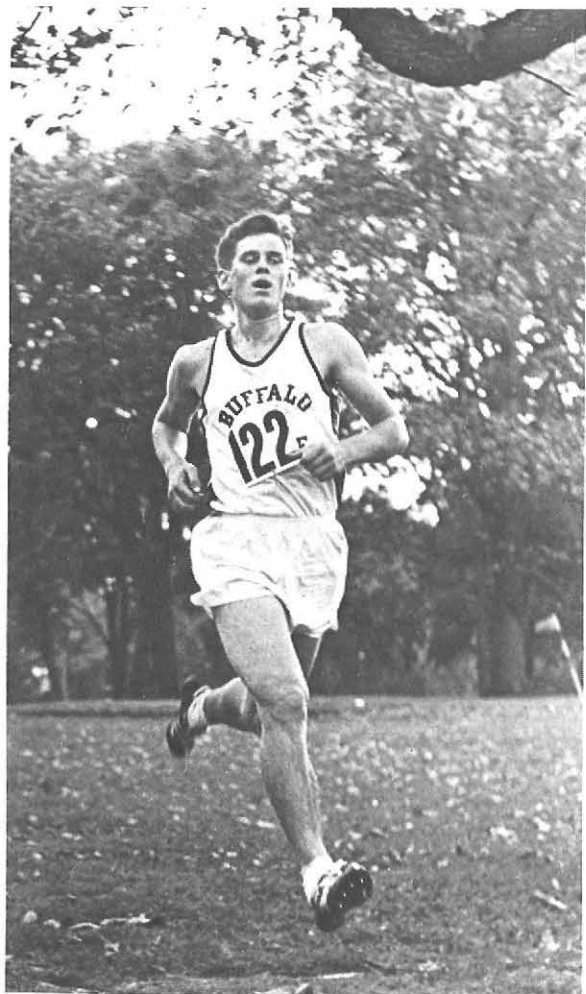
Although this was not the best cross country season on record, Coach Marsh has the nucleus of a great team next year.

The Orangemen started strong, faded slightly mid-way through the campaign, then caught fire briefly before their disasterous final four game set.

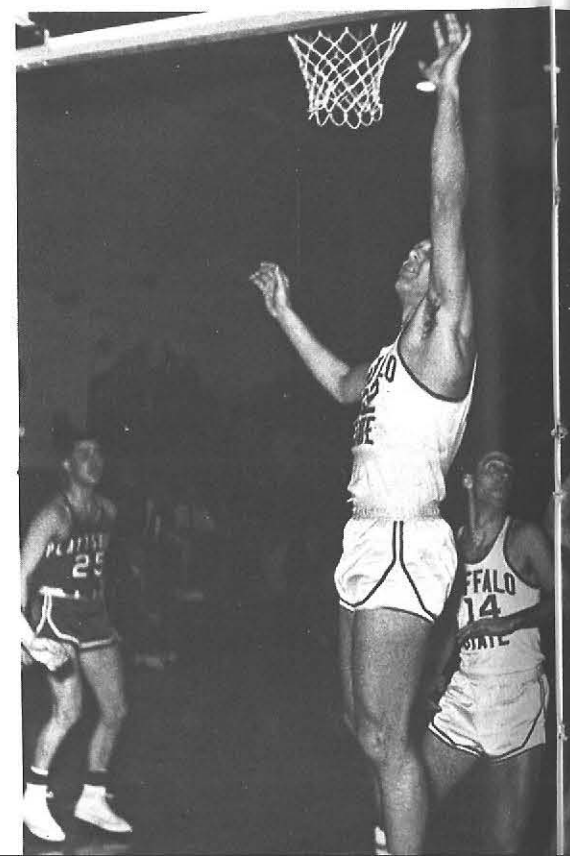

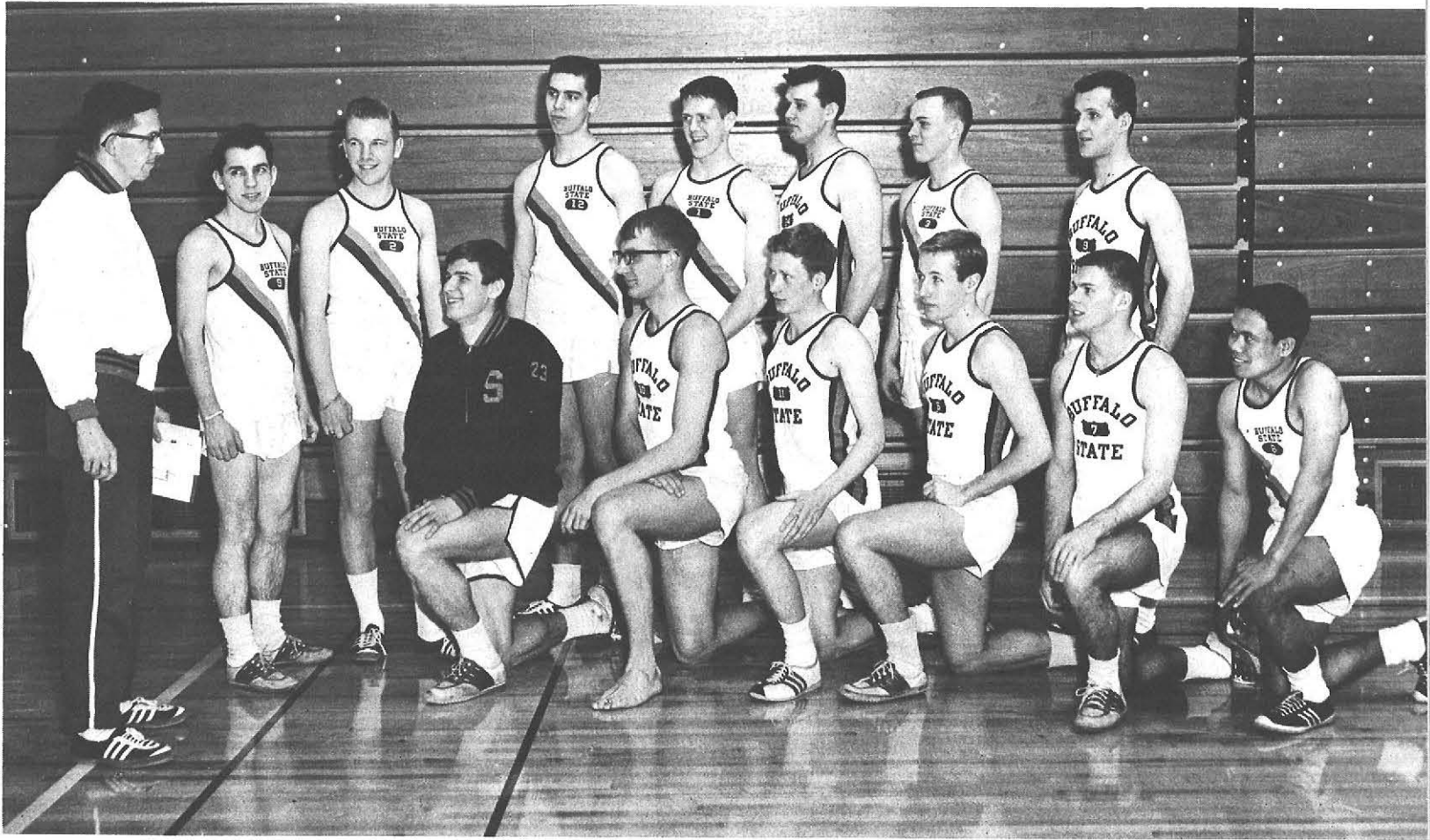
## Indoor Track

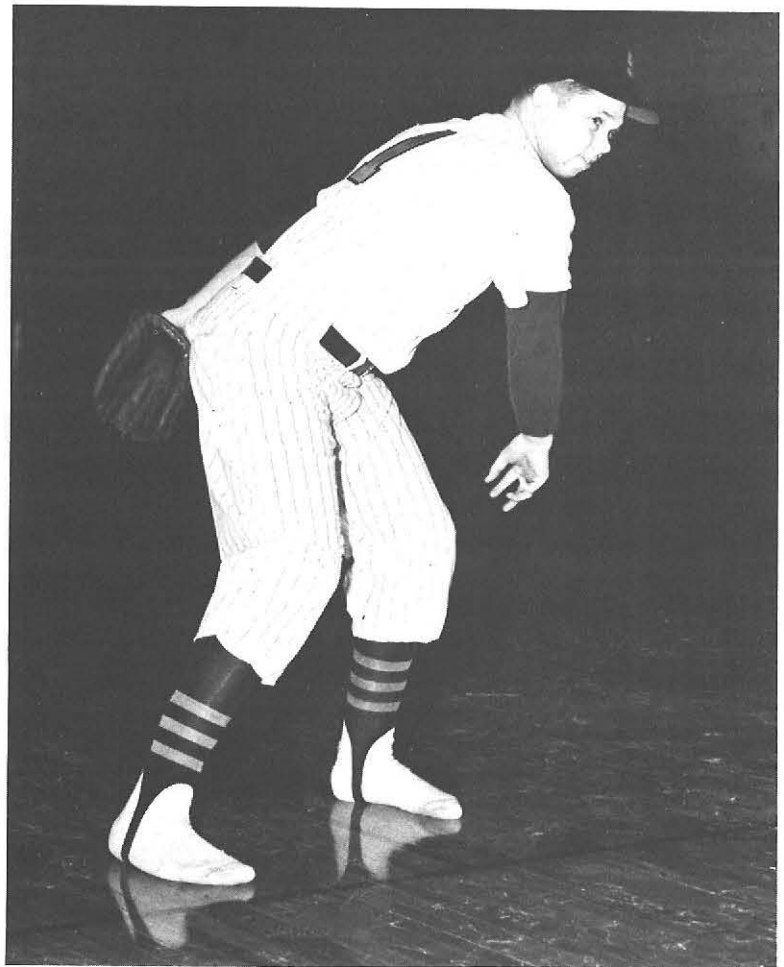
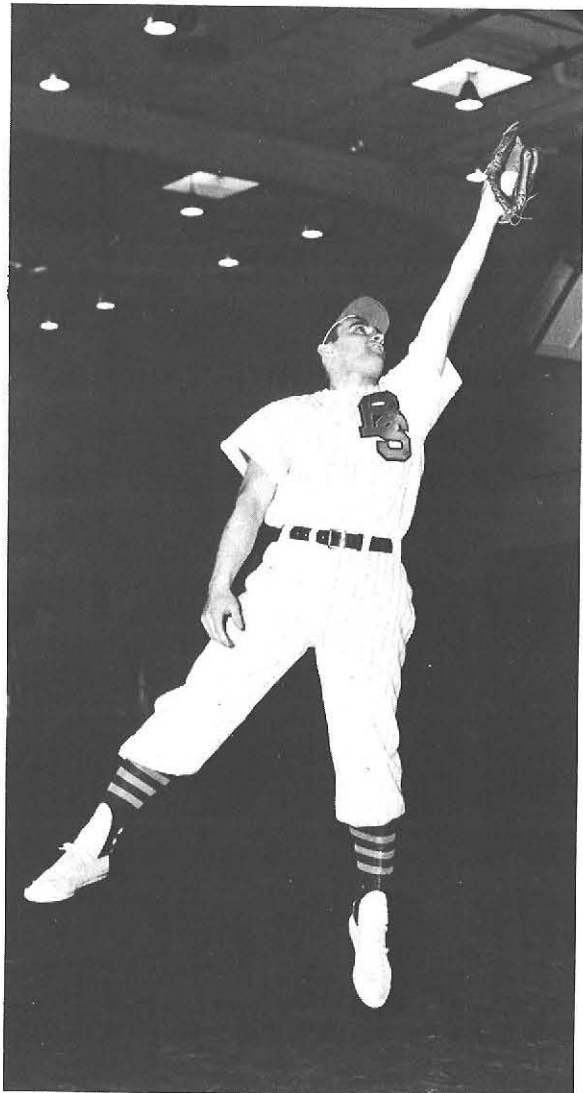
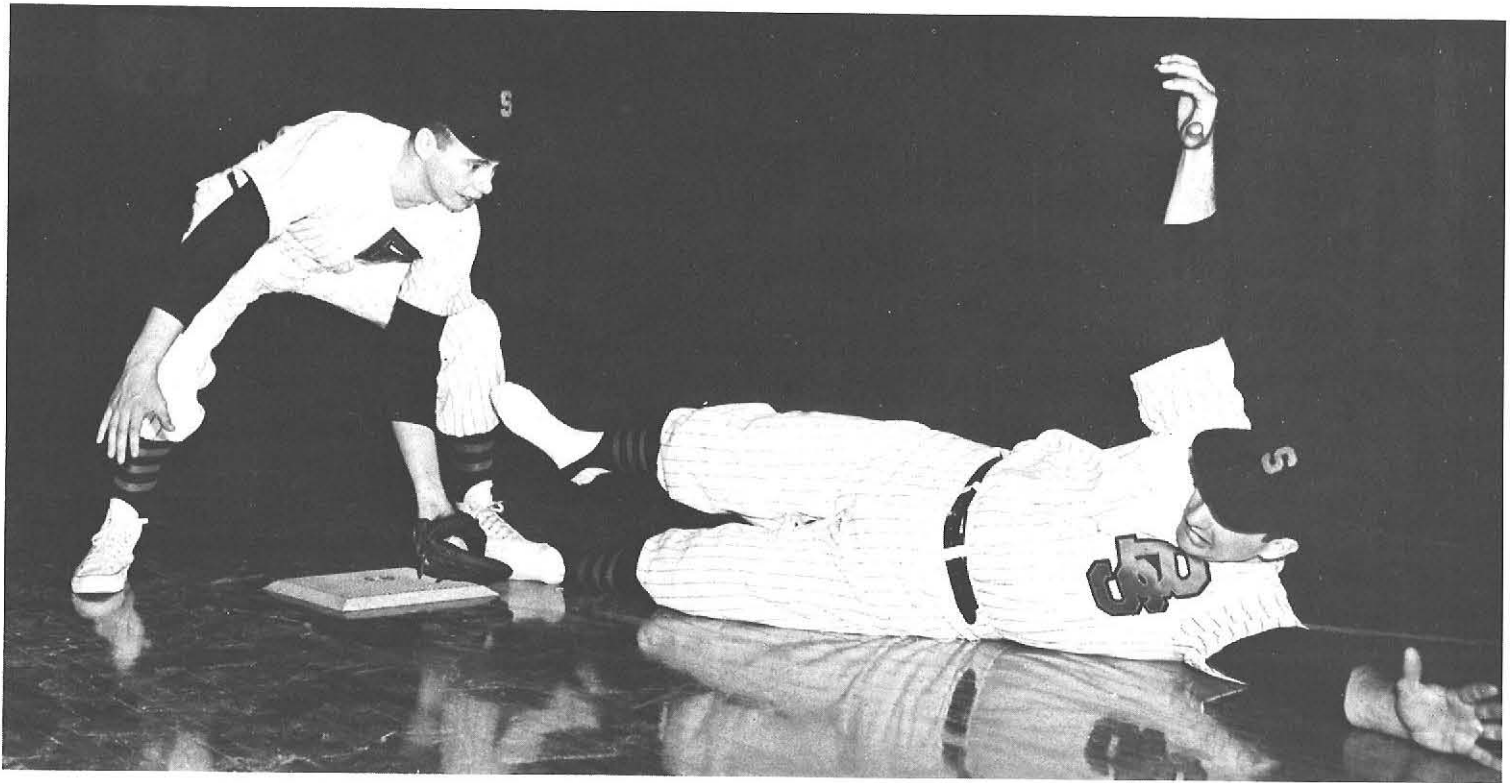
