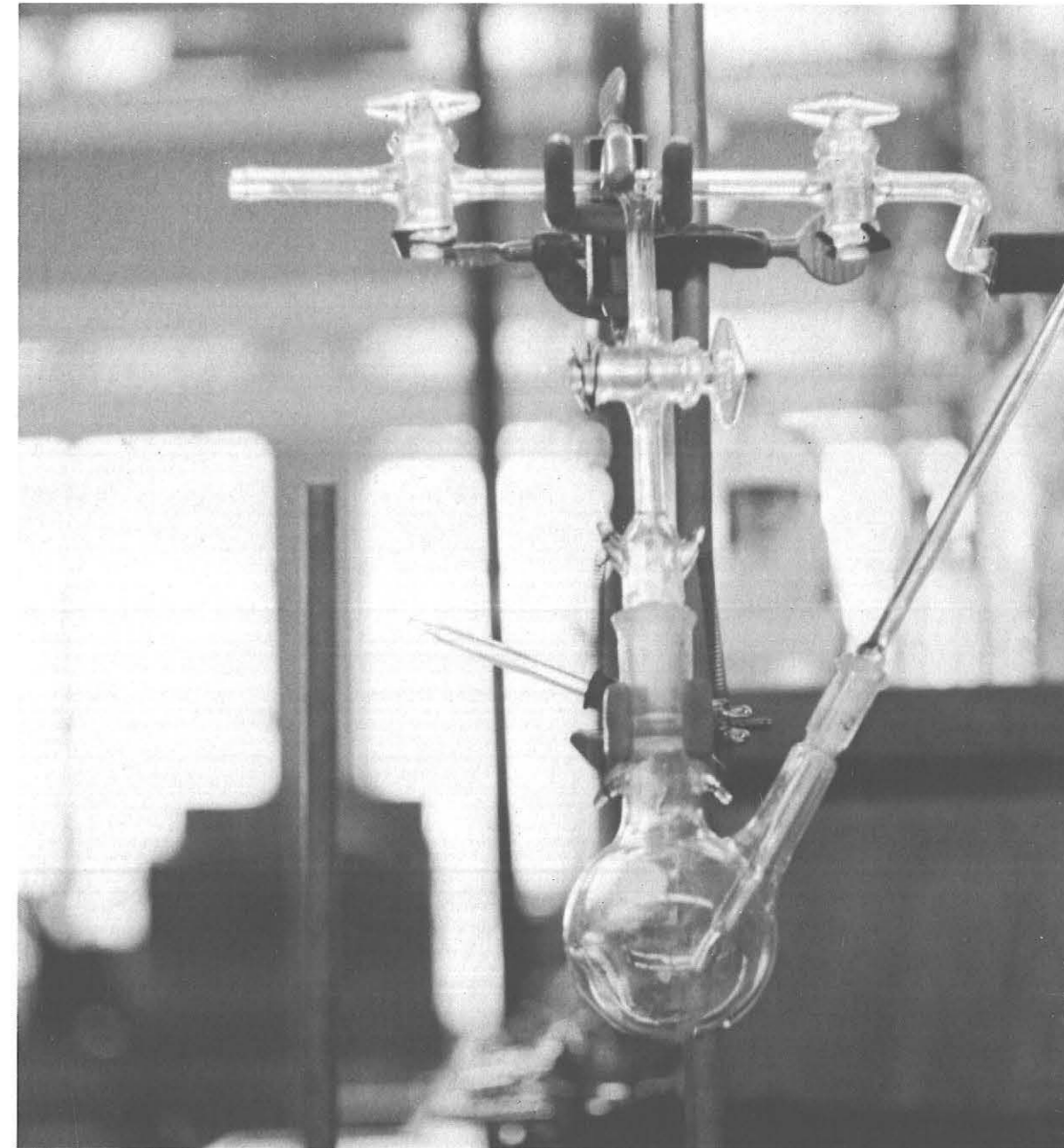
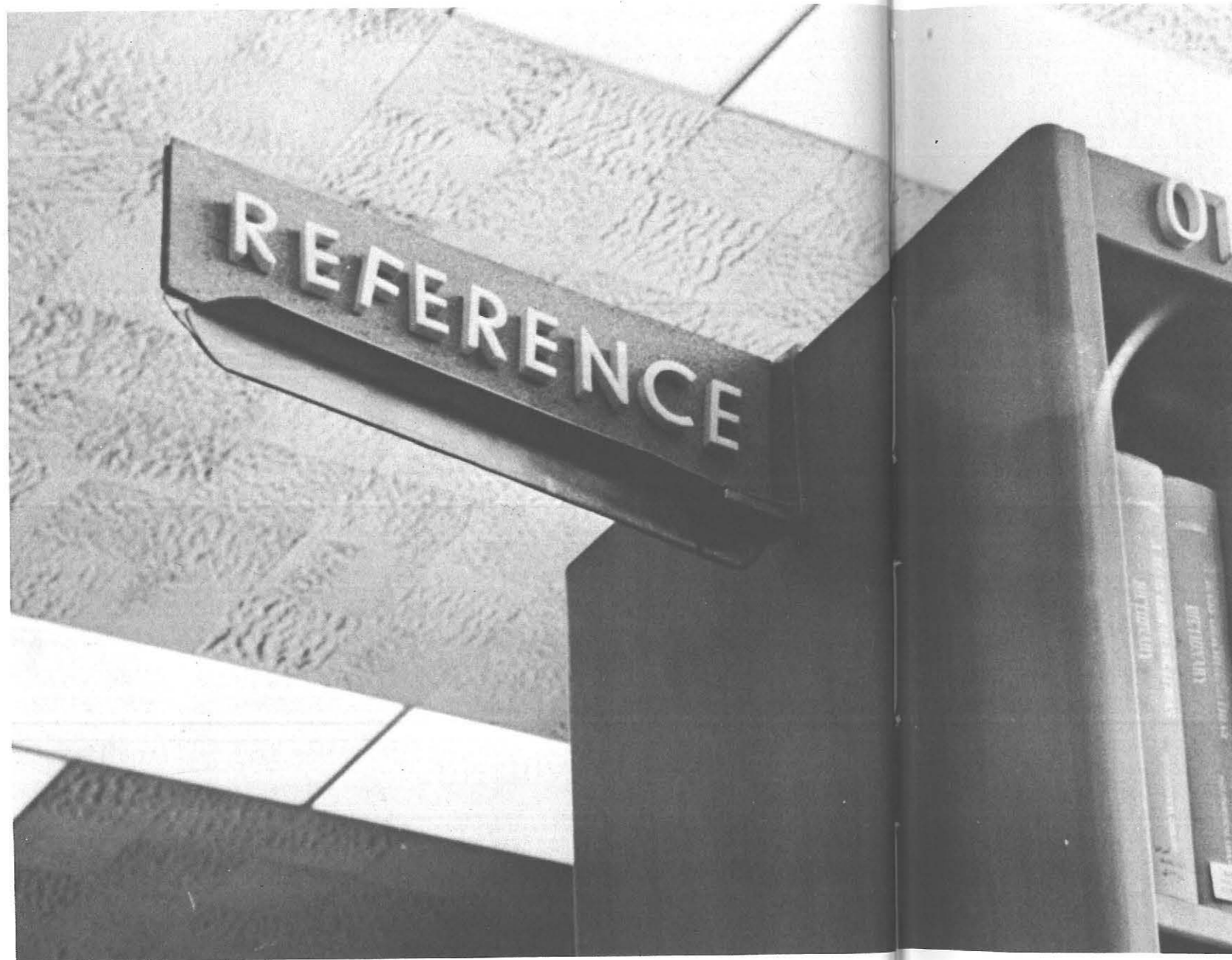
Charles Burchfield

Consulting Artist of State University College

Charles Burchfield is the consulting artist for our college. This year commemorates his fiftieth anniversary as an artist. He is not only a great landscape artist, but also a naturalist, as is so beautifully and clearly revealed by means of his brush.

Arts and Sciences

As the college expands, the curricula take in a broader scope also. The *Division of Arts and Sciences* includes those departments of English, Foreign Language, Mathematics, Sciences, Social Studies, Philosophy, Geography, Music, and Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Aside from administering the program in liberal arts, providing many required courses, the division provides many of the electives taken by students in other divisions of the College.

With the renovation of Ketchum Hall, many innovations have come to the *English Department*. Plans are now being undertaken to revise the curriculum for English majors. Additional courses also are going to be made available for the entire student body. The department is also augmenting its faculty with specialists in various fields in the anticipation of serving the students more completely.

Knowledge of a foreign language is becoming progressively more important in our "small" world. The *Foreign Language Department* at State is rapidly growing in size and facilities to meet this demand. Currently offered for study are French, Spanish, German, Latin, Russian, and Italian. A recent addition of the department have been the language labs. These are designed

so that the student may analyze his own voice with the use of tape recordings, and perfect his accent by listening to records. In connection with the Siena study program, students are required to take one semester of Italian before going to Italy.

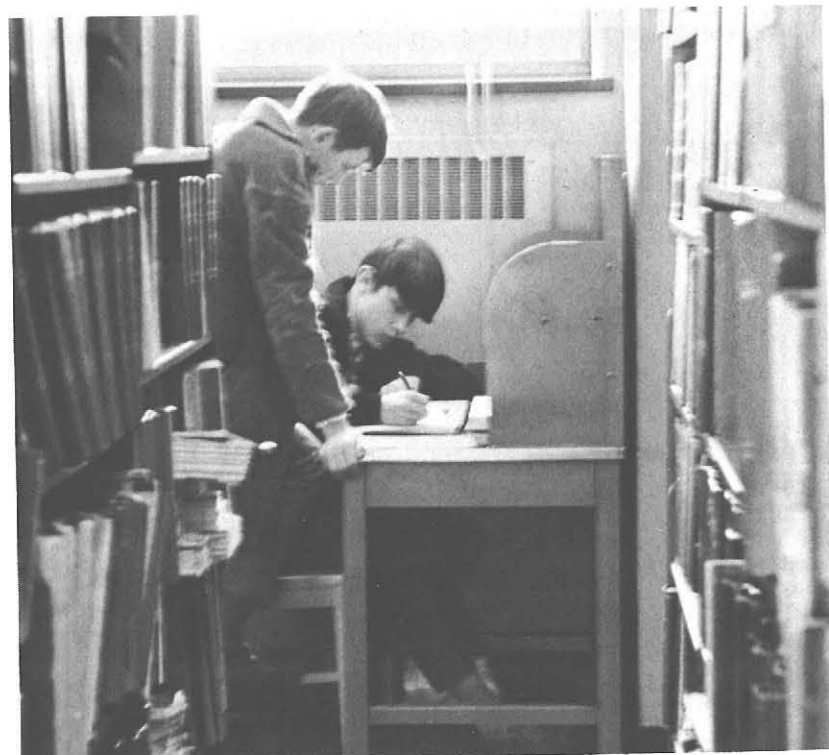
The *Philosophy Department*, once relatively small, is expanding also. With the formation of the Liberal Arts program, the Philosophy Department has come to play a significant role in the education of our students.

The *Social Studies Department* is also expanding. With many new faculty members and more course offerings, the department hopes to serve the needs of the students more than adequately.

The *Geography Department* hopes soon to offer major degrees in the relationship of man to his environment. Presently, the study of geography is an important element in a teacher's background, and because of this, many course alterations are being made.

The *Science Department* has gained an impetus in the broadening of its program with the completion of its new building. Now, more than ever before, students will receive fine instruction combined with practical lab work in good facilities. Plans are also in progress for a second building.

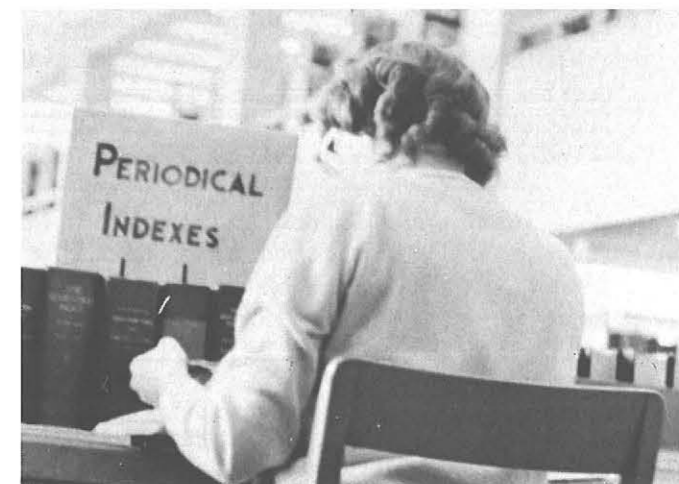


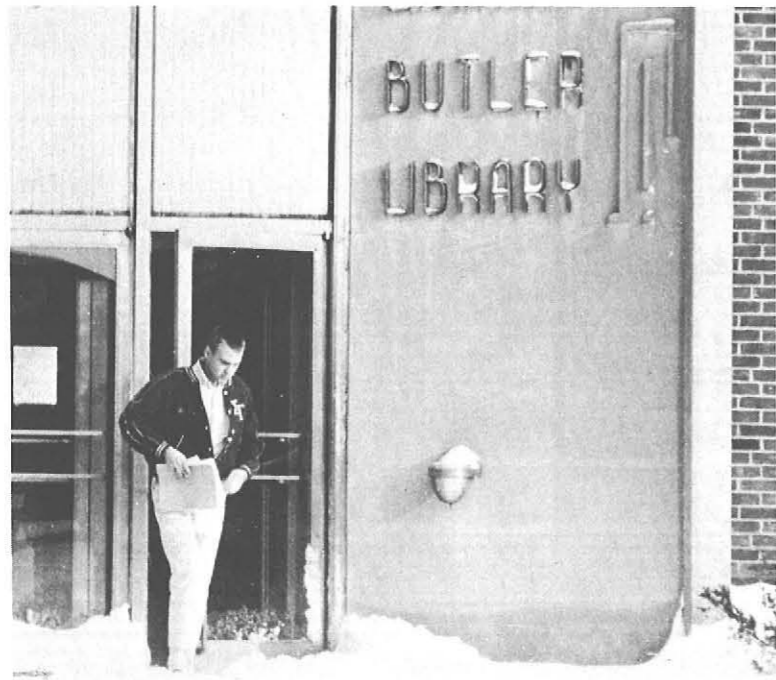


Advances have been made in the *Mathematics Department* as a result of a revised curriculum for the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers. Through its courses, the growing importance of math in our modern life is becoming increasingly obvious. The curriculum provides for more intense training of those students preparing for a teaching career as well as for those in Liberal Arts, who are majoring in Mathematics.

The Albright building is now entirely devoted to the study of music. The *Music Department* provides an extensive program of study for all students. The department is constantly striving to develop the important area of aesthetic appreciation of fine arts in our technical world.

The *Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Department* now offers a professional curriculum of its own. New facilities and expanded courses offer students the opportunity to explore their interests in the very important business of keeping physically fit.





Education

Responsibility for the education of children requires that teachers have the best education our culture can offer. The curriculum offered to students in the *Elementary Education Division* provides its graduates with abilities to meet the challenge of this responsibility. Courses are developed in general liberal education, professional education, and electives which can form an area of concentration or a deepening of general interests.

Most important to the elementary program is the supervised teaching experiences with children of various age levels in different types of schools. As a result of a comprehensive program, teachers achieve a degree of professional competency which aids them in channeling their resources for the developing of those whom they teach.

The curriculum for the *Secondary Education Division* provides for all phases of the professional program as well as specialization in mathematics, science, English and social studies. Required hours in the major field are often supplemented by studying a minor. Students completing the requirements of the four year secondary education program will be certified to teach in grades seven through twelve. The certificate is made permanent upon completion of a fifth year of study.

Campus School

The *Campus School* of State University College at Buffalo serves a dual role. It provides an educational program for children from the three-year old nursery group through grade nine. It also provides observation and participation experiences for college students majoring in education. The Campus School participates in a program of experimentation and research. The school's program is based on the child development concept of education.

The facilities of the Campus School include classrooms, a library of over 11,000 volumes, filmstrips, recordings, pictures, and other material used by pupils and teachers, a science laboratory, a home economics room, a gymnasium-auditorium, an industrial arts room and a nursery housed in Caudell Hall.

Serving the needs of its students and the college, the Campus School guided by its principal, Dr. Benedict Surwill, provides a unique experience for everyone who participates.

Liberal Arts

Degrees in *Liberal Arts* with majors in various academic subjects were awarded for the first time in 1964. The program, developed over a period of several years, results from the State University policy to make teachers colleges into multi-purpose institutions. Students with junior-senior status were admitted in September of 1963; plans call for admission of freshmen in September of 1965. The eventual size of the division will depend on facilities, staff and public demand.

The bachelor of arts degree is granted after a student has completed work in four broad areas—the arts, humanities, social studies, and science—mathematics—and a concentration in an area of major study. He must also demonstrate proficiency in an area of major study. He must also demonstrate proficiency in foreign language. With this background the graduate of The Liberal Arts Division is able to select from a wide variety of professions and fields the one that suits him best.

Exceptional Children Education

Students majoring in the *Exceptional Children Education Division* specialize in areas of retarded mental development, physical handicaps, speech pathology and audiology, the hard of hearing and the deaf, and the emotionally disturbed. Courses which develop abilities necessary to work with children having exceptional learning problems are the basis of the program in each area. Graduates who receive a bachelor of science degree have a substantial background in arts and sciences in their professional education. To enrich the theoretical phases of the curriculum various community resources are made available to supplement the laboratory facilities of the college.

Expansion of the curriculum for the training of teachers is a future endeavor in the Exceptional Children Education Division. Electives in the division offered to students in other specialized areas include experiences which develop understanding, schools and attitudes needed in appraising the nature and origin of disabilities in children as well as types of school adjustments that might be made to educate them.

Art Education

The *Art Education Division* offers a curriculum for the preparation of teachers of art. Graduates of the division receive a bachelor of science degree. Those in the liberal arts program with a major in the visual arts or the Arts receive a bachelor of arts degree.

The art curriculum, the largest undergraduate program in the world, develops expressive and creative powers and ability to teach and a knowledge of the use of art in many aspects of living. It includes a broad program of general studies and provides opportunity for individual specialization. Upton Hall, the new home of the Art Education Division, contains specially designed equipment, a resource library, and extensive display facilities to enrich learning.

One of the fine contributions of the Art Education Division has been the foreign study program in Siena, Italy. This has now been extended into other divisions of our college. Through all the intellect and sensibilities given to man, the art students endeavor to pursue the powers of perception and creativity.



Industrial Arts Education

The influence of industry on American life has added increased importance to the teaching of industrial arts. The *Industrial Arts Education Division*, based on this truth has formulated a program of basic courses of technology, a professional phase in education and electives in areas of special interests.

Graduates of the Industrial Arts Education Division receive a bachelor of science degree. Through their preparation in industrial arts, these teachers are able to provide instruction in the intelligent use of industrial goods and services, and help many of their students to select careers or to develop wholesome recreational pursuits.

Vocational-Industrial Education

The *Vocational-Industrial Education Division* prepares candidates to teach vocational and technical subjects in the public schools. Selection is made on the basis of trade and technical proficiency and personal qualifications. Skills of method and techniques in teaching, a knowledge of industry and technology, and progress in the profession for the basis of the academic program. Graduates of the basic program are eligible for certification and receive a bachelor of science degree for their achievements.

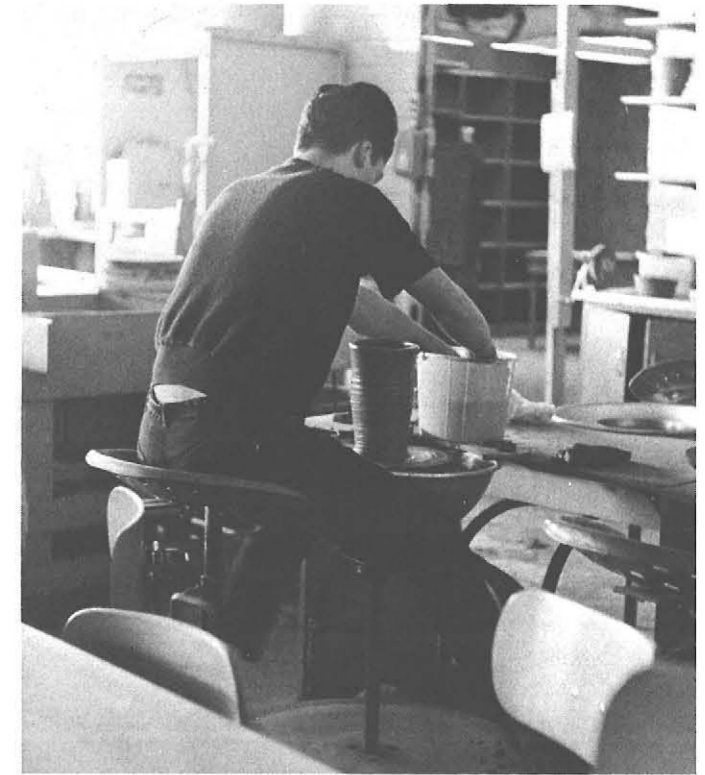


Home Economics Education

The four-year program of the *Home Economics Education Division* prepares teachers who will be physically and mentally healthy, intelligent and informed, efficient vocationally and professionally, and cultured in gracious living. Graduates receive a bachelor of science degree and are qualified to teach homemaking in the public schools.

The laboratories of Caudell Hall provide students in the Home Economics Education Division with experience in such areas as food preparation and service, selection and construction of clothing, housing and home furnishings, and child development and family life. The college maintains an attractive, well-equipped residence, the Home Management House, located near the campus where senior students live for a five week period under faculty supervision to gain experience in the social and economic management of a home.

Future plans are for specialties in areas of home economics and a bachelor of arts degree program in liberal arts for majors in home economics. Realizing that the home economics field is a rapidly growing area of education, teachers need to be continually prepared for professional advancement.



Graduate Division

The *Graduate Division* offers an on-campus program throughout the academic year. Master of science degrees are given students in the same areas of concentration as represented by the undergraduate divisions and in Elementary Administration and Supervision.

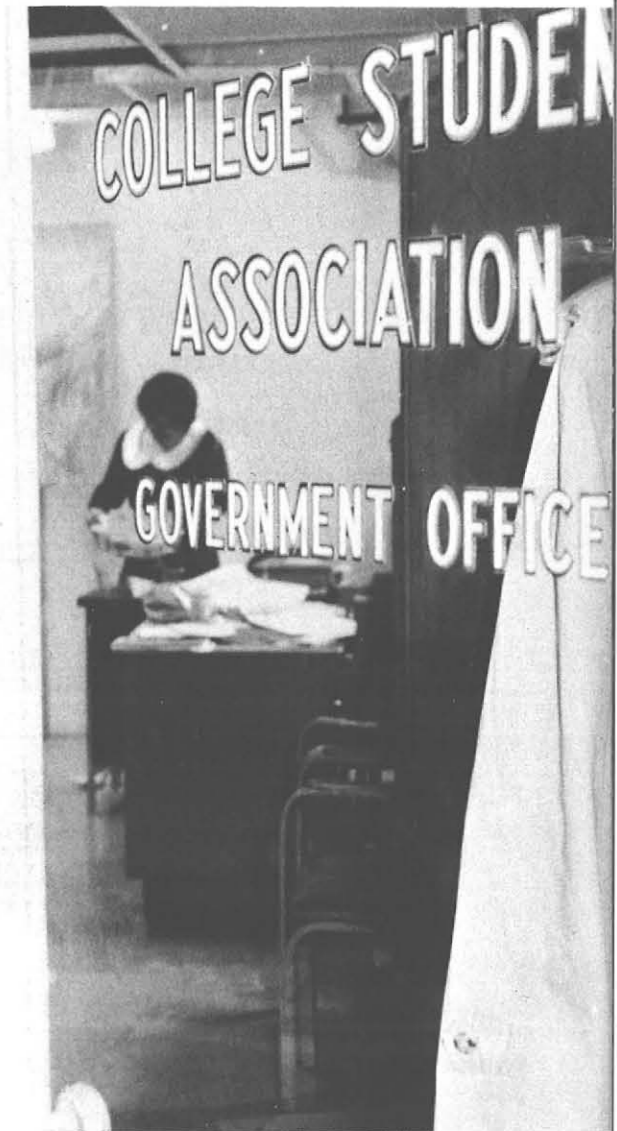
The graduate division prepares scholars and teachers who are capable of extending the frontiers of knowledge. The scope of its program is being broadened with plans for the inclusion of other degree programs, such as a master of science program for junior college teachers, a full-time graduate program and eventually, perhaps programs leading to the doctorate.

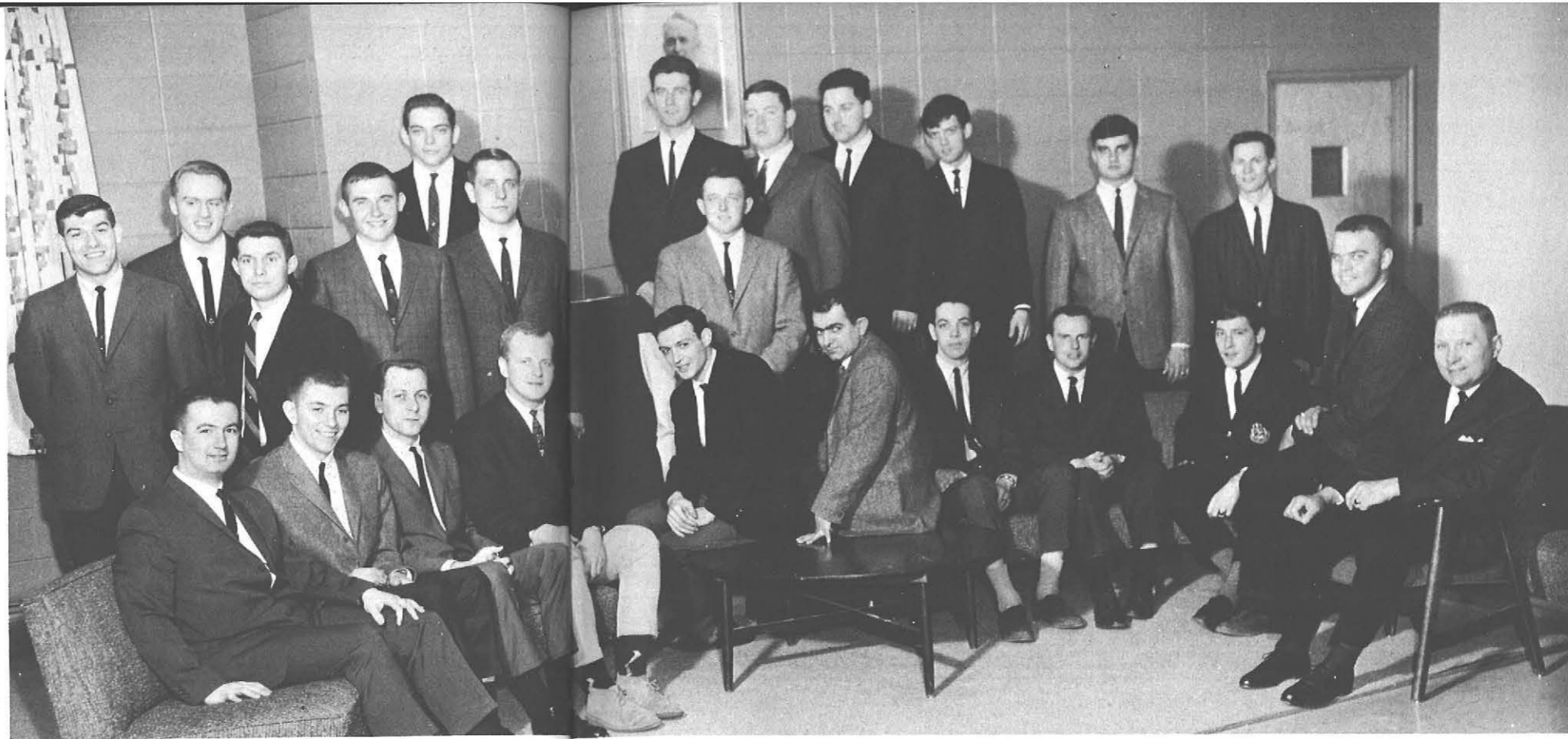

Music Board

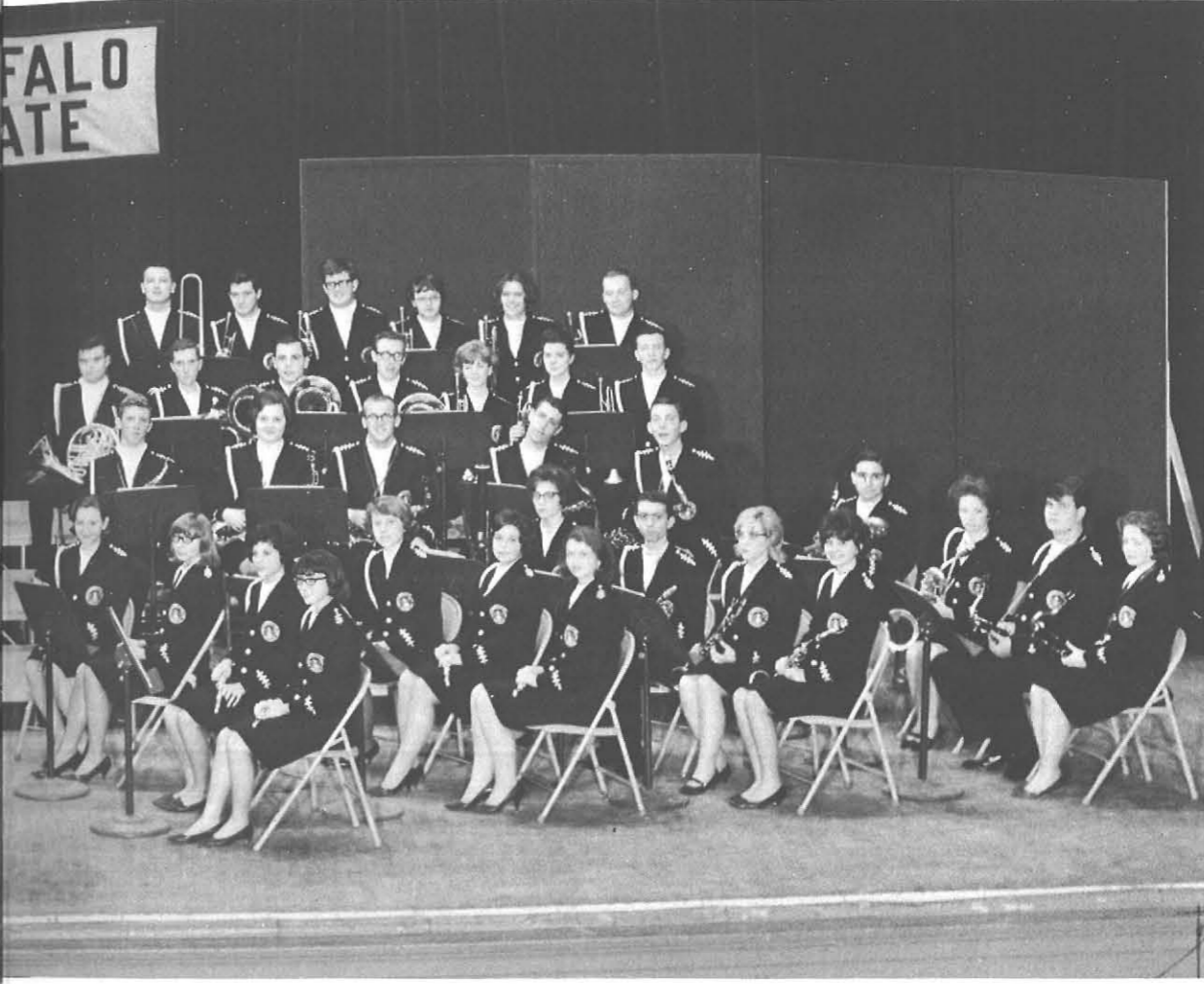

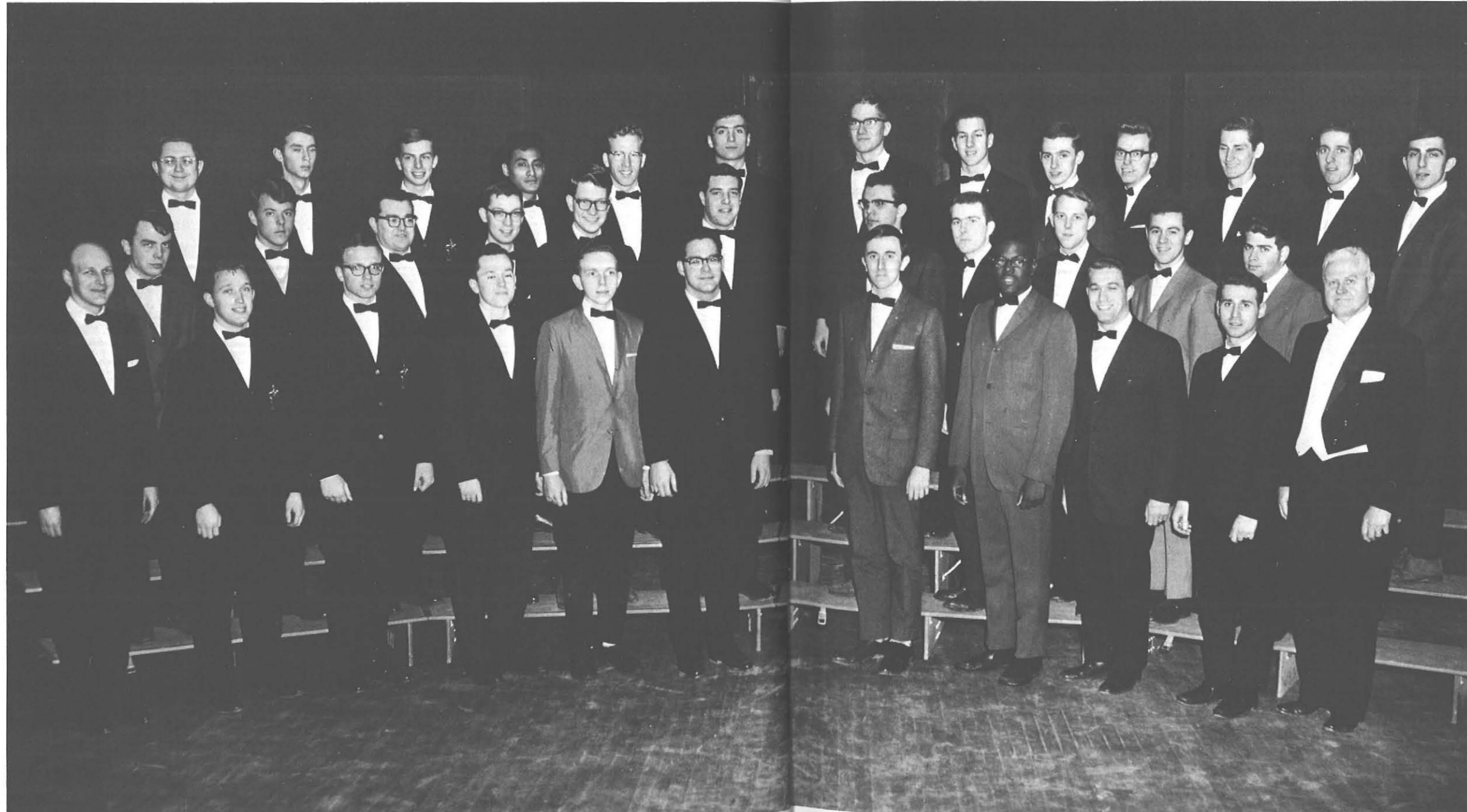

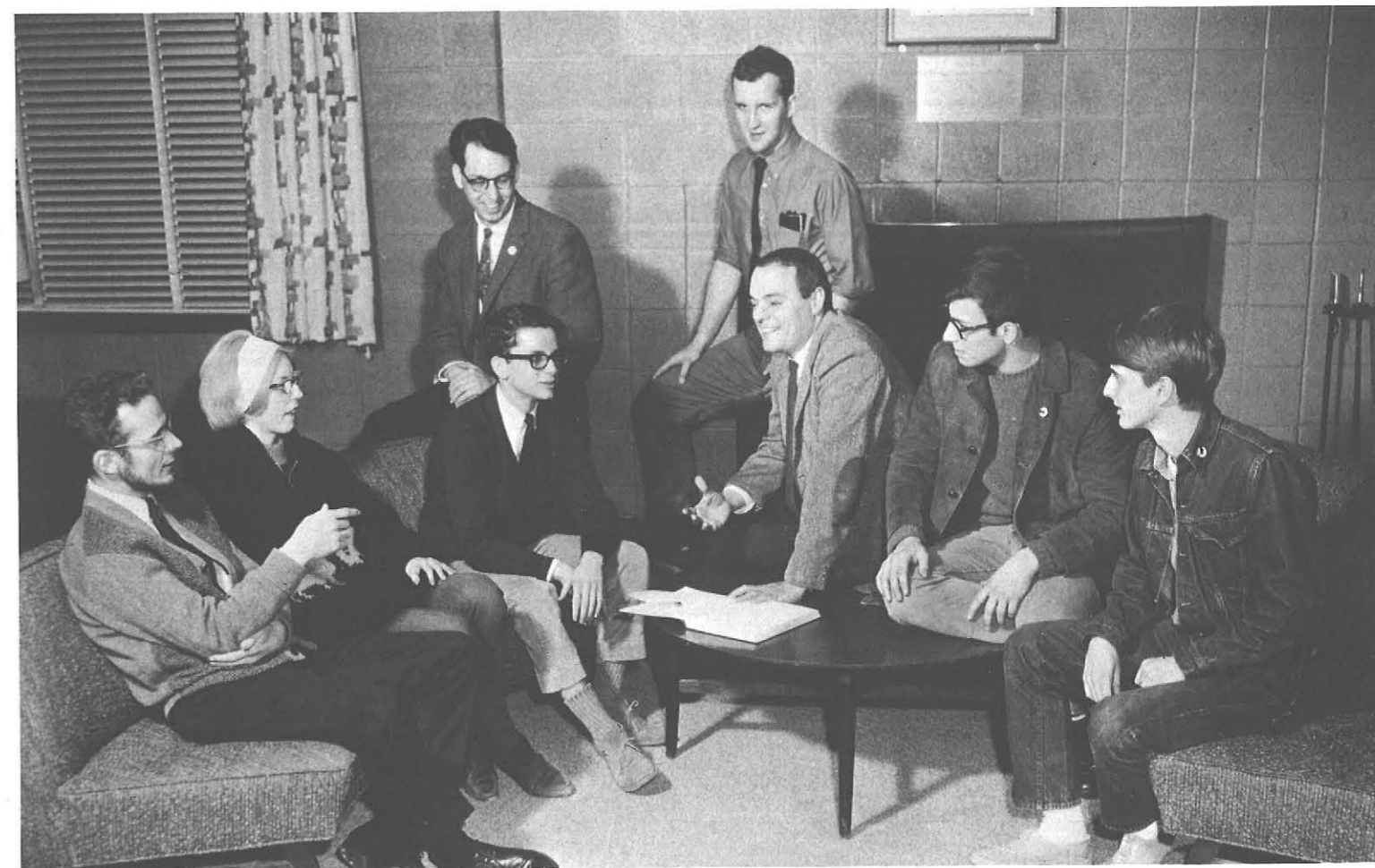
Phi Upsilon Omicron

International Relations Club

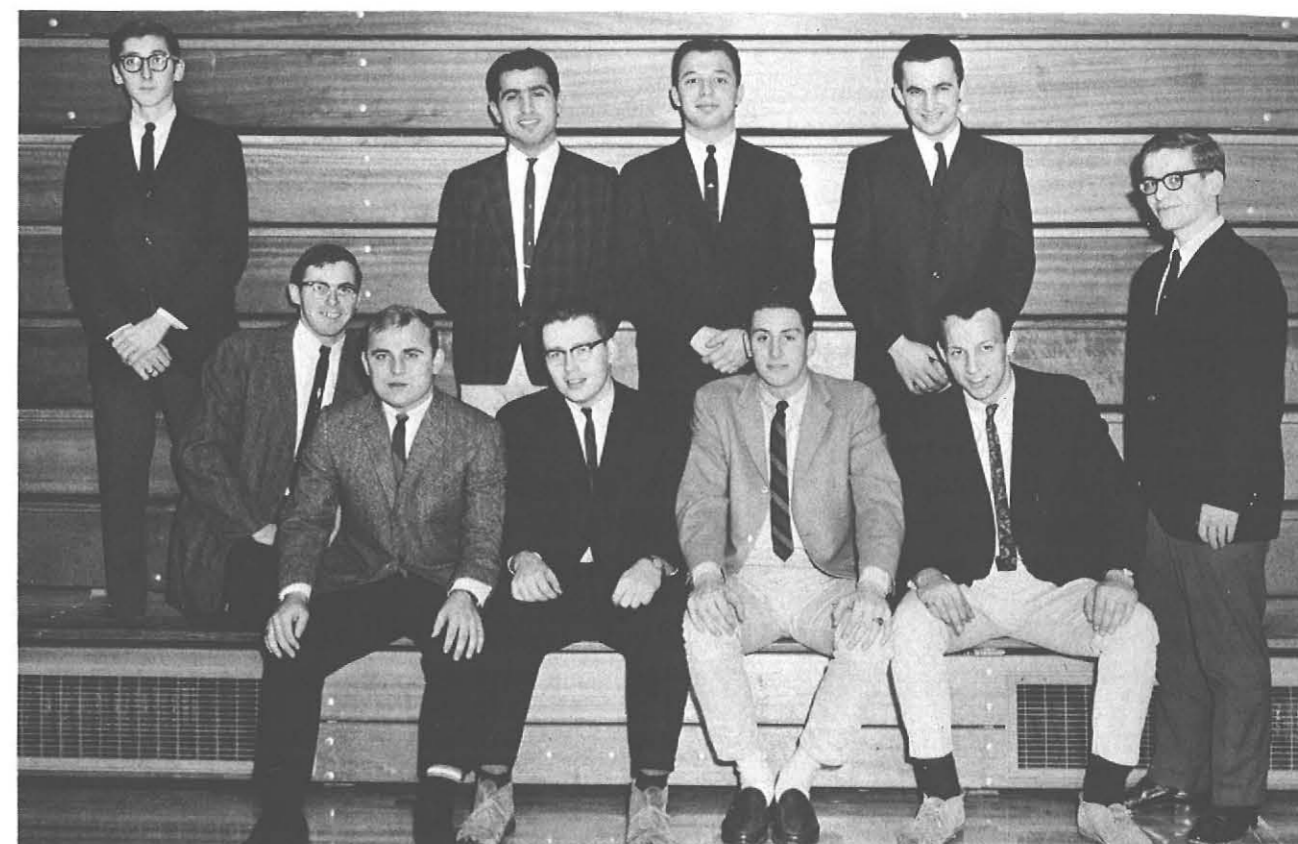
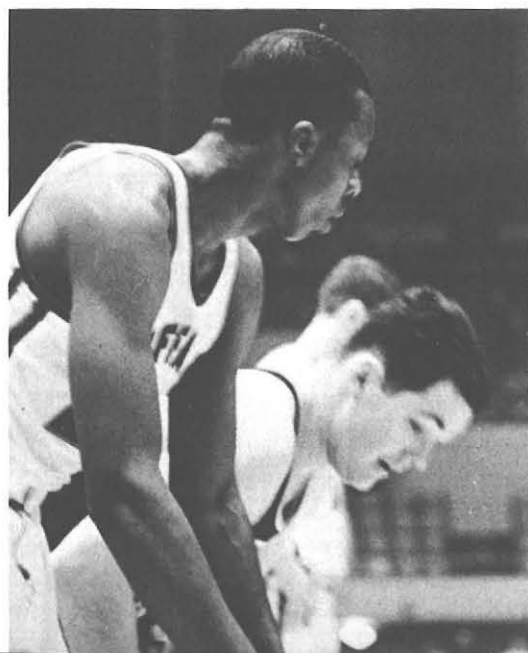
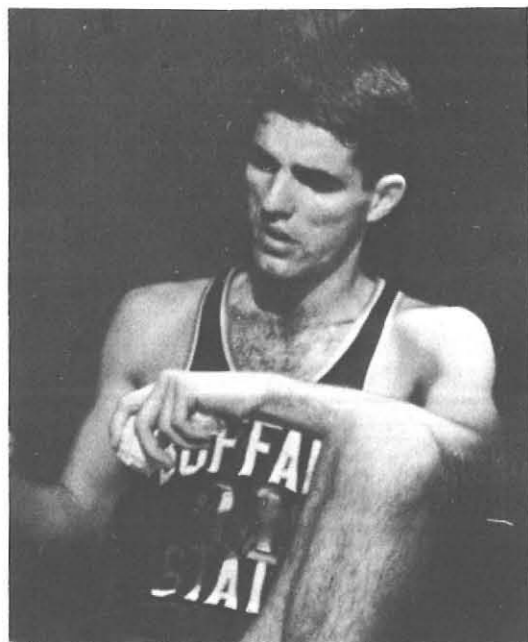
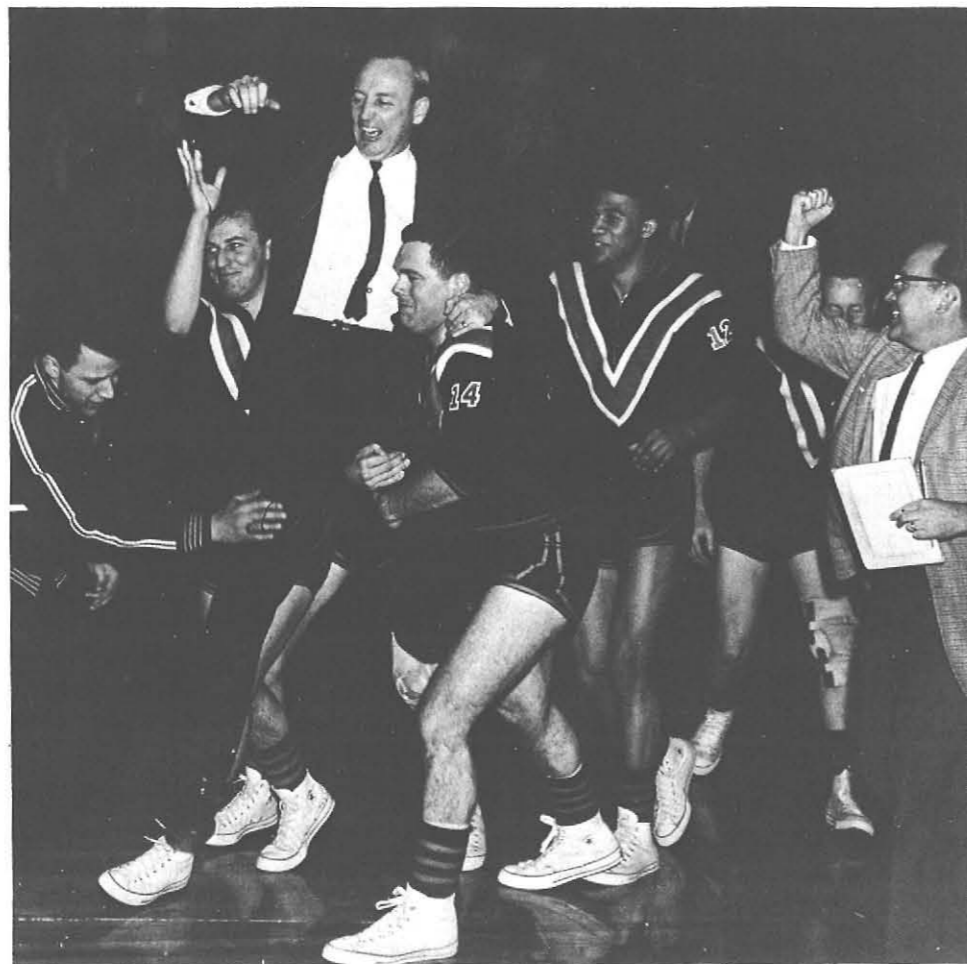

Coach Fred Hartrick's varsity soccer team was rightly honored at the close of the season as Jerry Sawicki, Bob McClelland, and Idris Esen were chosen to the 1964 SUNYAC All-Star soccer team.

However, the season proved to be one of a frustrating nature. The booters recorded a 5-4-2 log, losing three games by only one goal. In one of the ties, State was obviously the better team, while against Oswego the deadlock was appreciated.

The pre-season prediction called the Orangemen to win seven and lose four games. Coach Hartrick was even more optimistic. In a pre-season form letter pep talk sent to each prospective candidate, Mr. Hartrick suggested that the Orange could win nine or even ten contests. As extraordinary as this prediction seems now, the possibility did idealistically exist. We should have beaten Potsdam; instead, we drew a tie.

We should have also defeated RIT, but we lost after holding a three goal edge. Roberts Wesleyan beat us for the first time in history. The only game that saw State completely outclassed was the meeting with Cortland.

Considering all the if's and's, and but's, States record easily could have been 8-2-1 with but a little change in circumstances.

McClelland, a 6'1", 180 pound sophomore from Rochester, was named to the position which is considered the most important on the team—centerhalf. Bob was a quiet leader who let his playing speak for himself. The "Senator" was the Orangemen's finest all-around player and was the penalty kicker. His six goals scored made him second high on the team.

Sawicki, standing at 5'7" and 190 pounds, was nicknamed the "Blonde Bomb" because of his colorful play. He was the leading team scorer with nine goals, only one short of the school's all-time record. His blistering play and hard-nose drive suggest that he may be one of the school's all-time greats.

Idris Esen, Turkey's contribution to SUCB life, made an amazing comeback this year to stardom. His uncanny ability to "head" the ball made him a crowd pleaser, and the ever-smiling Turk deserves the honor.

Goalie Jeff Cunius is one player Coach Hartrick will really miss next year. Jeff gave 100% all the time and was personally responsible for several wins. Eddie Meyers, who along with Cunius captained the Orangemen did not score as much as the previous season but often set up McClelland and far wing Harold Morrell for scores. In the back line Chuck Thum played effective halfback and often helped fullbacks Warren Hardy and left footed Doug Turk. Dick Ther, who came along at inside and wing and Gary Rotundo, a handhitting scrapper, will be missed in the 65 edition of the booters.

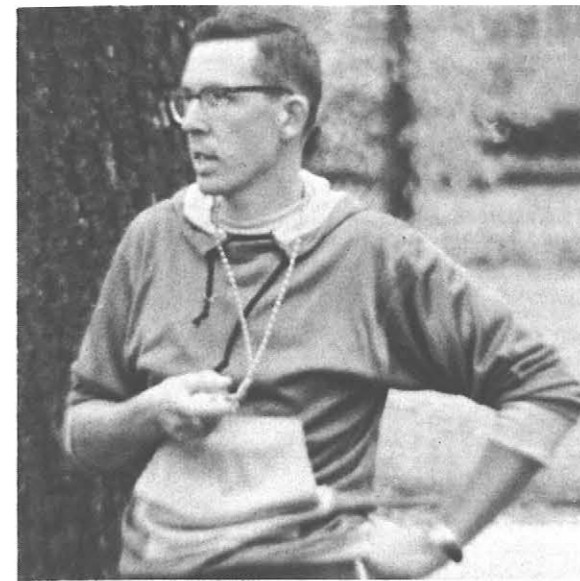

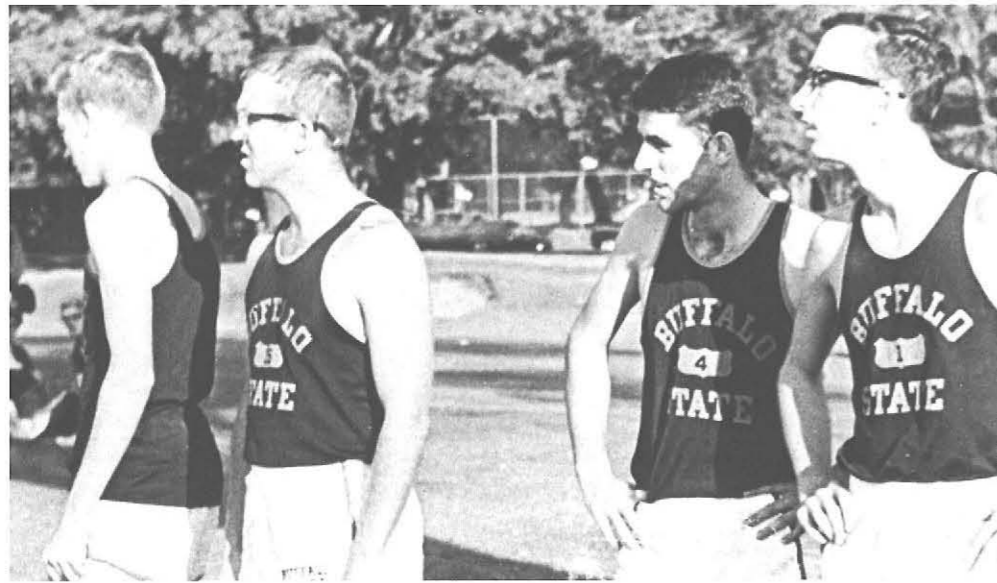

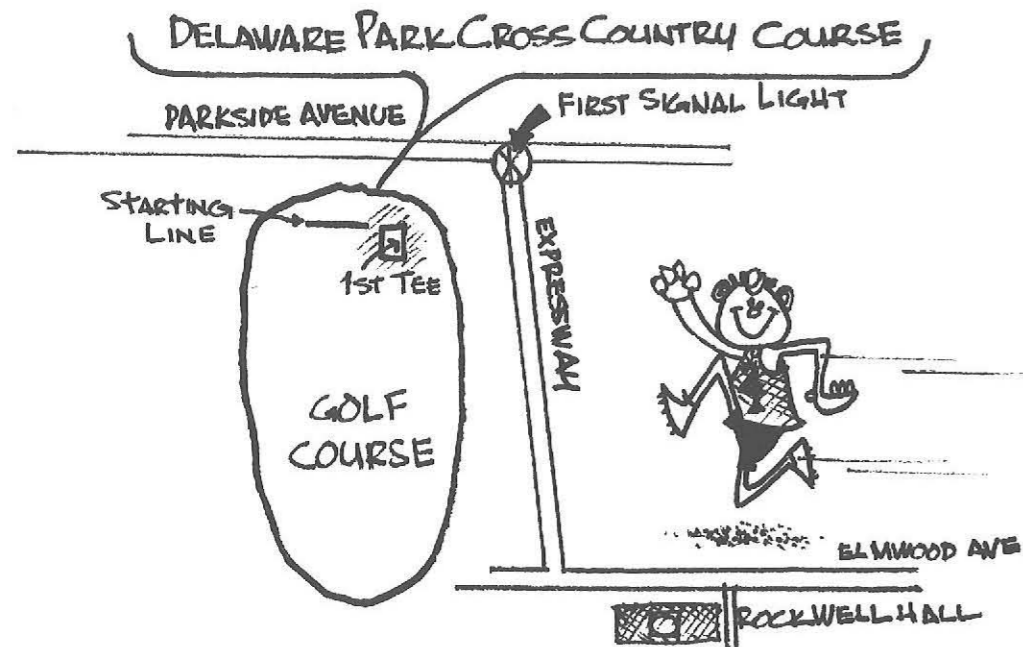

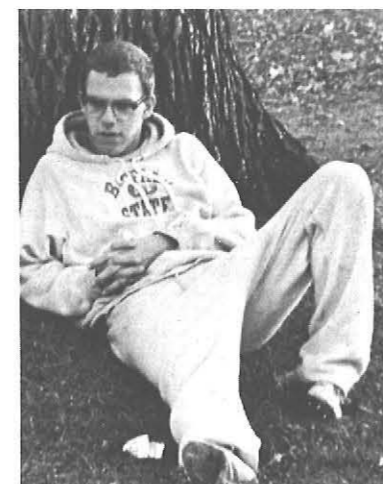

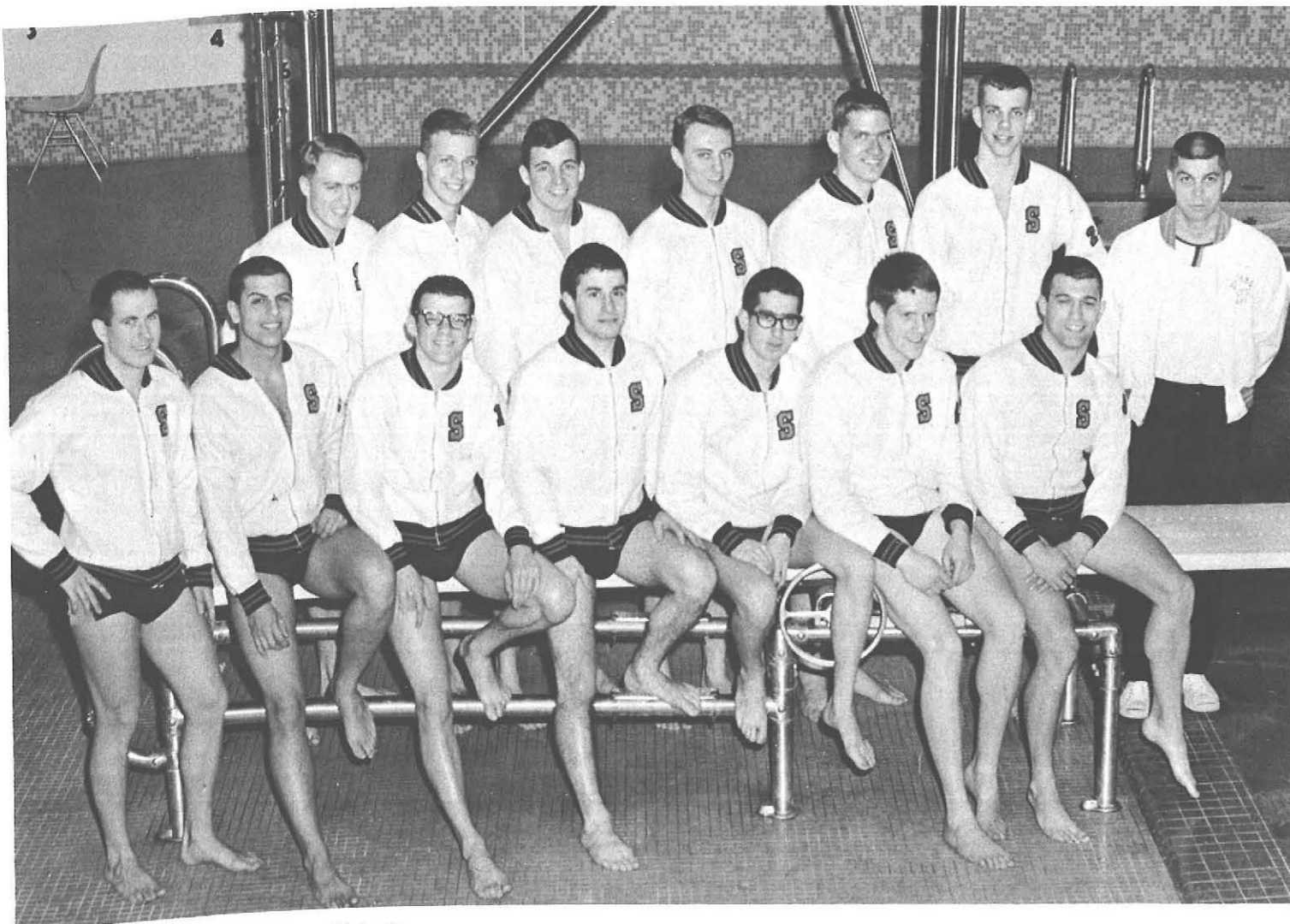
Bobby Beer, this year's record breaking runner and New York State Champion, preserves his energy prior to the start of the race.

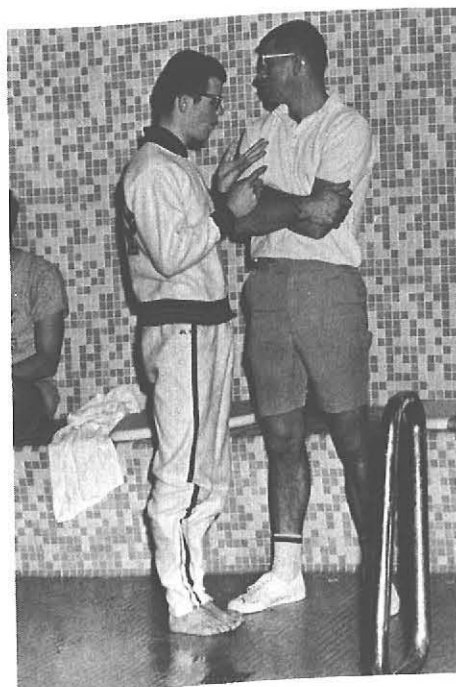

From their opening meet loss to UB, 30-65, Coach Wheeler brought his men along slowly, but expertly, until they realized their goal of getting to the nationals.

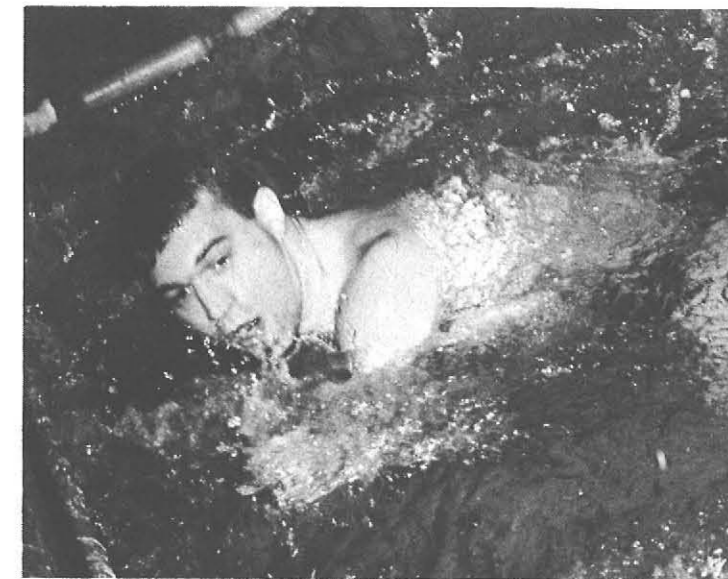

All-in-all, it was a spectacular year for the team which was not highly regarded in the beginning; and the SUCB community will sorely miss Coach Wheeler next year.



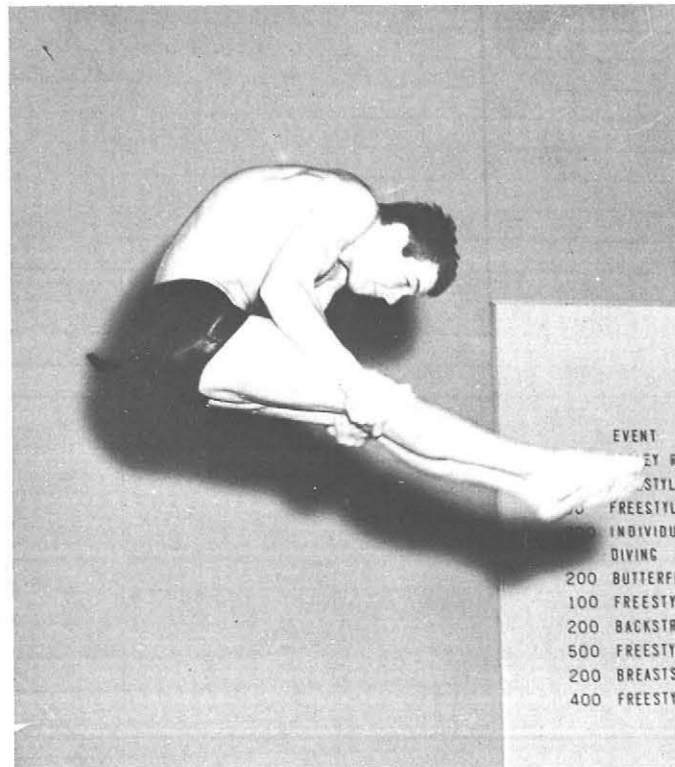

Varsity Basketball

To sum up SUCB's 1964-65 basketball season, one only has to look as far as the fifth game of the year—the annual encounter with the Niagara Purple Eagles.

Niagara had the superior height and advantage of playing on its home court, but State had a nonpareil team effort, responsible for a 63-58 triumph. As the shouts of "We beat Niagara!" echoed through the basketball world that week, everyone could not wait for the season to swing into full speed to see if the win could be repeated. Well, it was—12 more times—as the Orange wrapped up one of its best seasons in history with a 13-7 record.

The SUCB steamroller got moving into high gear right away as it crushed eight straight opponents before running out of gas against UB at the Aud. A tall Canadian quintet from Toronto visited SUCB on Dec. 1 and left highly deflated by the 84-59 State triumph. The game seemed to be a preview of things to come: State faced a huge height disadvantage; their fast-break proved to be a potent weapon; Jim Roll was the team leader; and Charlie Mancuso was the leading scorer.

Three days later, Cortland hosted the Orangemen and were sorry as State steamrolled to a 77-66 win. SUCB's third straight victory saw Joe LoTempio in the driver's seat, flattening the Raiders 81-77. LoTempio scored a career high of 33 points in the hard fought game.

Looking forward to the next game with Niagara, Coach MacAdam's crew did not play up to par and were glad of a 59-56 margin in their favor against Oneonta. Charlie Mancuso broke the New Gym record in rebounding with 15 in this contest.

After the Niagara team effort, Benny Bluman came off the bench to rejuvenate the Orangemen to an 81-67 smashing of Waterloo. It was number 6 for the Statesmen.

Number 7 could have been a lot harder, but Lawrence Tech's contingent could do little to stop SUCB's fast-break tactics. Using a 40% shooting night, State powered its way over the Detroiters, 77-50. Mike Urbanski provided the steamroller with its spark in the form of 15 points. Injuries had hit the squad hard, and the win was very welcome.

A heart-gladdening 78-76 beating of Fredonia followed on January 14 as Chas. Mancuso hit for 33 points, his high for the year. The UB Bulls finally stopped the steamroller in its tracks after eight straight with a 92-66 win. Their sheer height was too formidable for the machine to overcome. SUCB built an early lead but faltered under the Bulls' charge.

Co-captain Mancuso raced the team's motor in revenge against Ithaca for a 74-61 stamping. Chas. hit for a 31 total after a 7-for-12 field goal shooting exhibition in the first half.

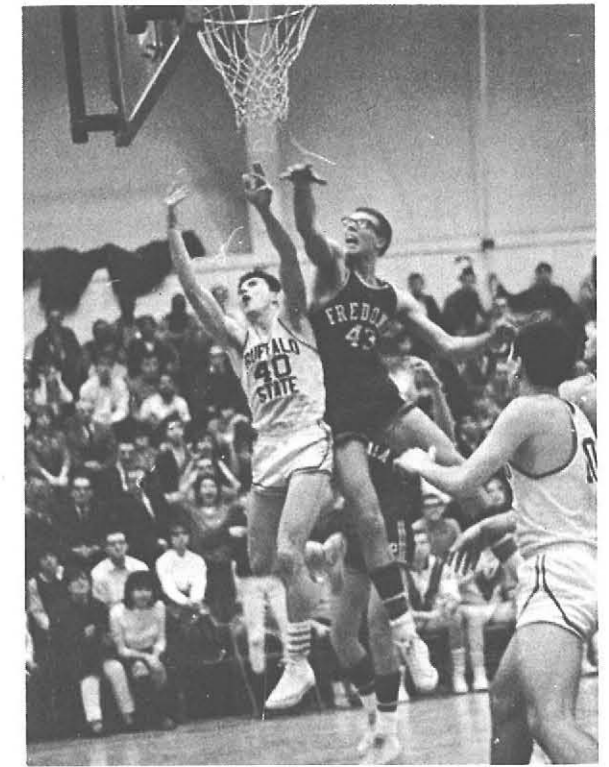
RIT challenged the roller next and left town with a 91-68 shellacking. Jimmy Roll tallied 20 and Mancuso 29 to drive the crusher further. SUCB's record then stood at 10-1.

Plattsburgh snared the game of the tournament contenders with a 110-97 victory. Potsdam made State's annual northern road trip easier by dropping a 67-65 contest. Roll's jump shot was the winning marker. Mancuso was the leading scorer in Western New York at this point with a 20.8 average, and State's first five men were within the top 15 in the area.

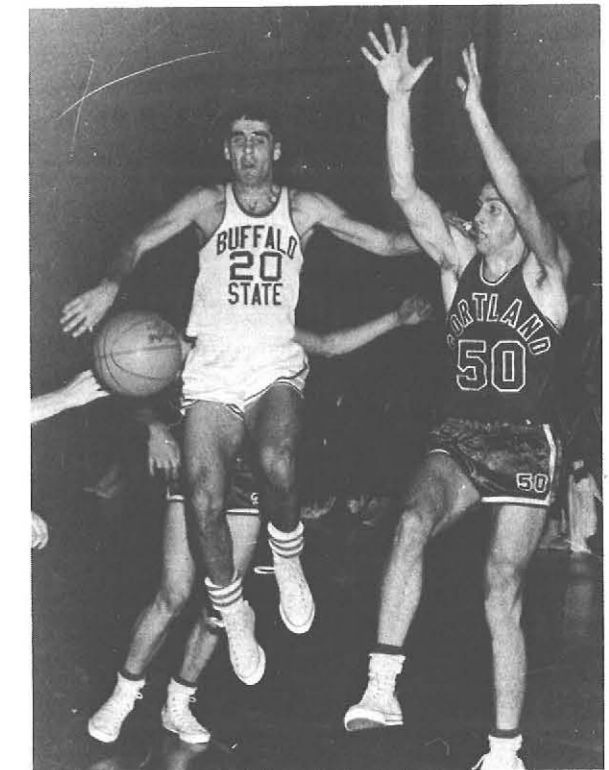
Mancuso continued his scoring rampage with 29 points and Mike Urbanski added 20 as New Paltz fell by the wayside, 92-72. This was the first home appearance for Norb Moch, Jim Seals, and Lyle Starkweather; and they each gave a good accounting of themselves.

Mancuso's 23 points, Roll's rebounding, and Rich Degnan's hustle could not overcome the partial refs at Alfred, and State lost 104-97. State then wacked Geneseo; but it ran out of gas with the last four games, dropping contests at Gannon, Oswego, Brockport, and at home against UB.

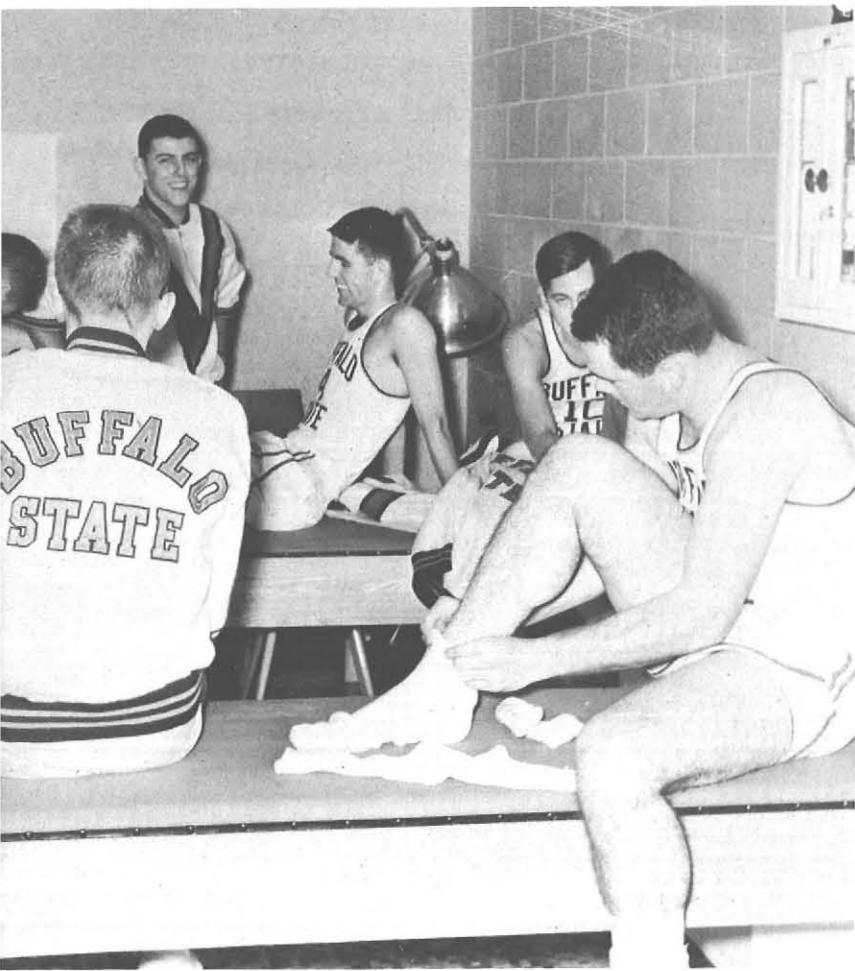

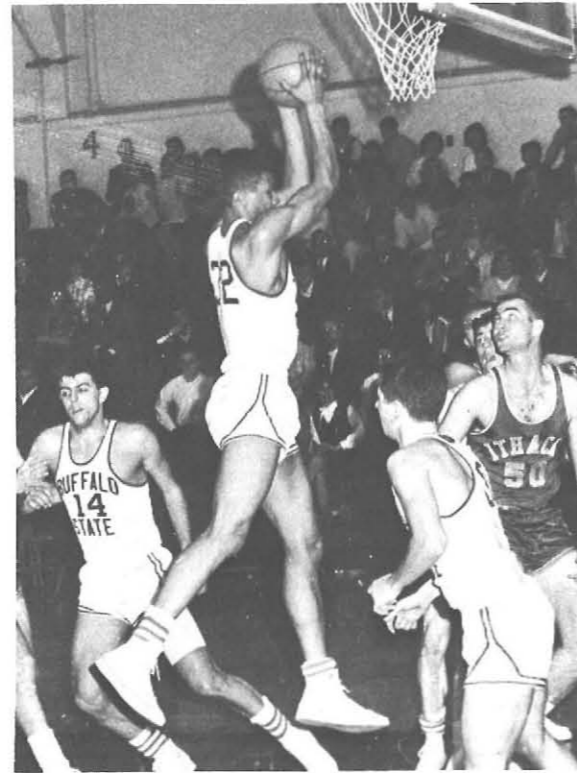
Jim Roll battles Fredonia's Segerdahl as Bluman looks on. State won the thriller 76-75.



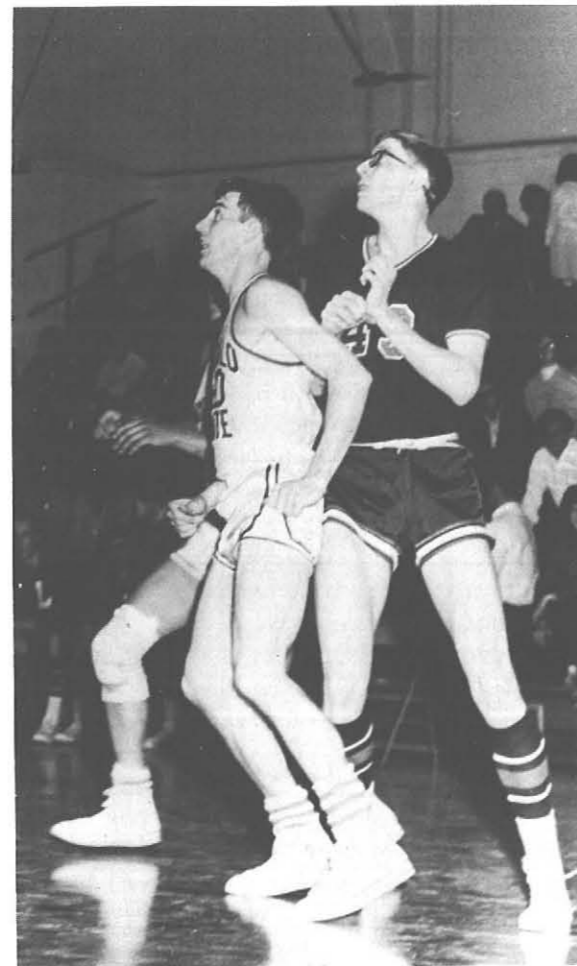

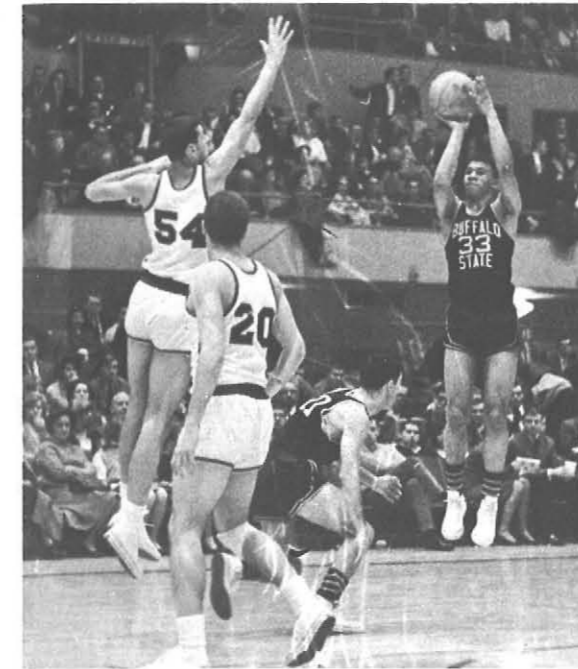

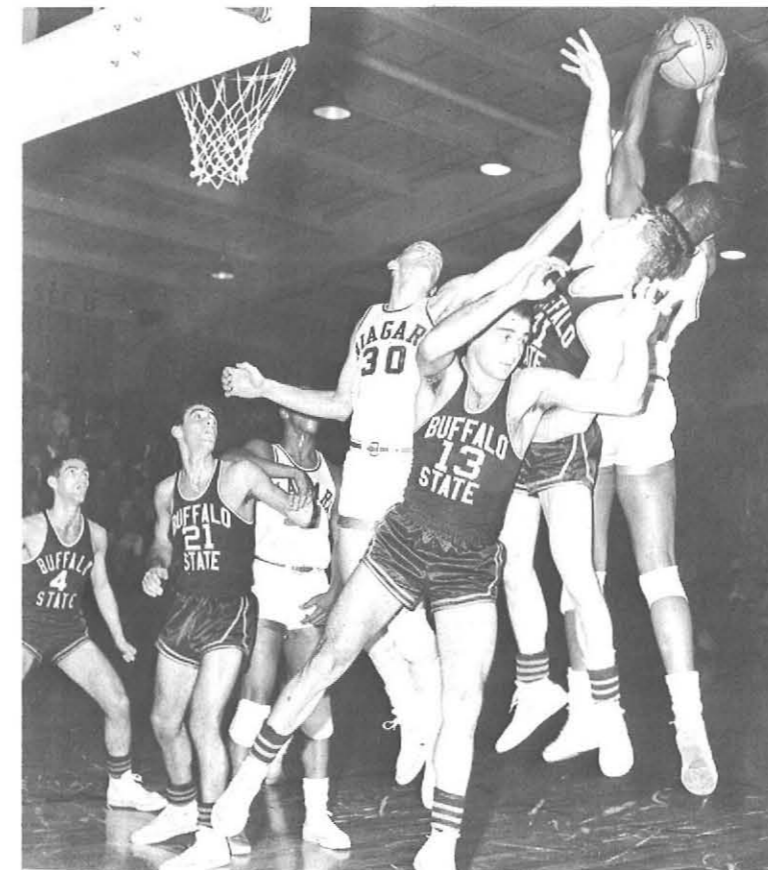
Leapin' Lum Smith snares a rebound against Ithaca as Degnan and Bluman prepare for the fast break.



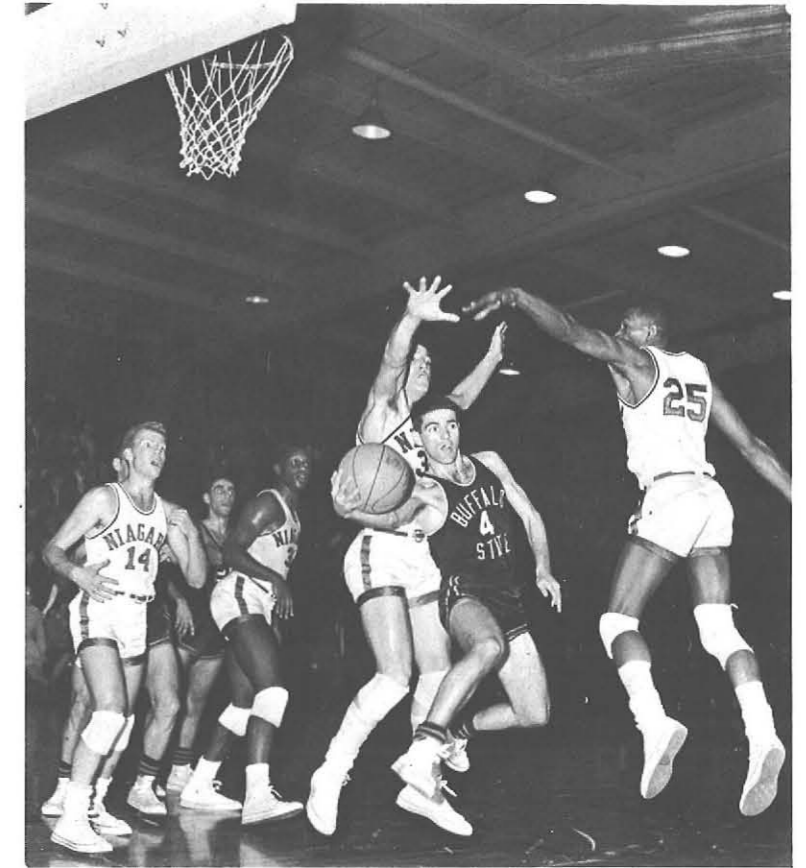

Freshman Basketball

Coach Don O'Brien's frosh basketballers enjoyed the most productive season in freshman history. The sons-of-O'Brein finished with a 13-7 card, including victories over St. Bonaventure, Alfred, Gannon and UB.

The Baby Orange really blossomed after a nerve wracking 84-77 defeat to Canisius. At the semester break, the squad was fresh off victories over Ithaca and RIT. Their record stood at a mediocre 7-6 and Bona Brown Indians were next on the card. The upsurging quintet behind the all around play of Paul Thompson defeated the big college netters.

The next night the tired freshman beat the previously unbeaten Alfred team 63-62 as Dennie Belote's jumper with only four seconds left went in. State then blasted Bryant & Stratton 90-64 before winning their sixth straight against the Gannon Golden Knights 76-75.

Oswego interrupted the streak but not for long. SUCB walloped Brockport 84-74 and prepared for UB in the finale. Belote again stepped into the heroes seat to sink a foul shot to give State a 63-62. Here were the starters:

Paul Thompson—the best all-around ball player on the team. He averaged 17.6 points per game and 11.4 rebounds.

Dave Saunders—second high scorer, 12.5 and one of the top defensive players.

Charlie Davis—second leading rebounder and right behind Saunders in scoring.

Dennie Belote—stepped into a starting position second semester and provided much clutch play.

Track

This year's varsity track team was comprised of a mere seven men. These few athletes, all of which are returning next year, amassed a very creditable number of points, however.

Roger Hauck highlighted the season by setting a school record of 4:15.4 for the mile at the NCAA Eastern Regionals. This was accomplished less than five weeks after Roger placed 19th in the grueling 26 mile Boston Marathon. He also won the 2 mile event in record time at the UB Invitational early in the season.

Jerry Burison scored well as he competed in five or six events per meet including the sprints, high jump, broad jump, hurdles, and javelin. Co-captain Wayne Rose reduced his sophomore mile time to 4:35 and tripled by running the 440 and the 2 mile. Durie Burns high jumped an amazing 6'10" in a practice meet during the indoor season and should turn out to be a great asset when he becomes eligible next year.

This year's freshman squad turned out to be the greatest in the school's history. Herb Tolbert turned out to be a jack-of-all-events man as he scored a remarkable 22½ points in the season finale. Along with Herb, Mike Collopy, Denny Sheehan, and Jim Hasset ran well this spring, breaking four different relay standards.

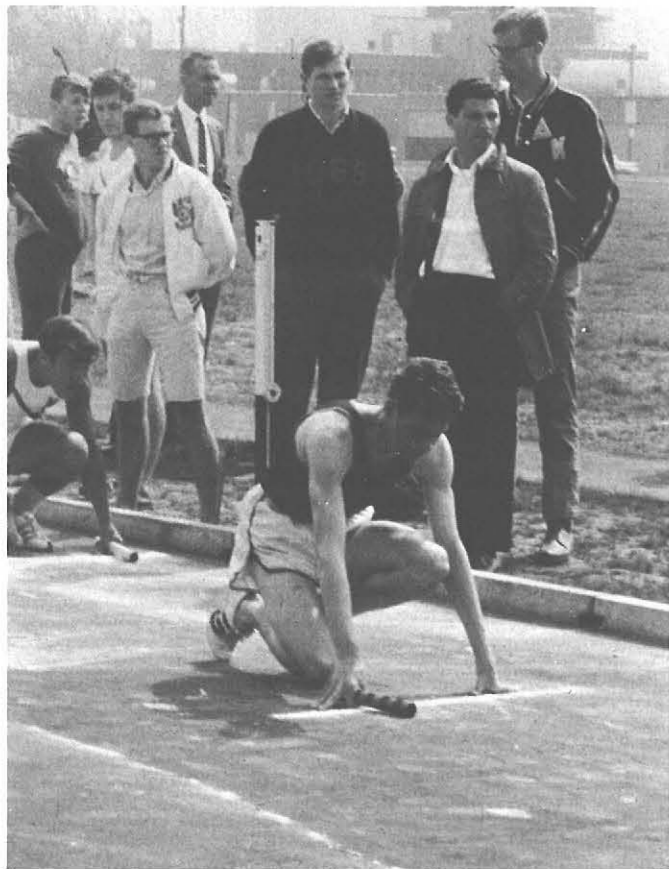

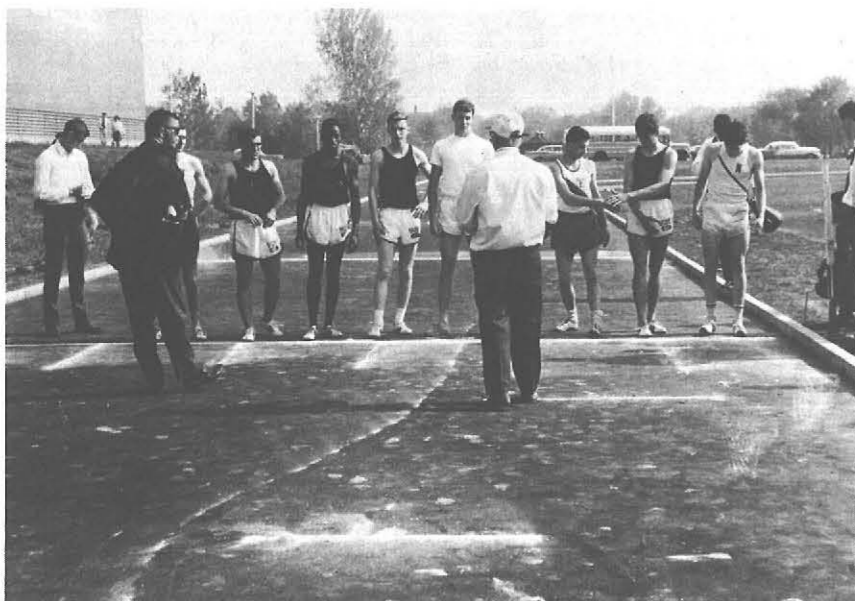

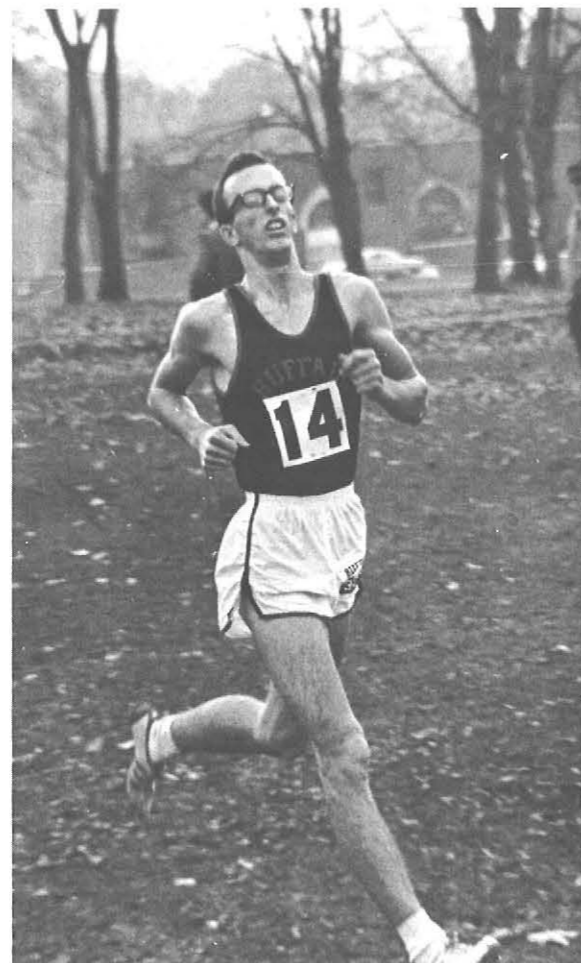

By mid-season the Coach Hartrick-directed team had five sophomores, two seniors and two juniors in the starting lineup.

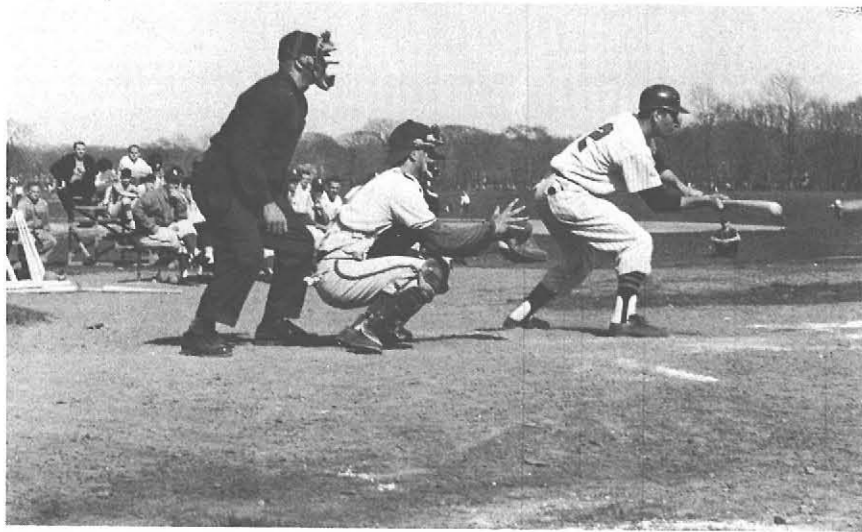

This latter fact can be brought to point when we look at State's second place finish in the tough Western New York Conference and only three victories in State Conference play.

Next season's group will certainly miss shortstop Jack Ioannone who is sure to rank as one of the all-time greats at SUCB. Jack led the team in hitting, .444, runs scored, doubles, triples, hits, stolen bases and runs batted in. To cap these fine efforts Jack was named to the All-Conference team, for the second year and was also named to the All-Western New York dream team, one of the first times a State Athlete had been so honored.

Coach Hartrick has much to look forward to next year with the returning lettermen and another fine crop of rookies.



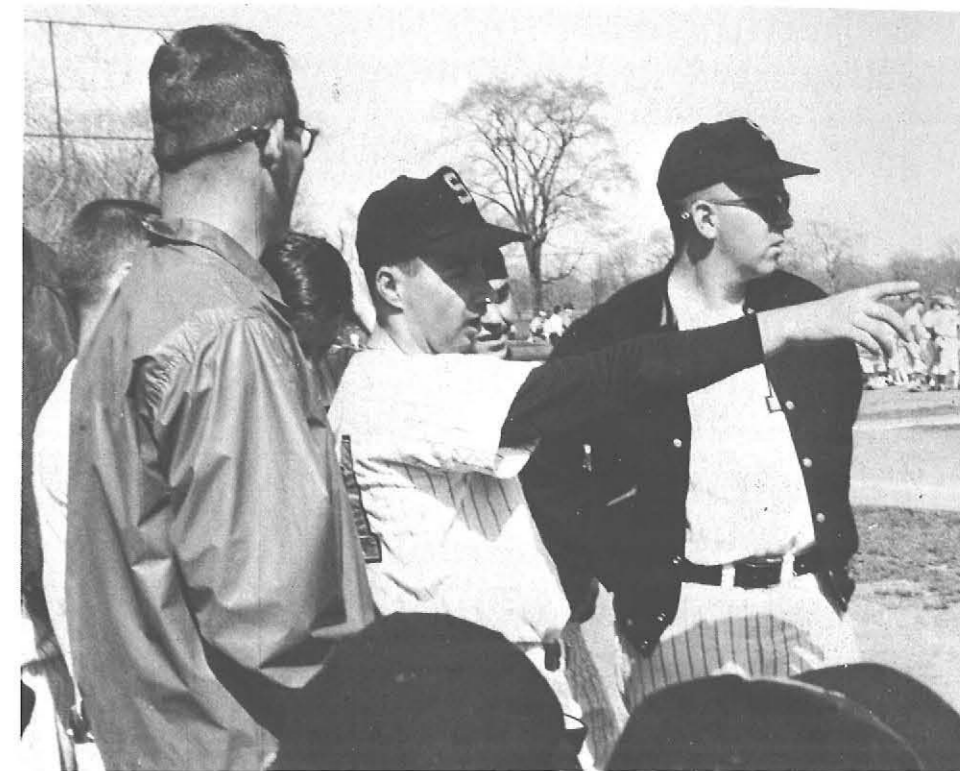

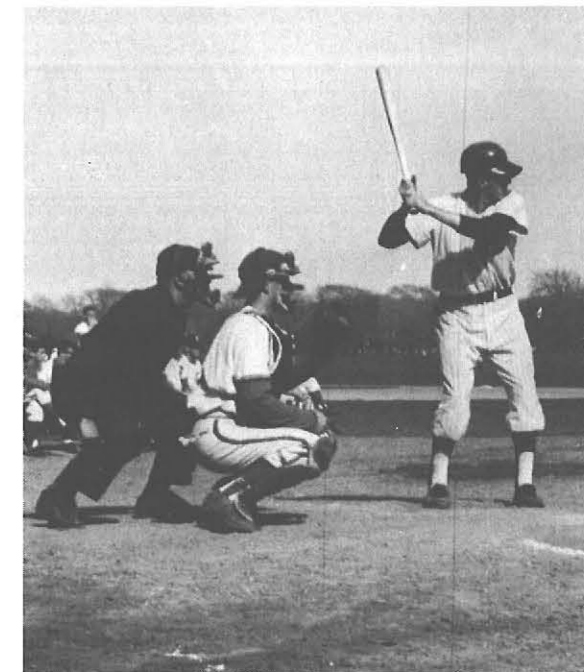

The 1964-65 edition of the varsity tennis team was one of the most potent in recent years.

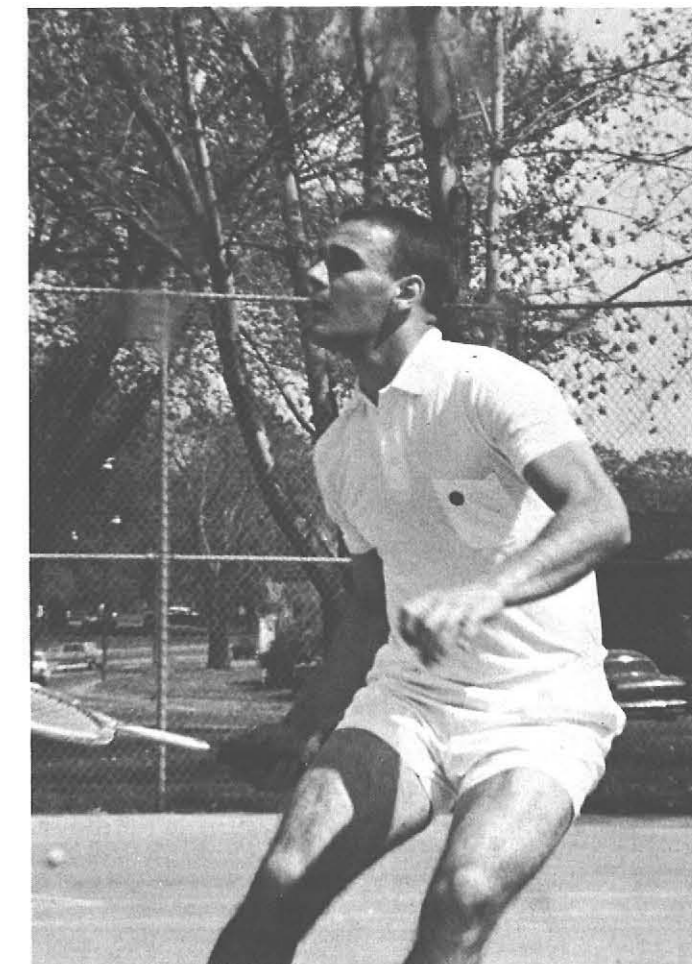

SUCB finished second in this meet and could have won if consistent-winner Roger Hauck was not busy winning two running events at a track meet.

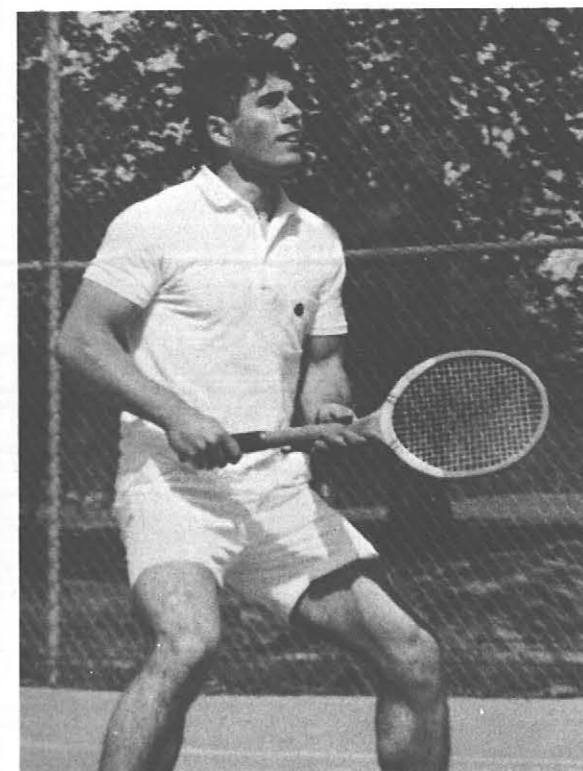

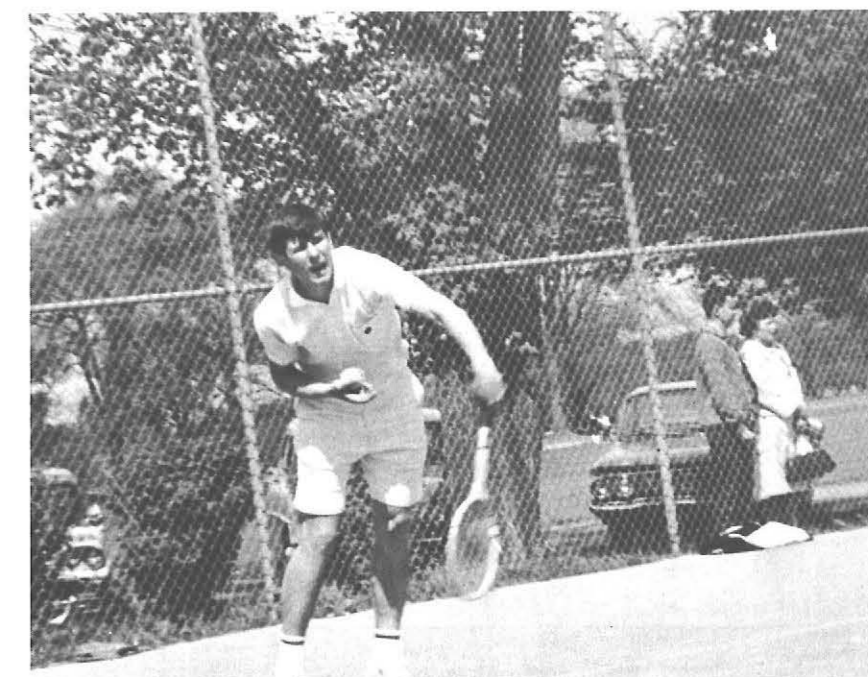
Jim Lynch sends a lashing forehand to his opponent. Lynch was number 1 singles in the State Conference.

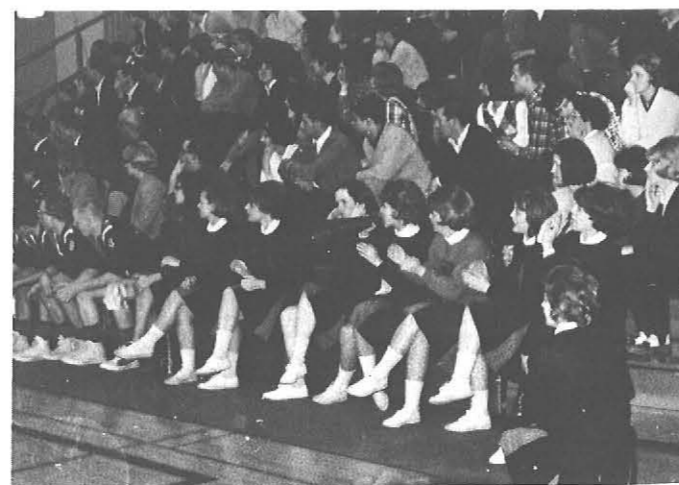

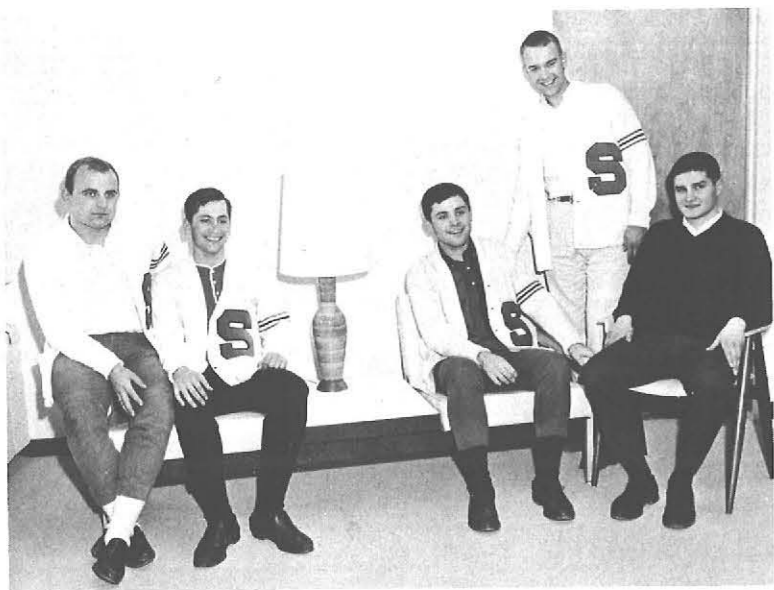
Men's Athletic Association

Students may gain membership to the board or executive committee through direct election in the spring election held at the Annual MAA Banquet.

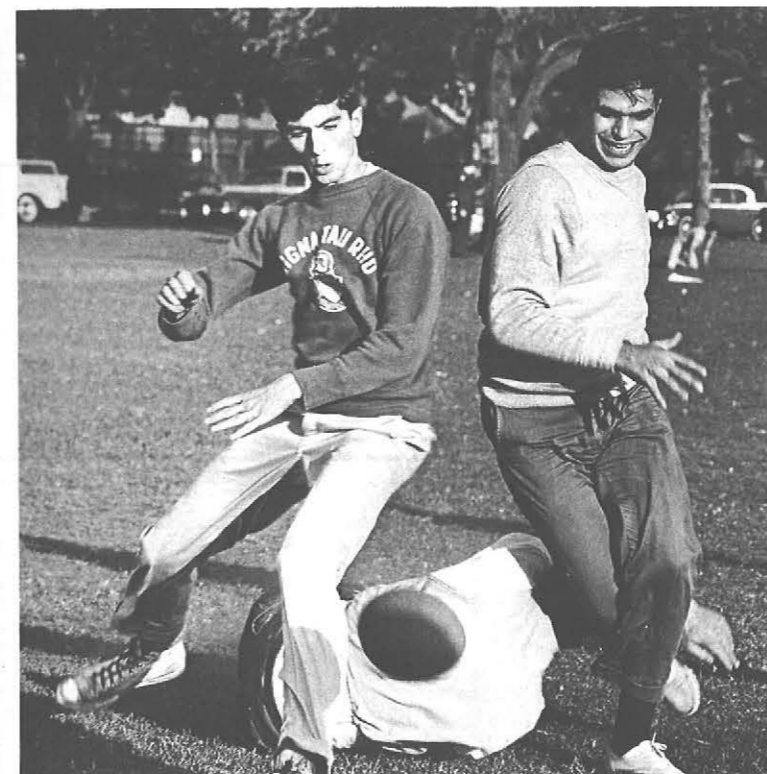

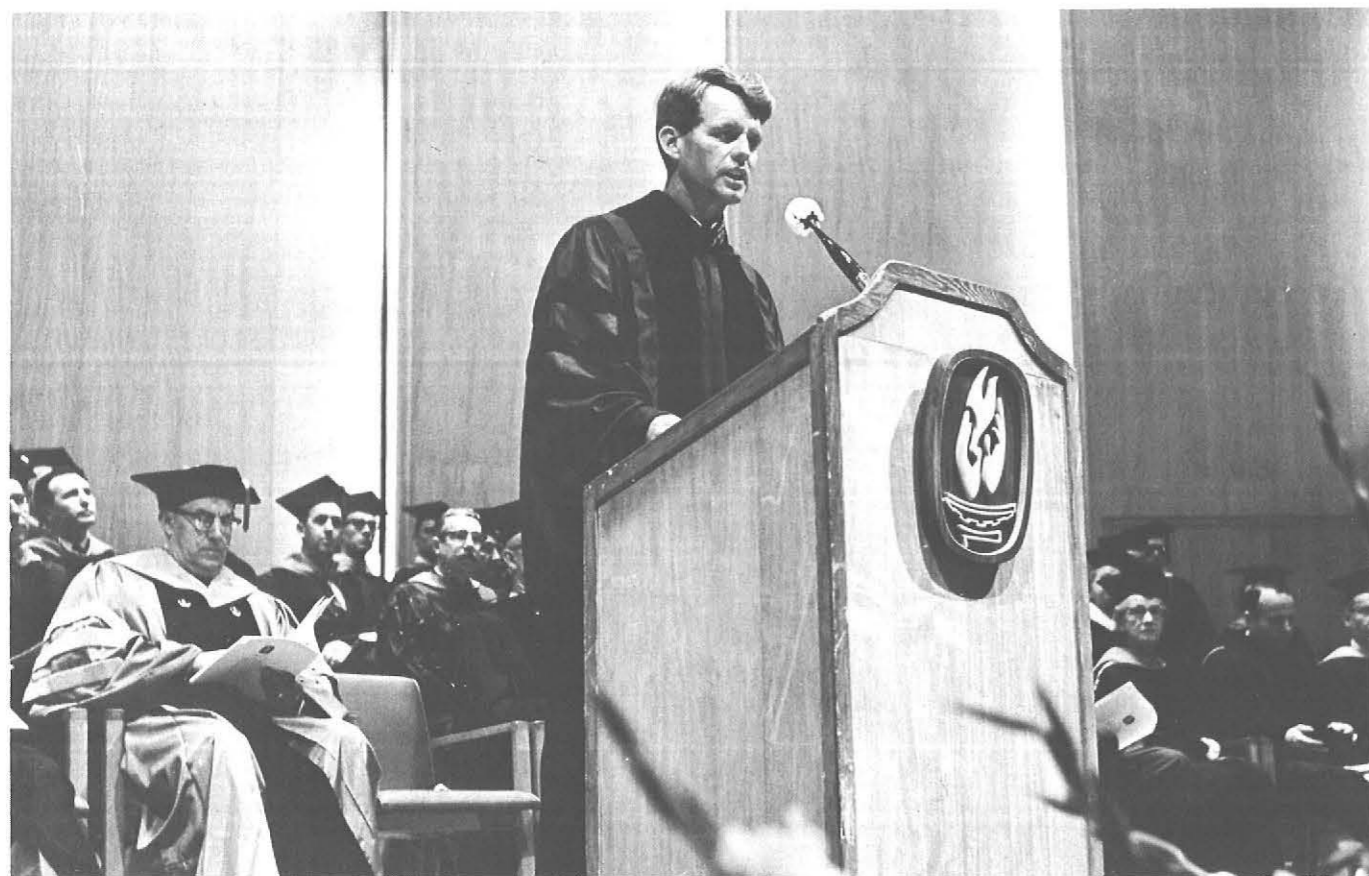

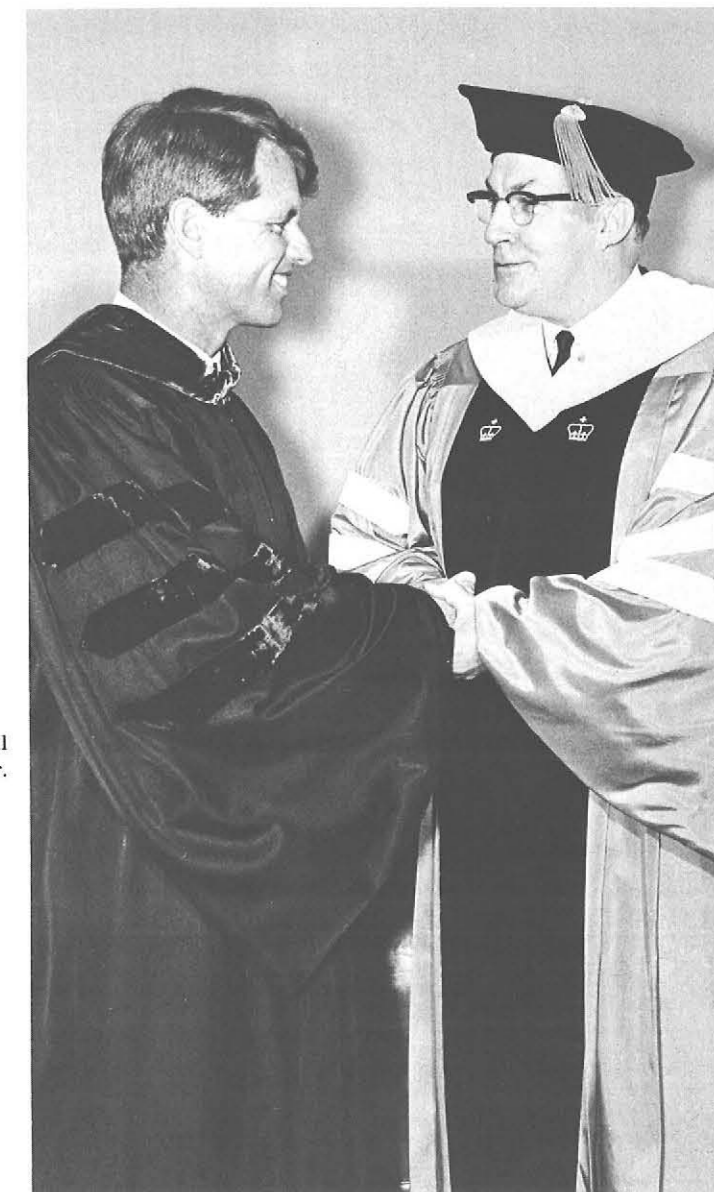
