

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within
Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks
from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and a half story with side gable roof. Full-width hip roof
porch. Square supports, paneled rail with cut-out balustrade. Pair of semi-hexagonal bays. Rectangular leaded glass windows.
Paneled apron. Bay to north has center glass paneled door.
Gabled second floor bay has tri-part 1/1 window. Entablature window heads. Gable has rectangular multi-light
SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 windows. Hip roof dormer

ARCHITECT: under eave. Rectangular
multi-light window. North side has gabled entrance porch. Glass paneled door with sidelights.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Plain frame residence with Craftsman details applied. Crescent Avenue is the longest
curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from
Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans
for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current
form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near
Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins
and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special
directness toward the town."
