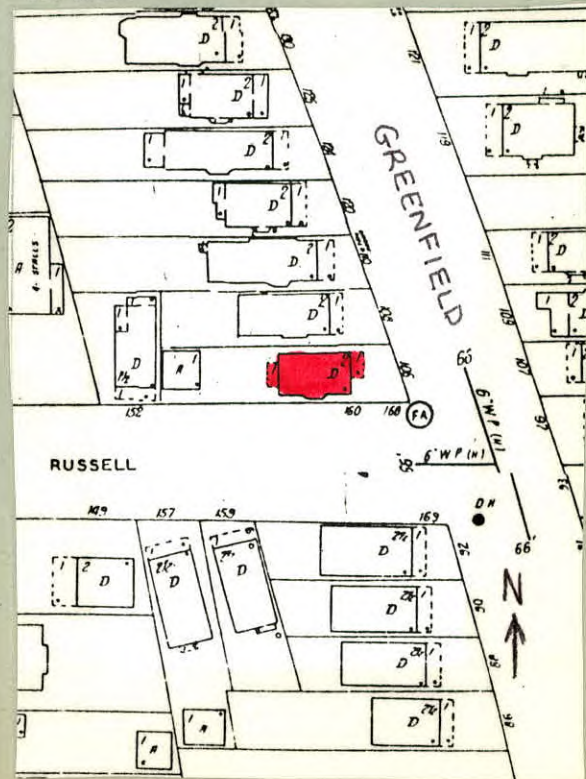

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Partial width flat roof porch with extending eaves. End Doric columns support entablature. Spindle balustrade. Glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by square leaded window. Left bay first and second floor has three-part window. Double hung 1/1 lights. Second floor has lighted double sash porch door. End corner boards. Band of trim below

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909
ARCHITECT: pedimented gable. Shingled. Three part 1/1 light window. Plain window surround. Hip roof dormer
BUILDER: with three-part 1/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A plain frame gabled residence. Russell Avenue extends from Parkside Avenue to Greenfield Street. It was laid out in a map of 1886, paralleling the northern border of the lands of Washington Russell, after whom the street was named. However it was early 1889 before Russell Avenue was deeded to the city. While this particular street does not appear in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," Olmsted felt cross streets would allow easy access to major thoroughfares and to the park, and he did include similar cross streets such as Jewett Avenue in his early plans.
