DIVISIONS



CONTINUING EDUCATION AND SUMMER SESSIONS DIVISION

Concerned with extending the opportunities of higher education to the general public, the Division of Continuing Education offers a variety of courses through which adults may attain only the satisfaction of their own intellectual growth or go on to earn a bachelor's degree. The Continuing Education Division also informs the public of many community problems through the presentation of workshops, short courses, research and consultation services. To promote aesthetic and intellectual growth of the community, the college sponsors lectures, dramas, concerts, and special events.

The Summer Sessions Division offers over 350 courses during June, July and August for undergraduate students who wish to accelerate and for those graduates continuing their education. In 1967, nearly 4,000 students from other colleges as well as our own State College, took advantage of this opportunity.

EDUCATION DIVISION

Responsibility for the education of children requires that teachers have the best education our culture can offer. The curriculum offered to students in the elementary education division provides its graduates with abilities to meet the challenge of this responsibility. The course of study for the secondary education student emphasizes subject matter in math, art, science and social studies.






For the first time all students in the various divisions will be able to participate at the campus school on all levels of education from nursery to high school. The school provides education for children in this age range and opportunities for college students to observe and participate.

The new facilities at the Rees Street building far outshine the dark halls of Bacon. Each room has an observation room, enclosed project areas for student teachers to work in with small groups or special individuals, complete facilities for the Exceptional Education Division, a new library and gym.

The Campus School provides a unique opportunity and experience for all who attend it.

CAMPUS SCHOOL DIVISION





For the child who is handicapped, the largest problem in life is living as nearly normal a life as possible. With the assistance and guidance of specially trained teachers this exceptional child has a better chance to develop into a useful citizen.

The Exceptional Children Education Division trains people in the fields of physical handicap, mental retardation, education of the deaf, speech pathology and audiology, and emotional disturbance.

Many of the college's laboratory facilities are augmented by rich offerings in nearby hospitals and centers which provide practical experience in connection with the theoretical areas of the Division's Program.


EXCEPTIONAL EDUCATION DIVISION

The Arts and Science Division is divided into three academic divisions: Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, and Mathematics and Science. The Arts and Humanities include the Departments of English, Foreign Language, Health and Physical Education, Music, Philosophy, and Speech and Theater Arts. The Social Sciences include the Departments of History, Geography, Political Science-Economics, Psychology, and Sociology-Anthropology. The Mathematics and Science area includes the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Mathematics, Physics and General Science.

A Bachelor of Arts degree is offered with majors in the various departments and is described in detail under the Liberal Arts Curriculum.

The Departments of English, Foreign Language, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies provide content courses for programs of study under the Bachelor of Science of Education degree for the certification of secondary school teachers. These programs are listed under the Secondary Education Division.

In addition, all of the Arts and Sciences Departments offer a wide variety of elective courses which may be selected by students in all Divisions of the College.




ARTS AND SCIENCE DIVISION

INDUSTRIAL ARTS EDUCATION DIVISION

The American society has been characterized as being "highly technological". The role of the Industrial Arts Education Division is to prepare teachers who are able to develop in youth an understanding of technology and its impact on their lives. Although the newer trends in science education stress the theoretical aspects of science, it is the application of scientific knowledge—the technology—that is rapidly changing the lives of everyone. Industrial Arts Education draws upon the technologies for its instructional content, and one of its main goals is directed toward developing technological literacy for all.

The Industrial Arts Education Division at Buffalo State is one of the largest and most widely recognized in the world. Its faculty and facilities are equaled at no other institution. Graduates of this program receive a Bachelor of Science degree. These teachers are in great demand in the state, the nation, and for foreign assignments.





ART EDUCATION DIVISION

The Art curriculum, for the preparation of teachers is the largest such program in the world. It develops expressive and creative powers, ability to teach and a knowledge of the use of art in many aspects of living. It includes a broad program of general studies and provides opportunity for individual specialization. Upton Hall, the home of the Art Education Division, contains specially designed equipment, a research library and extensive display facilities to enrich learning.

One of the fine offerings of the Art Education Division is the foreign study program in Siena, Italy, in which students experience another culture and live in the area where the Renaissance was born.


Career opportunities in Home Economics are so varied that the home economist may choose the area where she can best utilize her talents and interests to professionally serve society most effectively.

With this in mind, the Home Economics Division now offers non-teaching degrees in Dietetics, and in Home Economics with a concentration in Foods and Nutrition, Clothing and Textiles, or Family Life.

To climax four years of study for a Bachelor of Science Degree in Home Economics Education, the teacher-to-be spends five weeks at the college's Home Management House. Here she gains experience in the social and economic management of a home.

HOME ECONOMICS EDUCATION DIVISION







The Graduate Division invites all upper classmen intending to pursue graduate studies to stop in and discuss the possibilities of a graduate program.


GRADUATE DIVISION


1966-1967 was the year of two Presidents: Dr. Paul G. Bulger and Dr. Houston T. Robinson.

Dr. Bulger served as the Chief Administrator of the State University College from 1959 to 1966, and was instrumental in the new building program now underway at this college.


In January of 1967 Dr. Robison's appointment as acting President began—Dr. Robison has been at Buffalo State since 1949.
