

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Queen Anne styling. Side gable roof. Partial width porch. Glass paneled door with leaded sidelights and transom. Second floor porch door, multi-light. Three story tower with conical roof. Square-headed 1/1 light windows. Pedimented gabled dormer. Paired 1/1 light windows. Gable ends have Palladian windows. SIGNIFICANCE

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simple, later form of Queen Anne style. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
