

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's
Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and a half story American Four Square with Craftsman styling. Hip roof with extending eaves. Exposed rafter eaves. Full-width hip roof porch with exposed rafter tails under eave. Tapered square supports with projecting vertical bands decorating. Arched spans between supports. Plain rail. Double sash, 10-light porch SIGNIFICANCE door flanked by 2/2 windows with storm windows, 4
19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1912 vertical lights over 1. Second floor has a set of
ARCHITECT: three-part windows situated under roof eave. 4 vertical lights over 1 storm windows. Hip roof dormer with exposed rafter tails under extending
eave. Pair double hung windows. Trellised entrance
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: porch on south side. Glass paneled door with sidelights.
A good example of the most common vernacular form of the Prairie style with Craftsman styling applied. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside."
Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
