Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Front-facing gable roof. Partial-width porch has Ionic fluted columns on rough cut, regular stone base. Entablature with dentils under cornice. Glass paneled door with sidelights. Pilaster strips support entablature door head with dentils under cornice. Tri-part first floor window, single light with transom center window with 1/1 sidelights. Bowed first SIGNIFICANCE floor bay windows, with roof, 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1907 dentils under cornice. Second floor has center paired elliptical windows with pilaster ARCHITECT: ____ strips supporting entablature with swag motif in frieze. Pair of bowed bay windows. Entablature with dentils. BUILDER: Pedimented gable, shingled, has Palladian window.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Dentils in raking cornice.

Excellent example of the Colonial Revival style, with its classicizing ornamentation. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
