

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Craftsman styling. Hip roof with extended eaves. Exposed rafter tails with rounded ends. Fullwidth flat roof porch. Extending eaves. Porch pilasters have column elaboration. Six-light wood paneled door. Three-part window, 8/1 center with 4/1 sides. Second floor lighted double SIGNIFICANCE sash porch door. Tri-part window, 8/1 center with 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1911 4/1 sides. Hip roof ARCHITECT: dormers. Exposed rafter tails under eave. 8/1

ARCHITECT: ______ tails under eave. 8/1 light windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: An American Four Square form with Craftsman styling. Summit Avenue is a truncated northsouth street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
