

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
Two and a half story frame residence with front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch has tapered square doric supports. Stick balustrade. Arched span between supports. Modillions under roof eave. Glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by small square leaded window. First floor single- SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1908 hexagonal bay with 1/1 windows. Pair lighted ARCHITECT: double sash porch doors. Pedimented gable with brackets under projection. Pair 1/1 windows BUILDER: with entablature window surround.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical frame, gabled residence with Craftsman styling applied to porch. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
