

Two story American Four Square. Hip roof. Hipped dormers with four six pane windows on west and south sides of house. Multi-paned door leads out to open porch on the second story. Open porch across front of house with brick piers. House is brick veneered.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Good example of the American Four Square style as it was built in this neighborhood. This house is located on Parkside Avenue, a street conceived by FLO around 1873 as part of a residential "suburb" adjacent to Delaware Park. This suburb was called "The Parkside" by Olmsted and appears on an 1876 map drawn by him as a proposed area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of the park. Parkside Avenue was actually created by the City of Buffalo in 1888. The Street very closely follows Olmsted's original plan maintaining the picturesque character that he envisioned for the streets surrounding the park.
