Building is situated on a standard sized city building lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register.

Two story American Four Square. Hip roof with three gabled dormers on the south, north and west facades. Dormers have a plain vergeboard with purlins and two double-hung windows with diamond window panes. Modillionlike brackets under eaves of roof. This suburb was called "The Parkside" by Olmsted and appears on an 1876 map drawn by him as a proposed area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of the park.
