

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with side gable roof. Partial-width flat roof porch, square supports, stick balustrade. Nine-light wood door flanked by single light windows. Three part first floor window, 16/1 lights. Second story windows have arched tracery in top light. Two story pedimented gabled bay. First floor 4part window each 16/1 lights. Modillion blocks under SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1910 Pedimented gable dormer.

ARCHITECT:	Arched tracery in top light of windows. Flat roof
	full-width enclosed porch on north side. End
BUILDER:	paneled pilaster strips flank single light windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Frame residence with asymmetrical plan and Colonial Revival style details. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
