

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Fullwidth hip roof porch has Ionic columns, spindle balustrade. Glass paneled door with transom flanked on one side by rectangular stained glass window. First floor single light window with leaded transom. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay with 1/1 windows. Paired <u>SIGNIFICANCE</u> 1/1 second floor windows. Pedimented gable with eave 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1906 with entablature surround. Stick styling in top of

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A plain frame residence with simplified stick styling in gable. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
