



	17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
	Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
Two and a half story with side gable roof. Cornice end return. Pedimented entrance porch has cornice return and ogee-shaped cut-out in tympanum. Paired doric columns support entablature. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Glass paneled door with leaded sidelights. First and second floor 10/1 windows.  SIGNIFICANCE  19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1907 gable dormers with cornice end returns, 6/1 windows.  ARCHITECT: gable ends have quarter round windows.  BUILDER:	
	20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Vernacular form of the Colonial Revival style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."  21.
