

Doric columns support mtablature. Glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by hree rectangular windows. First floor single light window with eaded transom and sidelights. Second floor has a set of paired GNIFICANCE DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1906 9/1 window with 6/1 sidelights. Cornice window ARCHITECT: head. Louvre opening in top of gable. Gabled dormers on sides of building. Paired 9/1 windows. BUILDER:
ftlfAassi	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A plain residential frame whose Colonial Revival styling has been minimized due to remodeling. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, to cated between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
