

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Side gable roof with extending eaves. Full-width hip roof porch has partial-width enclosure. Pedimented entrance over stairs, cornice end returns, semi-circular cut-out in tympanum. Paired square doric supports. Lighted wood door with leaded sidelights. First floor tri-part window, leaded sidelights. Enclosed porch has paired 1/1 windows with
top border of semi-circular ARCHITECT: tracery. Second floor has 8 light double sash windows. Center windows, small rectangular 12 BUILDER: lights. Eyebrow window dormer.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A symmetrical version of Colonial Revival style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beignning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
