


Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story plain residential structure. Front facing gable roof. Full-width hip roof porch has brackets under eave. First floor has a pair of multi-light double sash doors. Second floor has 12/1 light windows. Gable has a pair of 9/1 windows. North side has gabled dormers. Shed roof entrance porch.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical Buffalo residential structure situated on a corner lot. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
