



HERE WE GO AGAIN Back To Buffalo State College
















GOOD TIMES FESTIVAL A Good Time For All


















MOONBALL A Homecoming Tradition


What's the center of the Buffalo State campus? You know, the Student Union!






Dorm Life




What's New




What's New with the Buffalo Bills?

This team showed much promise and hope for the coming season's as well as for the past one. The women's volleyball team showed great skill and dedication to a great sport. They showed how to really play the game.




MEN'S BASKETBALL


WOMEN'S BASKETBALL


GEMINI DANCE THEATER






BURCHFIELD ART CENTER






Recreational facilities include use of the indoor track, tennis courts, the pool, the weight room, the rac-

Both the intramurals and the avaliable facilities enable all students to get involved, keep in shape, and have fun all at once. The benefits are as endless as the possibilities.








THE ZOO








NIAGARA FALLS

ALBRIGHT-KNOX ART GALLERY

The Albright-Knox Art Gallery is located directly across from the Buffalo State campus on Elmwood Avenue. While many students know what it is and that parking is avaliable behind it, not many students have experienced the sights beyond its doors.

The gallery is a collection of 12,000 artworks focusing on the years since 1945. The artworks include paintings, sculpture, drawings, graphics and photography. This was the first in the United States to buy works by Picasso and Matisse. The museum's exterior comes from the same Batimore quarry that provided marble for the Washington Monument. The gallery is opened Tuesdays to Sundays excluding national holidays; while there is no entrance fee, a donation is appreciated.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society is located across Elmwood Avenue on Nottingham Court. This historical museum collection and research library covers 125 years of Niagara Frontier history. The exhibits depict the area's earliest occupation to its recent past.

The building itself, the only remaining structure from the 1901 Expo, is a Vermont marble Doric-style design patterned after the Parthenon. Since its original construction in 1901 extensions have been made. These constructions include the eastwing which houses the library and the west wing which houses the library and the west wing which houses a 250 seat auditorium.

The museum is open Tuesday through Sunday, the library is opened Wednesday through Saturday.

This broadcast was both educational and entertaing, and allowed many students to be involved in audience participation. WBNY should be commended for a great acheivement; CHEERS!




