




PIECE BY PIECE

But as the student gets everything together life becomes easier to handle. It actually becomes possible to juggle school and social lives without neglecting one or the other.










A GET TOGETHER



















Adjusting To Changes


When students first arrive at college there are many changes to become accustomed to. It is their first test of adulthood, being faced with so many new faces and situations and having to cope with all the pressures of school.


First of all many of them are homesick and most of them are "Mommy sick" once they are faced with having to wash their own clothes and cleaning up their dorm room.

Secondly, there is the roommate situation: it can be very difficult to be put in a room with someone you barely know much less be asked to live with them.


Then there is the major adjustment: classes. It can be such a radical change to come from a high school where your teachers hunt you down for assignments to total independence and responsibility.


Dorm Sweet Dorm


Take In The Sights




Fresh Start




Fashions That Catch The Eye

The Best Part Of The Week



If there is excitement, enjoyment, or just plain action then there is a happening in motion. So don't just sit there try and make some happenings for yourself because they won't happen by themselves!



humor and wit.




Go Back To The Fifties






Gemini Dance Theater


College Bowl




Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society

Take the opportunity to learn about Buffalo and have fun doing it; wander across the street to find out how our own school was established.





Albright Knox

Non-Traditional Students



The cover is a design by Rob Hillyard, a lithograph in process colors of black and orange with laminates. Throughout the book process black, in screens, is used to create shades of grey and patterning.

Senior portraits and team photos were taken by Knack and Richards Photography of Williamsville, New York. Black and white film developing is courtesy of Rob Hillyard; color film was developed both by Knack and Richards and Delaware Camera and Video.

The 240 page book is one of 1000 copies printed.
