

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo. 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story American Four Square with Craftsman influence. Hip roof. Full-width porch has extending eaves and gable over stairs. Bargeboard with curved ends. Curvilinear brackets support gable. Square supports with arched braces support lintel. Porch proper has paired square supports. Lighted wood door flanked by pair of 16/1 windows. First floor 4-part window has SIGNIFICANCE 8/1 light windows. Second 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 floor boxed bay has center 8/1 window with 12-light ARCHITECT: \_ side windows. Paired 8/1 second floor windows.

BUILDER: Hip roof dormer has a pair of 12 light rectangular windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical American Four Square with Craftsman styling in porch and window treatment. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
