

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.	
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Queen Anne style. Asymmetrical form. Full- width porch, hip roof, with paired square doric supports. Small stick balustrade. Glass and wood paneled door. 1/1 first floor window. Hip roof second floor has three 1/1 windows. Stucco gab with decorative half-timbering in top of gable has pair of square 20 light windows with pediment-shaped lintel decorated with center SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1891 button motif. North side	
ARCHITECT: has first floor hip roof bay leading to two-story	
tower with conical roof and finial. Small brackets BUILDER: under roof eave. Top of tower has long rectangular 18 light windows.	
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical Queen Anne style	
with its asymmetrical form, use of towers and variation in exterio	or
materials. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colv Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of	in
"The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street	
were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of	
five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
