



str cur Hum Olm pla cur by in Ave	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A plain frame residential ucture with minimal details. Crescent Avenue is the longest vilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from boldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on sted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's ns for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its rent form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city five different owners over a span of five years, beginning 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent nue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, lowing Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street tead with special directness toward the town."
