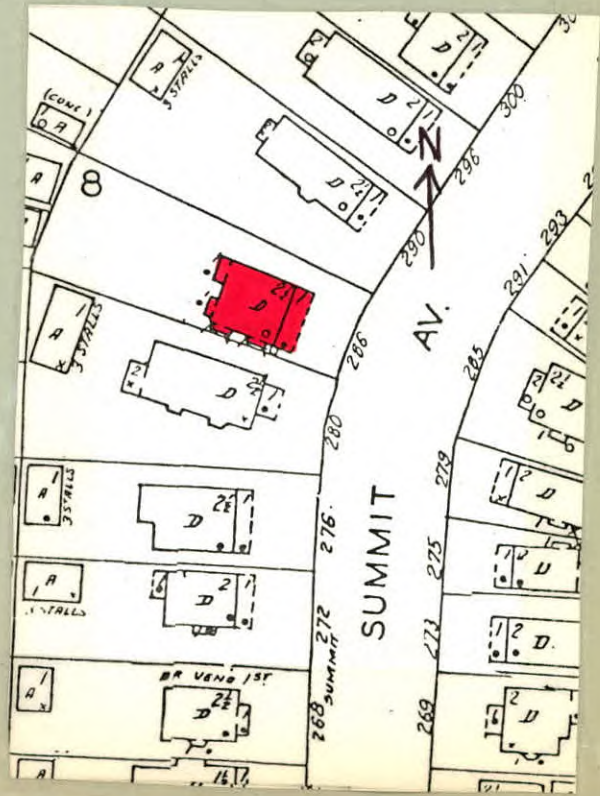

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story American Four Square form with Colonial Revival styling. Hip roof. Full-width hip roof porch with brick pier supports. Glass paneled door. First floor windows, single light with leaded transom. Second floor has center elliptical window with surround and keystones flanked by three part double hung 1/1 windows. Large hip roof dormers

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four Square form with Colonial Revival styling applied to facade. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
