

Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear eet in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt nue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 0's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent nue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. The tions of the street were deeded to the city by five different ers over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends hin the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that uburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness and the town."
