



17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from
Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo. 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and a half story frame residence with front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch has square supports, stick rail. Glass panel door with 10-light sidelights. First floor three-part window, 6/l lights each. Clapboard first floor. Second floor glass panel porch door flanked on one side by SIGNIFICANCE Small 1/l window. Three-part second floor window, 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1914 6/l lights each. Shingle second floor. Pedimented ARCHITECT: gable with staggered shingle pattern. Four part window, each 6/l lights. Cornice window head. Gabled dormers on sides of building.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical frame, gabled residential structure found throughout the Buffalo area with Prairie School and Colonial Revival styling applied. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town." 21. SOURCES: City Building Permit Records
