

Summit Avenue is truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and escent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the othern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending of the Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, sept for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which is deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it is the lead with special directness toward the town."
