

Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, cated between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending om West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent enue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, pears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." mmit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the all section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 92. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead th special directness toward the town."
