



Science Scienc	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four quare. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and xtends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of rescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's aps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than riginally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally alled Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different where between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north f Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent venue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban treet, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness"
