


Walking on campus can be a pleasant stroll or a struggle with the elements.









A walkway through the spine of the campus leads pedestrians from the large parking lots past the Sports Arena and into the heart of the campus.




Student Art Sale



Chuck Mancuso

Since early childhood Charles Mancuso has always been influenced by music. He spent his time listening to the popular music in his father's record collection; from there on in he was hooked. As a young adult he

attended Buffalo State College. It was here that he met his mentor,

William H. Tallmadge. Tallmadge was what Mancuso is today: a great music visionary. At Buffalo State Charles Mancuso wrote for the *Record* in a weekly column "Chaz with Jazz," later renamed "Both Sides Now." In his column he wrote reviews of jazz and blues artists who had come to town. In 1991 he started a quest in writing a book. Though the writing process had its up and downs, the book was published in 1996. *Popular Music and the Underground* is now used in his classes.

Sitting in one of Mancuso's classes is a phenomenon. I had never experienced anything like it in any of my other courses. There are three screens filled with pictures, movie clips, and quotations, and the air filled with music. Then of course there is the lecture. I never knew a person could be so knowledgeable about such a vast range of material in one subject. Mancuso is a music historian. You don't feel like you're sitting in a class – rather it's like a show. You almost expect to see a curtain go up and a spotlight shine on Mancuso. — Amy Stickney

Stan Friesen

Stan Friesen got his MFA in Graphic Design at Fort Hays State University in 2000. His Bachelor of Arts degree was in Art/Graphic Design at Bethel College in 1980. He worked for a graphics studio in Kansas and then, from 1981-85 worked with disadvantaged youth in Newfoundland and northern Ontario, Canada.

He returned to Kansas as marketing manager and graphic designer for an offset printing company from 1985-92, and taught art/design courses at Tabor College 1990-93.

After years in various art/design positions he found his way to SUNY Buffalo State College as an

Assistant professor in Communication Design. He teaches a multitude of classes at Buffalo State. I had him as my very first professor in the design department and enjoyed that class thoroughly. Right now I have him as a professor in Multimedia and Web Design classes in which we get into a lot of different programs and learn how to use design in media beyond print.

Professor Friesen does a great Job as a kind of "new media" professor. There are many new and updated computer programs to know and learn. As a result he often has to learn right along with us. In addition to being a professor patient with his students, he works hard at keeping up the computers in the department by fixing them and keeping overall maintenance up to par. His patience is abounding. I appreciate everything he's taught me and I know students in the future will feel the same.





dedicated group of students many of whom hope to join the long list of *Record* alumni who work as professional journalists.



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
International Fiesta

The Warren Enters Theatre



Casting Hall is Buffalo State College's student operated and funded theatre production company. Their 2003-2004 season included the classic



thriller Dracula, by Steven Dietz; the world premier of The Day Jack London Got Pinched, by Emmy award winning Tom Fontana; Bertolt Brecht's The Good Person of Sichuan; the PAD Dance performance; Solo shows and the Student Showcase. The October staging of Dracula marked Casting Hall's return to the Upton Hall theatre, which had been their home for several decades before it was shut down for reconstruction. Completely returbished, the state-of-the-art facility was named for retired Theatre Professor Warren Enters. Casting Hall provides students practical, hands-on opportunities within a professional theater company. Membership is open to students in all majors. With the Warren Enters Theatre, The Flexible Theatre and Rockwell Hall, the Performing Arts Department and Casting Hall are able to provide students with performance, design and technical experiences in one of Western New York's most sophisticated performance laboratories.

Faces of Buffalo State College







SOFTBALL Spring 2003

Buffalo State recorded its 10th 20-win season and qualified for the SUNYAC playoffs for the for the 11th time in the past 13 years, as the Bengals posted a 25-15 overall record and a fifth place record of 14-6 in conference play.

The Bengals opened the year on their annual spring trip to Ft. Myers, FL, and returned home with a 7-3 mark, its best start since 1996, that included wins over nationally ranked Bethany (WV) and Division II North Dakota. When Buffalo State returned north, it opened its new softball facility with a split against non-conference Penn State Behrend, before weather kept the team indoors for 13 consecutive days. The Bengals struggled to play consistent softball when the weather finally broke,

before assembling a nine-game winning-streak that included sweeps of SUNYAC-rivals Potsdam, Oswego, Brockport and SUNYIT. After dropping four consecutive games, The Bengals closed out the regular season with a pair of victories at Fredonia, sewing up the fifth seed. Buffalo State pushed Cortland to the limit in the first game of the playoffs, but fell 6-5 in eight innings, and was eliminated by Geneseo two

days later.

Buffalo State was well-represented with five selections on the All-SUNYAC Team. Heidi Rammacher topped the list, as the right fielder led the Bengals with a .372 batting average, eight homeruns and 38 RBI. Stephanie Menth was chosen as a left fielder for the fourth consecutive season after batting .342. Juniors Tiffany Ciolek and Elizabeth Beiter and freshman Lindsey Matheis were all first-time All-Conference honorees. Ciolek was excellent at second

base, and finished third on the team with a .328 batting average. Beiter posted an 11-5 record on the mound with a 1.91 earned run average, and Matheis was dominant behind the plate as a rookie.




MEN'S SOCCER

Buffalo State came within one game of realizing its preseason goal of qualifying for the SUNYAC postseason, but a loss to Fredonia on

the final day of the regular season left the Bengals one point out of the sixth and final playoff spot. Buffalo State finished the year with a 6-10-2 overall record and a 4-5 mark in conference.

The Bengals opened the season by losing three of their first four games by 1-0 scores. After a 1-5-1 start, Buffalo



State's season may have turned on a hard fought 1-1 tie at RIT in late September. From that point, Buffalo State went 5-5 to close the season, outscoring opponents 34-25. The stretch included conference victories over SUNYIT, New Paltz, Potsdam and Oswego.

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Junior forward Brian Miller paced the Bengals' offense with 16 goals and 35 points. Junior Matthew Romano had a breakthrough

offensively with four goals and five assists for 13 points, and freshman Jared Hulshoff had a strong rookie campaign with five goals. Another freshman that made an instant impact was goalkeeper Shawn McDonell who played in 14 games and made 91 saves with a 6-7-1 record.

Several Bengals earned postseason accolades, led by freshman defender Matt Ketchum who was named the SUNYAC's Co-First Year Player of the Year, as well and First Team All-SUNYAC. Miller garnered Second Team All-Conference honors, and Rich Namulala and Erick Hansen

earned All-SUNYAC Honorable Mention status.

WOMEN'S SOCCER


Buffalo State finished its 2003 campaign with the school's highest win total since 1985, posting an 8-10-1 overall record. The Bengals failed to earn a berth in the SUNY-AC playoffs, however, as they finished eighth in the conference with a mark of 3-7.

The Bengals opened the season by winning two of their first three games over



Hilbert and DeSales, but went on to drop their next three contests, including two conference match-ups. Buffalo State regrouped, however, and posted a 5-2-1 mark over its next eight games, with conference wins over SUNYIT,

New Paltz and Potsdam. The Bengals ran out of gas down the stretch though, as they managed just one win in their final five games.



Sophomore Gina Monaco led the team in scoring for the second straight season registering 25 goals and three assists

for 53 points. Monaco demolished the record books this season shattering the marks for goals in a game, points in a game, goals in a season, points in a season, goals in a career and points in a career. She was the lone Bengal to earn All-SUNYAC honors as she was named to the Second Team. Freshman Tina Semertzides was second on the team in point production with seven goals and eight assists. Senior Amy Drozen added eight assists this season to remain the Bengals' career assist leader with 32. The Bengals also set a team record for goals in a season, scoring 57.

FOOTBALL


Buffalo State football continued its rebuilding phase this season and made significant strides toward reestablishing itself as a



team that can play with anyone in the country, despite posting a 2-8 record.

The Bengals opened the season with a heartbreaking home loss to Division I-AA Robert Morris, falling 33-23 after relinquishing a fourth quarter lead. After a road loss at Division II Mansfield, Buffalo State got into the win column against its first Division III opponent of the season, defeating Albion 21-14 in overtime. After rallying to tie the score with just 28 seconds to play, the Bengals scored on its first possession of overtime and the defense held to complete the comeback.

The road got rough for the Bengals from there, as they dropped six straight games, including losses against nationally-ranked Brockport, Rowan, Montclair State and Ithaca. Buffalo State faced another of the nation's top teams in the final week of the season, playing against a hungry Washington & Jefferson team that was ranked 17th in the country and in need of a victory to make a return trip to the NCAA Playoffs. The Bengals played



spoiler and earned their first road victory in three seasons, claiming a 10-7

win with their finest overall effort of the year.

Several individuals stood out for the Bengals this season. Senior tailback Curtis Hathcock became the second Buffalo State back to rush for 1,000 yards in a season as he ran for 1,102 on a school



record 261 carries. Senior receiver Marc Hoppy also made his mark in the school record books for receptions in a season as he reeled in 62 catches for 717 yards. He also set a record for catches in a game with 12 in the win over W&J. Junior defensive end Michael Holbok anchored an aggressive defense with 28 tackles for losses, the most by any Division III player, and was 10th in the nation with 12 sacks.

Other bright spots included junior Nick Warren who led the Bengals with 92 tackles, and sophomore quarterback Mike Mikolaichik who completed 53.5-percent of his passes for 1,671 yards.

LACROSSE

The 2003 season was one of growth and record set-

ting for the Bengals. Firstyear Head Coach Meg Stevens led Buffalo State to its best season since the programs inception in 1996, as the Bengals went 5-9 overall, and 3-5 in SUNYAC play, setting records for the best season winning percentage, .357, most goals scored, 125, and fewest goals against average, 10.64.

After dropping its first four games, two to non-conference opponents, Alleg-

heny, 9-8, and RIT, 8-5, Buffalo State responded with wins in four of its next five games, defeating SUNYACrivals Potsdam, 11-8, Fredonia, 11-9, and New Paltz, 14-4. The Bengals added their fifth win by a 16-2 margin over Medaille in the season's final week. >>>




Stefanie Hineman led the way for the Bengals, scoring 35 goals and nine assists for 44 points in 14 games and was named the team's most valuable player. With these numbers, Hineman set two new school records,

for goals in a season, and also for points in a season. She moved to fourth on the all time scoring list with 63 points, and second on the assists in a career list with 12, and also into third for career shots recorded with 115.

Freshman Chelsev Frail had an outstanding rookie campaign,

as she tallied 23 goals and 14 assists for 37 points. Frail also entered the record books, ranking first for assists in a season and a career with 14.

Junior Annie Tallchief, in her first season with the Bengals, recorded 26 goals and eight assists for 34 points,



The Bengals posted a 14-23 overall record and a 2-6 mark in SUNYAC, failing to qualify for the SUNYAC postseason for the first time since 2000.


After dropping its first four matches of the season at the Mt. St. Joseph (OH) Invitational, Buffalo State responded with consecutive wins over Hilbert, St. Michael's and St. Lawrence. After another three-match losing skid, the Bengals rebounded by winning five of

their next nine matches, including triumphs over SUNYAC East's Plattsburgh and Potsdam. Unfortunately, the Bengals could not continue that momentum into the opening round of Pool Play, going 0-4 as part of a six-game slide. Again, the Bengals were able to temporarily right the ship by winning six of nine, including



conference wins over Geneseo and Oswego and an upset of St. John Fisher. Buffalo State finished the year on a sour note with three losses at the Carnegie Mellon Invitational.

Despite the disappointing team results, there were several individual accomplishments that highlighted the season. Senior setter Krista Wierzbicki set a school record with 1,312 assists and established herself as the Bengals' all-time leader in that category with 3,821 in her career. She earned All-SUNYAC Honorable Mention status for the third consecutive season. Denise Jedynak also broke a pair of school records, as the senior libero recorded 692 digs and also established the career mark with 1,247 over four years. The Bengals third four-year senior, Vicky Manos also etched her name into the Buffalo State record book as she set a new standard for attacks in a season with 1,519. She also led the team with 560 kills. Manos was named First Team All-SUNYAC.



MEN'S HOCKEY

Buffalo State ended the year with a 7-18 overall record and finished in seventh place in the SUNYAC with a conference mark of 3-11.

The Bengals began the season hosting a pair of tour-



naments, finishing fourth in the SUNYAC Challenge and second in the All-Sport invitational. Buffalo State got its first win of the season in the second game of the All-Sport, thrashing visiting Johnson & Wales by a score of 10-2. The Bengals hit a rut, losing nine-straight before defeating Brockport to close out the first semester.

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In the second half of the season, the Bengals

came together as a team and rallied behind a new goaltender, freshman Sean Sheehan. After losing the first game back from the break the team won three straight games to improve its record to 5-12. The Bengals would add conference victories over Cortland and Brockport down the

stretch to finish up the season four points out of the final playoff spot.

Freshman Mike DeMarco led the Bengals in scoring with 12 goals and 19 assists. Junior Morgan McElman had a solid year cracking the Bengals' topten in career scoring with six goals and 15 assists, bringing his career total to 41 points. Three newcomers on the blueline made an instant impact, led by freshman Sean O'Connell who tallied four goals and 13 assists to rank him second in single Sean Sheehan

Buffalo State finished the year with a 4-18-3 overall record and in fifth place in the ECAC West with a conference mark of 2-8-2.

The Bengals had a tough start to the season going 1-

8 overall and 0-4 in the conference heading into the winter break. The Bengals' lone win was a 3-1 non-conference road win against Cortland in the second game of the season. The Bengals faired better in the second semester, posting a 3-10-3 record, with a win over Trinity and ties against Neumann,

St. Mary's and Cortland. Buffalo State




finished the season with a pair of ECAC West road wins against Chatham, but fell five points shy of the final playoff spot.

Freshman Jamie Overbeck had a solid first year, finishing with eight goals and four assists for Buffalo State. Senior forward Kim Costanzo finished her final season with 12 points (3 goals -9 assists), her 26 career assists have her tied for second with fellow scnior Janelle Schmitt.

Senior goaltender Mary Keddie posted a 2-14-3 record this season with a .913 save percentage. Keddie finished her career holding almost all of Buffalo State's goaltending records including shutouts, saves, wins and games played. Rookie goaltender Crissy Michalek showed promise in six games of service, posting a 2-4 record and an .898 save percentage.

Despite a ninth place showing on the women's side, the Bengals were still left with plenty of reason's to be optimistic. With a small roster and no divers, Buffalo State knew that it was fighting an uphill battle from the start, but sever-

al outstanding swims left the team poised for the future. Highlighting the meet was freshman Mindy Wood who scored in three individual events, and broke a pair of school records

ments in the water all season. These improvements were most evident as 22 of the 28 "best times" of the season came in the final weekend at the conference championships.

The men's team posted a sixth place finish at the SUNYAC Championships, scoring points. 263 Sophomores Rich Gaczewski and Dave Papke were the leader of the veteran Bengals in the water, each scoring points in three individual events. Gaczewski's



best finish was an eighth place showing in the 1,650 free (17:53.45), as Papke placed ninth in the 200 breast (2:25.10). Freshmen Eric Hastings, Derek Stoklosa and Matt Palminteri also scored in multiple events. Hastings best performance came in the form of a seventh place showing in the 500 free (5:00.29). 
CROSS COUNTRY

Buffalo State's men's and women's cross country teams were unable to overcome a number of untimely injuries and neither team was able to emerge as a competitor at the championship meets. The men's team slipped to seventh at the SUNYAC meet and fell to 12th of 15 teams at the NYSCTC Championships. The women placed eighth at the conference championships, and finished 11th at the state meet.

Junior AJ Walsh was the Bengals' top-finisher at all nine meets this season. He earned a SUNYAC Medal at the conference meet with an 11th place finish, and captured All-Atlantic Region honors with a place 33rd showing at Regionals. Senior Matt Kubiak was consistently the Bengals No. 2 runner, as he was the second Buffalo State runner to finish at all three of the major championships.


Vacanti rotated as No. 1 and 2 during the major championships with

TRACK & FIELD Indoor Track

Bengal sophomore Justin Muise led the way for the men with winning time of 50.42 in the 400 meter run and an second place finish in 55 meter hurdles with a time of 7.89. Buffalo State's Ken Ciolek had a solid day finishing second in both the high jump and the triple jump. Tim Giagios also captured first place points for the Bengals in the 500 meter

run with a time of 1:07.50. Rob Kozlowski also broke his own school record in the 35-pound weight throw, measuring 13.48 meters.

On the women's side freshman Mercedes Roper won the 55 meter dash with an NCAA

provisional cut time of 7.27 to earn 10 points for the Bengals. Roper also finished fourth in the 200 meter dash with a mark of 26.59, as she set new Buffalo State records in both events. Sophomore Linda Williams also had two top-

eight finishes for Buffalo State. Cortland captured the men's title scoring 176 points, while Geneseo won the women's championship with 203 points.

Buffalo State athletes captured three championships at the NYSCTC Championships held at St. Lawrence University the following week as the men finished seventh of 14 teams, while the women placed 13th of 15 teams.

On the men's side, Muise placed first in the 400m dash with an NCAA provisional qualifying time of 48.95, just .01 seconds shy of the meet



record. Muise also joined Eugene Overton, Frank Ortiz and Giagios to win the 4x200m relay with a time of 1:31.43. Other strong performances included Ciolek in the high jump (2nd/1.90m) and in the triple jump (3rd/13.31m), Matthew Kubiak in the 1,000m run (5th/2:35.31), and Aaron Masters in the pole vault (5th/4.25m).


