

Recessed entrance with wood paneled door and leaded sidelights. Double sash lighted porch door with ten light sidelights. 6/1 light second floor window. Hip 19. 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical American Four Square with stucco facade. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
