

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.				
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with front facing gable. Full-width flat roof porch, enclosed. Three windows, 1/1 lights, flanked by doric pilaster strips, paired. Semi-hexagonal bay and triangular bay on second floor. Center elliptical window. Pedimented gable has palladian window.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The massive pediment recalls the Shingle style with classical details of Colonial Revival style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town." 21.
