

Scott Wood from The Part Part Part Part Part Part Part Part	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical American Four quare form entranced with Italian Renaissance Revival details. Soodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The arkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally canned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis venue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 387 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was one when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Ollowing Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue oes "not lead with special directness toward town."
