GRADUATE DIVISION — EXTENSION SESSION

1950-1951

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Announcement of the graduate program:

"Approval is hereby given by the Board of Regents to the proposal that a course of study leading to the degree of Master of Science be offered through Summer School, Extension courses and Saturday classes for elementary teachers at New York State College for Teachers, Buffalo. The Board does not approve at this time the establishment of a graduate course of study leading to the Master of Science degree to be offered during the regular college session."

2. Transfer credit; non-residence courses:

1. The quantitative requirement for the Master of Science degree shall be the completion of thirty-two semester hours of graduate credit. 2. Residence requirements: "A candidate for the degree of Master of Science may offer for credit, not more than 12 semester hours in approved non-residence courses if he is a graduate of the college at which he is a candidate. He may offer not more than eight semester hours of non-residence courses if he is a graduate of another college. In all cases, however, such graduate study must be similar in scope and content to courses offered by the teachers college, and must form a coherent part of the total program of preparation to be completed by the student." 3. Credit will not be given for courses completed in another college or university more than seven years prior to registration in the Graduate Division of New York State College for Teachers at Buffalo.

3. Graduate work limited to Summer Session and Extension Department:

At present there will be no graduate work offered during the regular college session. Graduate schedules will be planned so that requirements for the Master of Science degree may be completed by the attendance at five Summer Sessions. This time may be shortened by registration in the Saturday Extension Department classes.

4. Admission Requirements:

- A. Students must hold an approved bachelor's degree and eligibility to teach in the elementary field or in the field of specialization.
- B. All candidates shall have demonstrated ability to do graduate work as measured by:
 - a. Scholastic achievement in undergraduate work;
 - b. Teaching experience and record;
 - c. Other evaluation measures as may be prescribed by the Graduate Council.

5. Registration; Fees:

Registration for Graduate Division classes in Extension Department will be held Saturday, September 16, 1950 and Saturday, February 3, 1951, in the College Library. Please report first, in each case, to the Auditorium at 9 o'clock, for Assembly and further instructions. Graduate Division fees are \$10.00 per credit hour.

6. Application for admission to the Graduate Division:

- A. Secure *admission blank* from the office of the Director of the Graduate Division which blank will outline fully the procedure to be followed.
- B. If you do *not* hold your Bachelor's degree from New York State College for Teachers, Buffalo, write to the college which granted your degree and ask that an official transcript be mailed to the Graduate Division, New York State College for Teachers, 1300 Elmwood Ave., Buffalo 22, N. Y.

- C. Make every effort to have application blank and all other data required in the hands of the Director of the Graduate Division before September 1st, if you wish to enter the Graduate Division the first semester; by January 1st, 1951, if you wish to enter the second semester; and by May 1st, for the 1951 Summer Session.

7. Maximum graduate program:

No graduate student, in any New York State College for Teachers, who is a full time teacher, will be permitted to carry an extension program in excess of four credits per semester or eight credits per college year. This maximum of four hours per semester includes all work whether taken in afternoon, evening, or Saturday sessions at State or elsewhere. Registration above this maximum will result in loss of credit in excess of four semester hours.

9. Elementary Teaching Certification for Liberal Arts College Graduates:

Due to the extreme shortage of elementary teachers, the State Education Department has approved a plan whereby college graduates may enter an

intensive training program to prepare for general elementary school teaching. The completion of a minimum of 30 semester hours, on the graduate level, 24 hours of which shall be in education courses approved for elementary school teaching, and evidence of satisfactory teaching, for a period of 5 years, as determined by an approved evaluation program, will entitle the student to a permanent certificate to teach in the elementary grades. This program has been inaugurated to help relieve the current teacher shortage. It has been planned so that interested college graduates may register in the Graduate Division for certain specified Saturday Extension courses and Summer Sessions. Satisfactory completion of certain Saturday extension courses and the 1951 Summer Session in professional study will entitle the college graduate to a renewable certificate valid for one year. Additional renewals will be granted upon evidence of continued summer session study and satisfactory teaching, upon the request of the employing school official. If the student wishes to complete the requirements for the Master of Science Degree, 8 hours of graduate study, elected under the guidance of the Graduate Division of this college, will be required in addition to the 24 hours of required courses in elementary education. All college graduates interested in this program for certification in elementary school teaching, should secure application blanks and complete instructions for registration as soon as possible. GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Teachers in service and properly qualified undergraduates will be admitted to Extension courses.
2. A fee of \$7.50 is charged for each semester hour in undergraduate courses; \$10.00 per semester hour for all graduate courses. Special exceptions may be made in the case of regular students and faculty. No refunds will be made unless the course is discontinued. Fees are payable at registration.
3. While credit is granted for the completion of all credit courses the application of such credit to the specific program of any student is subject to the approval of the Registrar. Extension credit is transferable to other academic institutions, in accordance with the regulations of such institutions.
4. If a student wishes to be considered a candidate for a degree he is expected to secure, either by mail or by a personal interview, evaluation of his program from the Registrar in order that he may be sure that work taken will fit his individual need.
5. Extra-mural courses will be organized in convenient centers where the demand is sufficient to justify it. Communication with the Director is urged.

6. Third year Buffalo State Teachers College graduates taking extra-mural courses are warned not to expect credit toward degree if such courses fall within the last sixteen hours of required residence. Extra-mural credit does not count towards the residence requirement if the first three years' work of the candidate were taken elsewhere.
7. Classes under ten, as an absolute minimum, will not be organized except in exceptional cases of required subjects necessary for immediate graduation.
8. The right is reserved to make any necessary alterations in the course offerings listed in this catalog without notice.
9. Volunteer critic teachers may take one, two or three hour Graduate or Under-graduate course each extension year, with fees waived. This provision is not cumulative and applies only during the period of volunteer service.

APPLICATION FOR DIPLOMA

Students expecting to qualify for degrees in January or June of any year are required to make application in the Registrar's office for such degree by November 1 of the year in which they expect to graduate. Diplomas will not be ordered for students who fail to make application, and the College cannot be responsible for the graduation of any who fail to make application. Students completing the requirements for the degree during the Summer Session are required to make application for the degree before the close of the Summer Session.
