



17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)	
Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.	
Two story with shingle style influence. Side gable roof with porch under extending main roof line. Rough cut, regular coustone base and support. Glass and wood paneled door. First floor has a pair of 1/1 windows with leaded transom. Large single light window with leaded transom on first floor. Secons Significance story tower has brackets under eave. 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: An example of a vernacul version of shingle style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching fr Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olm early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current f Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five differ owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humb and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and e within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special direct toward the town."  21.
