Dr. Sheila Kirk Visits Buffalo



The July 10th meeting of the Buffalo Belles found the Emerson Room filled with a large crowd in anticipation of Dr. Sheila Kirk's visit to address members of Buffalo's transgender community.

After meeting announcements were made, Camille introduced Dr. Kirk, a surgeon who is transgendered, to the audience. Dr. Kirk then proceeded to educate, enlighten and entertain the roomful of 35 who gathered to listen and become better acquainted with the ever-growing options available to

the TG community.

Sheila, assisted by her partner, Pamela, informed the audience about the recently opened Transgender Surgical & Medical Care Center (TSMC) in Pittsburgh, PA and the many services that are available. This is the first time that so many services for the transgendered individual have been offered at the same facility. Now one does not have to travel to different parts of the country in order to get the care they are looking for.

The latter part of the presentation involved a question and answer period where individual concerns were addressed. Now, with the existence of TSMC, the job of transitioning has become a littler easier

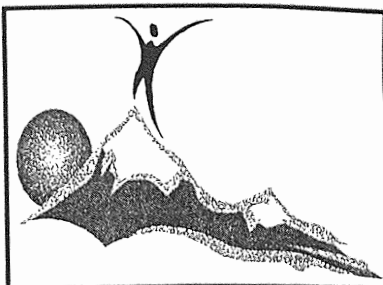
So, we conclude, that we will only accept the word "queer" if the definition were to be changed to:

Too real when I feel what my heart can't conceal.

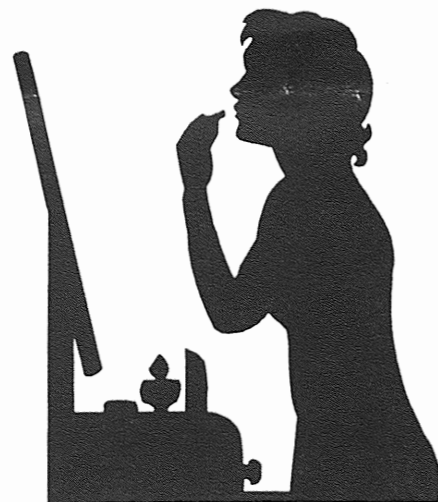
Yes, I'm the great pretender,

Losing a Son, Gaining a Daughter

As you know, this Sunday's the gay and lesbian parade, with its annual collection of leather, tattoos, lingerie, goosebumps under fishnet and lampposts decorated with San Franciscans. Marching by will be gay lawyers, gay trombone players, gay Foreign Legion posts, gay Lions clubs, gay parents of straight kids and straight parents of gay kids.

I've had a soft spot for this parade since 1978, when Jim and I ourselves whooped up Market Street in it. I was five months' pregnant, and we carried a sign that said "Expectant Parents Against Briggs." (State Senator John Briggs was trying at the time to keep gay teachers out of schools.) Now that child is 20 and will doubtless be back there Sunday, as will we all.

What I like best are all the moms and dads marching in the parade, or blowing whistles as they march by -- kids who surprised them along the way with revisions in dress, partners and even gender. Some parents have to accept that their kids don't want to go into the family business, or become lawyers. Other parents have to accept that their son wants to be a girl, or maybe already is a girl, but wants to marry another girl.

One of them this year will be Karen Thomas of Lafayette, who will watch her own child, Vera, march by with her friends. Vera is tall and thin with short, curly hair and bangs. Warm brown eyes look from behind small round tortoise-shell glasses. She and Vera have lunch at least once a month, swapping talk about books.

"I met Vera on her 30th birthday," Karen told me. "Until then she was Gary, my older son." Over five-cheese pizza at the California Pizza kitchen, Gary said, "I'm not gay, Mom. I'm transgender."

"OK," Karen said.

Such astonishing quick acceptance is unusual. More often the parent will have to struggle with disappointment and fear -- fear for the child, who will be living outside society's definition of "normal," and fear for himself, parent of a child who is different. Each of the exuberant people marching in the parade has a story to tell -- and some of the stories echo with the sound of slammed doors, or the worse sound of a conversation cut off.

For Karen, it was easy. She felt that Vera was the child she had always known, only now more completely herself. "Since I'd never been a parent with specific expectations beyond 'law-abiding citizen,' acceptance was quite natural to me," she told me. "Besides, I could feel happiness across the table, and that is every parent's dream."

She later went to the Museum of Modern Art with Vera. "She knew about every artist, and I learned a great deal about her -- and about me as well, about what it feels like to be in public with a son dressed in denim skirt, white blouse, denim vest, with sensible shoes, handbag, earrings and makeup."

As they left, Karen took Vera's arm. "This is wonderful," Karen told her. "The best part is, you're still you." When they parted on a street corner as usual, they shared a hug that seemed more real than ever before.

Karen, who can remember going to see "E.T." with her little son Gary, recently enjoyed "Cookie's Fortune," a wonderful movie about family, with Vera. They share a passion for Robertson Davies novels and for art: Karen is sculpting a small bear, and Vera gives her advice on painting it.

That June after the birthday lunch, Karen went to the gay parade, watching Vera march proudly with her transgender group.

"I expected crowds and colorful costumes, music, noise. But what I hadn't anticipated," she said, "was the overwhelming joy of the event. Not only of the parade, but of the party afterward, blocks and blocks of people, the most open, unrestrained and happy gathering I'd ever been a part of."

Tokyo Tour Agency Offers
'Beauty Boy Transformation'

TOKYO (Reuters) -- The quest for beauty in Japan is no longer the unique preserve of women. Now Japanese men are flocking to beauty salons and donning makeup. A Tokyo travel agency has decided to capitalize on the new trend by offering "average joes" a tour called "The Beauty Boy Transformation."

Many young Japanese men already flock to beauty salons and hairdressers, wear makeup and pluck their eyebrows, inspired by a host of glam-rock bands flourishing in Japan in the past few years.

According to a survey conducted in autumn 1998 by advertising agency Dentsu Inc., 54 percent of the surveyed men aged 12 to 24 regularly used some kind of facial product, including face packs, cleansing tissues and lip creams and even foundation and eyeliners.

Tobu Travel's tour however attempts to train novices in the art of beauty, for the equivalent of \$110.

First stop: The 'do

It begins with a trip to a popular hairdresser -- Febbraio di Ales. This is one of many in the trendy Harajuku district of Tokyo cashing in on the male beauty interest fueled by fashion magazines such as BiDan --the two Japanese characters in its name translate to "beauty" and "man."

The monthly magazine, with a circulation of 350,000, offers makeup tips on how to trim one's eyebrows as well as new hairstyles and fashion items.

Yukio Miwa, BiDan editor in chief, says the trend is not simply a way of attracting a partner but also shows a need by young men to become more confident.

"By bringing out the inherent beauty in oneself," Miwa says, "the men also become more positive about their lives."

Seiji Machida, 22, had been to a hairdresser before, but says he balked at first at the idea of going through a full facial. But once in the hands of beauticians at the salon Jolicanaille, Machida reports he quickly relaxed and enjoyed every second of the pampering.

Jolicanaille, among the oldest of its kind to offer facial and hair-removal treatment for men, currently has about 300 regular members at its three Tokyo salons. "Most of our members are college students -- some who may come as often as once a week," says Saori Kawakami, manager at the Shibuya branch in Tokyo.

The most popular treatment among Jolicanaille's clients is the facial to produce egg-smooth skin. But demand for chemical skin peeling is also increasing, Kawakami says.

Dutch postman suspended
for working in mini-skirt

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (Reuters) -- A Dutch postman has been suspended from work for the rest of the week after he delivered the mail in a mini-skirt Monday, Dutch media reported.

The postman from Ermelo, in the center of the country, wore the skirt to protest an employee policy that male workers wear pants.

The issue has become particularly heated with temperatures climbing above 86 degrees on Monday.

Dutch postwomen are allowed to wear long shorts and their male counterparts had taken the post office to court, claiming sex discrimination.

However, a Dutch court last week ruled the post office was within its rights to insist male employees cover their knees.

Defining male beauty in Japan

One characteristic of the concept of male beauty in Japan is that it stresses cleanliness over macho masculinity.

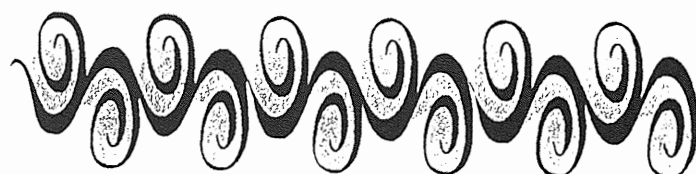
Japanese traditionally have placed a high importance on hygiene. A word used to mean "to purify" or "pure," is the same in many religious contexts in Japan as the verb "to cleanse."

Machida says he felt compelled to brush up his image when his last girlfriend found him "unclean" -- a strong word in a nation in which hygiene has moral implications.

But now, with growing wealth among average citizens, this concern has reached its peak. Young men can spend up to 30,000 yen (US \$250) weekly on hairdressers, makeup and facials.

Some of the older men have also gotten into the act. A few, like Takeshi Mori, say they were prompted by their wives. Mrs. Mori thought a trip to a beauty salon was a perfect birthday gift.

Mori chuckles at his new casual outfit, but says he came out feeling a new man -- changed from the inside and the outside.

FOR A BETTER
YOU...

Try the following exercises for getting more feminine hips.

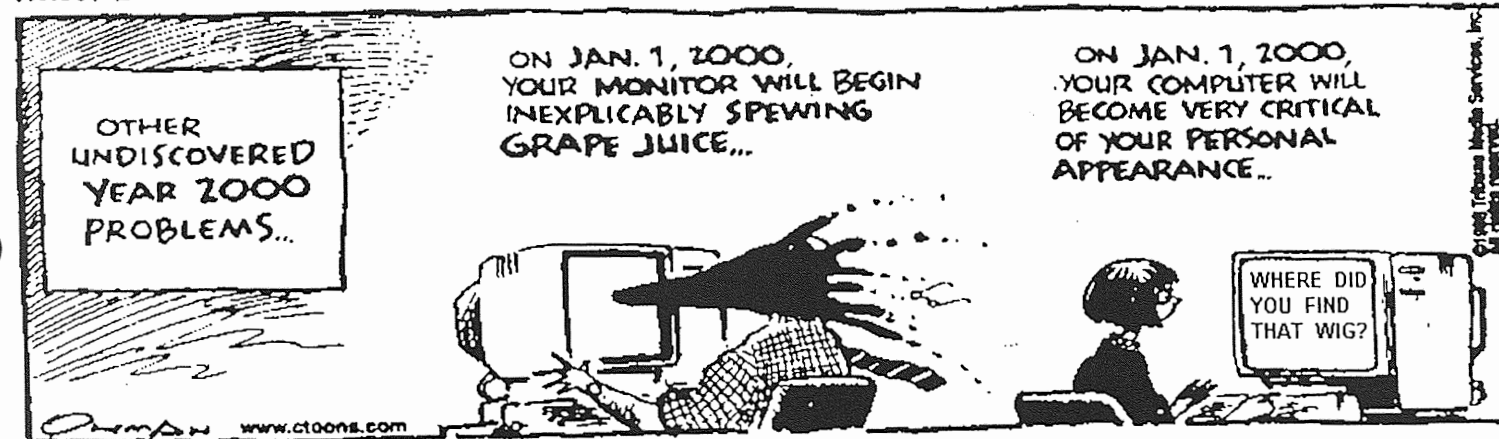
- (1) Stand up straight with your feet about shoulder-width apart.
- (2) Raise your hands up just above your head, like a ballet dancer (you might find it easier to keep the hands at the side of the body).
- (3) Bend sideways while exhaling (if your hands are to your side, one hand will slide down the side of your leg) until you can't bend any further; hold this for a second or two, then straighten back up, inhaling as you go.
- (4) Repeat this for the other side, counting each time you complete one set.
- (5) Do this as many times as you can without discomfort, attempting to do one or two more each time. Do each repetition slowly; good form will yield the best results.

This will both stretch and tone muscle (high repetitions/low weight), making the hips a bit larger while slimming the waist; the result is a more feminine silhouette.

An exercise to bulk up the hips a bit is:

- (1) Lie down on your side.
- (2) Keeping both legs straight, raise the "upper" one, exhaling as you lift. Hold it for a second or two, and then exhale as you bring it down.
- (3) Turn over and repeat with the other side.
- (4) Do this as many times as you can without discomfort, attempting to do one or two more each time. Do each repetition slowly; it's not a race & you want good form for good results.
- (5) After you've done this for a bit, you can get greater bulk by adding ankle weights. This will add muscle mass to the hips, with lower repetitions of higher weights giving the most bulk.

When correcting lip shape do not reshape your whole mouth - not a good look when lipstick wears off leaving VLL (visible lip line)... For the most natural looking reshape, prime lips first with concealer, foundation and powder. This will also give added staying power and help to prevent 'bleeding'.

Keep lips soft and supple for the smoothest finish by applying a nourishing lip balm under your lipstick, or when you are not wearing lipstick.

1950s Movie Star Jeff Chandler Was A Cross-Dresser

LOS ANGELES (Reuters) - Western movie hero Jeff Chandler concealed a dark secret behind his manly 6 foot 4 inch tall frame.

He was a cross-dresser with a penchant for flowered chiffon and polka dots, according to his former lover, musical swimming star Esther Williams in an excerpt from her autobiography published Wednesday by Vanity Fair magazine.

Chandler, whose tanned features brought him fame as Indian chief Cochise in "Broken Arrow" and two sequels in the early 1950s, dated Williams for two years after they met on a film set in 1957. He died in 1961 at the age of 42.

But the love affair came to an abrupt halt when he revealed his passion for silk stockings and high heels, Williams recounts in her biography "The Million Dollar Mermaid." Excerpts from the book, to be published in September by Simon and Schuster.

"I froze at the bedroom door and started screaming. I couldn't

stop myself ... Jeff was standing in the middle of the bedroom in a red wig, a flowered chiffon dress, expensive high-heeled shoes and lots of make-up. I just kept screaming," Williams said in the excerpt.

"Suddenly I couldn't make sense of a large piece of my life. Here was my lover -- a strong, manly figure by anyone's estimate -- who had just been standing before me in high heels and a dress. This was no joke. He enjoyed that kind of thing. He was a cross-dresser," wrote Williams, now 75.

Williams said she later discovered a closet full of expensive dresses, swimsuits and beautiful lingerie in Chandler's painting studio.

Chandler explained that his father left home when he was young and he was brought up by his mother and aunt in a house where male-ness was held in contempt and where he was made to hate his own sex.

She says Chandler was undergoing therapy from a therapist who was also a cross-dresser and had hoped that his relationship with Williams was strong enough to accommodate his secret, but she said she left him the next day.

As a filmmaker, Edward D. Wood Jr. was the ultimate auteur, stamping his work with a signature idiocy that resists even camp appreciation. As if to prove his talents were far too hideous to be contained by the movies, two pulp novels Wood wrote in the mid-'60s are now being reissued with every typo and malapropism intact. The rotten books are actually more fun than the rotten movies, in the same way that a paper cut is more fun than poison

In "Killer in Drag," Glen Marker is the top transvestite hired killer in New York. He wants to ditch his life of crime, get a sex-change operation and live permanently as his gorgeous alter ego, Glenda Satin. (Note: The schlub portrayed by Wood in his ridiculous cinematic work "Glen or Glenda" has only the name and nylons in common with the novel's hard-boiled hero.) Glen finds himself hunted by both the police and the mob, so he goes on the lam and winds up in a small Colorado town, where he buys a decrepit carnival and finds love with the town whore. But his Ferris wheel falls over and kills a few people, forcing him to hit the road again. In the sequel, "Death of a Transvestite," Glen makes it to Los Angeles and bonds with another hooker, while the beaky, jealous Paul/Pauline, a rival drag killer, chases Glen/Glenda down. In the middle of a hippie riot on the Sunset Strip, Pauline and Glenda shoot it out. Glenda wins the battle but gets the electric chair.

Why does the mob have a roster of transvestite hit men? Who cares? Not Wood. He writes like Jim Thompson if Jim Thompson were a lobotomized monkey on angel dust, and what he does care about, mostly, is angora sweaters and satin panties and what they do for Glen and his girlfriends. Early on, Glen, as Glenda, gets into his car and is distracted by his own angora-covered falsies: "She squeezed harder -- then harder -- she rubbed it -- the sensation overwhelmed her --

She sighed aloud -- 'Oh what matter -- there are more panties in the glove compartment.'" Wood informs us pedantically that "when Glen talks of Glenda he speaks of her in second person"; he means third, but who's counting? Here's Glenda musing as she squashes a black widow: "She was ready to meet the outside world again. A hostile world, with dark passages concealing things and elements of the shadows and unseen dangers The spider had been the first thing Glen/Glenda had killed since leaving the Syndicate. But death followed him like the deep shadow of disaster it was." One of the love-struck whores eventually gets tied up nude and pitched into the East River; after a last flashback, she inhales the waters of the Hudson. Oh what matter, there are more panties in the glove compartment.

Ominously, the press material alerts us that Wood wrote at least 20 more of these things. The same publisher has also issued another Wood document from the '60s, the previously unpublished "Hollywood Rat Race," in which the would-be industry player regales aspiring starlets with anecdotes about how much persistence and luck it takes to make it big in the movies. As if he knew. After you surf Wood's stream of inanity in these books, Johnny Depp's portrayal of the director in "Ed Wood," the 1994 Tim Burton film -- flashing scores of tiny teeth in a wacked-out grin as he plunges ahead, reason and second takes be damned -- doesn't seem at all exaggerated.
