

Woodward Avenue runs parallel ide Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early aps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than by planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called enue) were deeded to the city by five different owners last and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward ones "not lead with special directness toward town."
