AMBOUNCE ENT OF SECOND SEMESTER CLASS CHANGES AND ADDITIONS The State Teachers College at Buffalo is offering thirty-three extension courses on the campus during the second semester. Special curricula are available in the Kindergarten-Primary, Intermediate and Junior High School Fields, in Supervision and Principalship, in Rural Education, in Vocational Education, in Art, in Home Economics and in special subject-matter fields. Especial attention should be given to Mr. Stoner's class, The Teacher and the Law.

Mr. Stoner is Professor of Conflict Laws at the University of Buffale Law School and is widely known for his skill as a lecturer and public speaker. This course is intended to acquaint the teacher with the legal status of children, the home and the family.

Courses which have not hitherto been offered are: Miss O'Brien's Unit Planning in the Intermediate grades, Miss Stockberger's Methods in Social Studies, Comparative Education, Sociology of Rural Life, Extra-Curricular Activities in the Junior High School, and Modern Philosophy of Education.

A number of changes will be made from the published catalog. Dr. Thurber's Romantic Movement will be continued into the second semester. His course in Victorian Literature will not be given. Unit Planning in the Intermediate Grades has been transferred from the first to the second semester. Mr. Pugsley's course in Public Relations and Dr. Neumann's course in Advanced Educational Sociology have been interchanged so that Dr. Neumann's course will be given on Friday afternoons and Mr. Pugsley's course on Saturday mornings. Miss Englebreck will offer History of Europe Since 1914 instead of Modern European History. Climate and Man will be offered by Miss Svec the first hour instead of the second. Miss Jamison's Special Kindergarten-Primary Methods allows one point credit instead of two. Mr. Steel's class in Supervision of Arithmetic will meet in room 116 instead of 115:

A new course in Home Economics Physics is offered for Home Economic Majors, a description of which is given below: The course will take up the general subjects of Heat, Electricity, and Mechanics, teaching the elementary basic principles in these divisions of physics, with emphasis on their application to the home or household whenever possible; a practical, interesting, non-mathematical course, embodying lectures and some laboratory work. The lectures are constantly supplimented and enlarged through the use of countless demonstrations. The cost is \$7.50 per point, (three point course) plus a \$5.00 laboratory fee, making the total cost \$27.50. The class will meet each Saturday morning from 9:00 A. M. to 12:30 P. M. in Room 208-Vocational Building. Mr. Vail, Instructor.

Dr. Hertzberg has added a course in Psychology of Elementary School Subjects. The description of the course follows: For each of the elementary school subjects an analysis is made of the activities involved in learning them in order that none of the abilities which the subject is supposed to develop may be neglected, and as a preparation for a discussion of such methods and conditions of learning and teaching the school subjects as have been found to be favorable either by experimental studio or the deductive application of known psychological facts and principles; individual differences in learning the elementary school subjects; factors which have a favorable influence upon learning them. This general statement of content of the courses must suffice because it would take too much space to list the topics treated in each one of the school subjects. Third and fourth year elective. Two semester hours credit.

Registration for all calsses will take place on Saturday, Feb. 4, from 9:00 to 11:30 A.M. Students taking work on Friday afternoons only are expected to register at this time. Classes will meet as follows: 1st hour class from 11:30 - 12:00; Second hour

SPECIAL BULLETIN RELATIVE TO VOCATIONAL-INDUSTRIAL COURSES DURING THE SECOND SEMESTER -- EXTENSION PROGRAM Attention is hereby called to the following courses to be offered during the second semester of the Extension program. These courses are given by the Extension Department and are subject to tuition fees as stated in extension bulletin. Registration for all classes will take place on Saturday, February 4th, from 9:00 to 11:30 A.M. Students taking work on Friday afternoons only are expected to register at this time. Classes will meet as follows: first hour class from 11:30 - 12:00; second hour classes from 13:35 P.M. A late registration fee will be charged after this date. PROBLEMS OF INDUSTRIAL ARTS EDUCATION: Mr. Quackenbush. Friday afternoons, 4:20 to 6:00 P.M., Room 102, Vocational Building. Two semester hours credit. Voc. 355-E. A study of Industrial Arts from the standpoint of the prospective supervisor. Consideration of the state outlines of instruction and problems incidental to, organization, supervision and administration of industrial arts curricula in Public schools. INDUSTRIAL ARTS DESIGN: Mr. Rooney. Saturday mornings 10:50 to 12:30 P.M. Room 218, Administration Building. Two semester hours credit. Voc. 351-E. The purpose of this general course is to give the student a working knowledge of designer's table tools, the principles which govern their use, their sources and their application. The major topics given consideration will be (a) sources: historic ornament (styles developed in historic periods), motifs derived from nature and from geometry, designer's web, and understanding of proportions; (b) principles: unity (harmony), balance, rhythm and dominance; (c) color: theory, graying, harmony and use; (d) lettering (considered as pure design); simple, legible, well-proportioned; (e) what constitutes good design in line, mass, tone and color; (f) applications in many media and many fields of industrial art -border, surface, and structure. Lecture and outside preparation. ORGANIZATION AND TEACHING OF THE GENERAL SUBJECTS IN THE CONTINUATION SCHOOL. Mr. Rogan. Saturday mornings 10:40 to 12:20. Room 102, Vocational Building. Two semester hours credit, pending approval by the State Department. A course planned for those who are to teach the required and academic subjects in a continuation school on a full time basis. Due to the increase in full time pupils in the continuation school the problem of organization of material and

special methods of preparation has created a demand for a course of this type. Therefore, the course will be concerned with content and organization of the general subjects and with methods of instruction suitable for a continuation school pupil. Limited to continuation school teachers.

INDUSTRIAL HISTORY: Mr. DeMond. Friday afternoons, 4:20 to 6:00 P.M. Room 10), Vocational Building. Two semester hours credit.

A course designed to show the function of early industrial enterprise in meeting the demands of civilization.
