17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Colonial Revival style influence. Steep pitch side gable roof with brackets under projecting eave. Fullwidth shed roof. Square Doric supports. Spindle balustrade and pediment over stairs. End pediment brackets. Rosette motif in Glass and wood paneled door. Second floor semitympanum. hexagonal bay has center rectangular window, 12 SIGNIFICANCE lights. First and second 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1905 floor 1/1 light windows. Hip roof dormer has a pair of recessed 8/1 light ARCHITECT: windows with engaged Doric BUILDER:

columns flanking.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical application of Colonial Revival style on a plain residential structure. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
