

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.				
Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Front facing roof. Full-width flat roof porch. Glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by small square stained glass with Three part 1/1 first floor window. Second floor semi-hex bay has 1/1 window. Lighted double sash door. End flute SIGNIFICANCE pilaster strips. Shingled pedimented gable. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1907

		BUILDER:	Entablature window head. Shingled curve into recessed window.	
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A common urban form of a gabled Colonial Revival style residence. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town." 21.
