

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Front-facing gable roof. Partial-width flat roof porch with square doric supports. Glass and wood paneled door. Diamond shape tracery in glass panel. Sidelights. First floor three-part window has center 1/1 window, with arched tracery in top lights of sides. Second floor SIGNIFICANCE semi-hexagonal oriel, with 1/1 windows. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay has center glass-paneled porch
ARCHITECT: door with arched tracery in top half of panel. Side windows, double hung with arched tracery in top light. End fluted doric pilaster strips. Dentils and paired brackets under projection of pedimented and paired brackets under projection of pedimented gable. Shingled gable has three part 9/1 windows with
A gabled vernacular version of entablature window head. the Colonial Revival style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
