Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.				
Two and a half story residence with Shingle and Prairie School styling. Hip roof. Full-width hip roof porch has doric columns and shingled rail. Projecting entrance has glass and wood paneled door. First floor three-part double hung, 1/1 window. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay with polygonal roof. Center rectangular leaded SIGNIFICANCE window flanked by 1/1 windows. Second floor 1/1 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1911 windows. Bargeboard.				
	ARCHITECT:BUILDER:		Round arched window, double hung, with diamond tracery in top light.	
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The stylistic details of Shingle style are contained on this facade in addition to the wide horizontal shingles of the Prairie School. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
