

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Craftsman styling. Hip roof with extending eaves. Paired ornately carved brackets. Hip roof entrance porch has wood paneled door with sidelights. First floor oriel with brack-t supports. Hip roof. Arched tracery in top light. Entablature window surround. First and second floor windows with arched tracery in top light. Hip 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 roof dormer with paired brackets under extending

ARCHITECT: eave. South side has hip roof wing. Single light windows with semi-circular BUILDER: tracery in top light. Center window flanked by 4 light sidelights.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The application of Craftsman styling on this particular residence is unique to the other houses constructed on Woodward Avenue at this period. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded.
