

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within	
Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks	
from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed	
on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

single 10/1 light window on first floor. Second floor center	
SIGNIFICANCE 8/1 window flanked by 10/1 windows. Hip roof dormers	
19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 with exposed rafter tails	
and curvilinear knee braces	
ARCHITECT: under eave. Pair 6/1 windo	
Full-width hip roof porch on north side. Paired tap	
BUILDER: square supports with column elaboration. Stick	ere
balustrado Muo double and lighted months

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This Craftsman style	
residence is enhanced by the curvilinear knee brackets. Crescent	
Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivisio	n,
stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street	
appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the	1
1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to	
its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city	
by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in	
1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent	
Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following	
Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with	
special directness toward the town."
