

Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and tends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of escent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 70's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear an originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally lled Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different ners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of herst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent enue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban reet, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness ward town." SOURCES: County Census Records, 1905
