



Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to olvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had seen modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to thecity by five different owners were a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and adding in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends thin the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness oward the town." |
