Clyde Edith Murphy

December 5, 1945 - August 27, 2011

Clyde Edith Murphy passed at the age of sixty-five on August 27, 2011 after an illness. She attended Buffalo public and parochial schools through high school. Clyde Edith Murphy continued on to receive a B.A. from the State University of New York at Buffalo, M.S.W. in Administration & Policy from the University of Michigan and J.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. She was a member of the District of Columbia Bar. Ms. Murphy was conscious and caring of the needs of others. She rarely spoke of her own needs but preferred to focus upon the needs of others. This led her to the Washington, DC area where she focused upon equal employment opportunity and related matters. Attorney Murphy worked professionally in a number of capacities, including private practice, trial attorney, attorney advisor for the Federal Office of Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, attorney for the United States Postal Service, and most recently until her demise, attorney for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation where she pursued rights for employees with disabilities.

Ms. Murphy loved books and had been an avid reader since childhood. She considered herself to be a great cook, and loved her rescued pet dogs. At various times she volunteered at the Washington Legal Clinic for the Homeless, was a docent at the National Museum for Women in the Arts, and served on the D.C. Bar & Equal Employment Opportunity Commission Mediation Project

Clyde Edith Murphy was born December 5, 1945 in Milledgeville, Georgia and grew up in Buffalo, New York. She was the eldest daughter of the late Dr. Benjamin F. Murphy, Jr. and Mrs. Clyde Boddie Murphy. She will be deeply missed by her mother, sister, Pamela E. Murphy, brother, Benjamin F. Murphy III, sister-in-law, Betty Murphy and nephew, Dr. Damani B. Johnson.
