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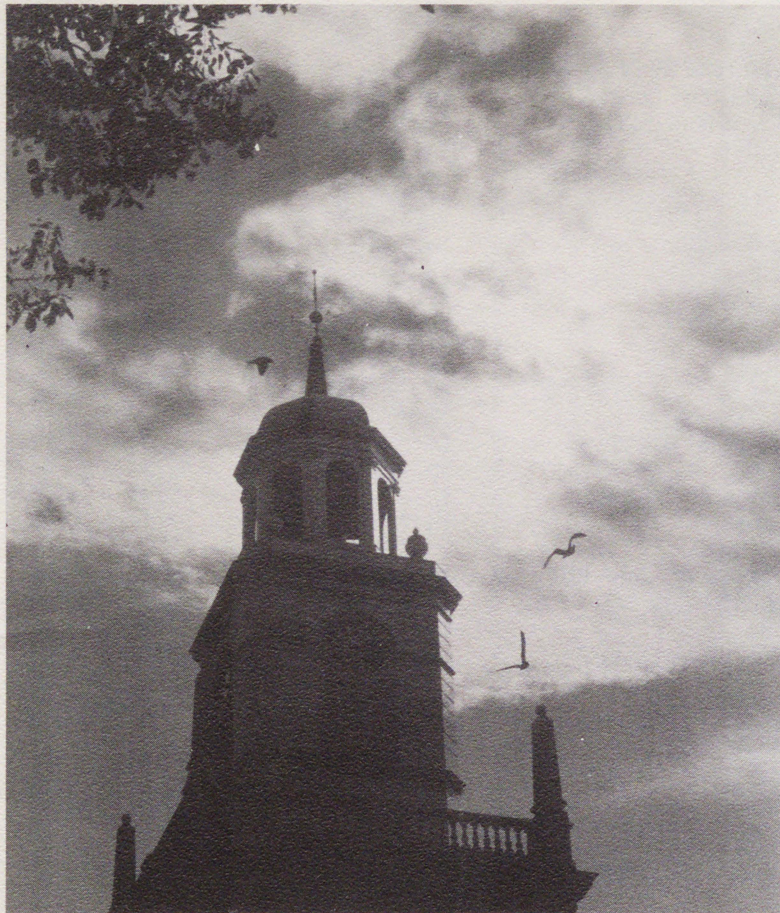

CURRICULUM WORKSHOP IN POWER TECHNOLOGY

June 29 – August 7

A study of the principles of operation, design, and function of power systems employing various types of heat engines; mechanism involved in the generation, transmission, and control of power. Students will develop laboratory equipment, and a course of study adaptable to grades 7-12. Professor Terrence Trudeau will be in charge of this workshop. Six semester hours of graduate credit may be earned in I.A. 590. Enrollment will be limited to six graduate students.

WORKSHOP IN GUIDANCE

July 20 – August 7

This workshop is designed for teachers, administrative supervisory personnel and counselors. The workshop can be regarded as an introductory course for those who have not had previous graduate work in the field of guidance, but will have real significance for those already in the field of guidance in secondary and elementary education. Dr. Harry Smallenburg, Director, Division of Research and Guidance, County of Los Angeles, California, will direct the workshop. Three semester hours of graduate credit will be given for the course.

WORKSHOP IN READING IN THE SECONDARY SCHOOL

June 29 – July 17

This workshop will provide an opportunity for the students to gain an understanding of the reading process, the role of reading in every area of learning, the various aspects of an effective reading program, the skills in reading that are needed in all areas of learning, ways of evaluating and analyzing student's progress in reading, and becoming acquainted with reading materials. This workshop is designed for teachers, administrative and supervisory personnel.

Dr. Marjory F. Brown will direct the workshop. Three semester hours of graduate credit will be given for the course.

WORKSHOP IN CURRICULUM PLANNING IN HOME ECONOMICS

June 29 – July 17

Home Economics teachers registering in this workshop will be recruited by the Bureau of Home Economics Education and their tuition and fees will be reimbursed by the State Education Department. Registration will be limited to the first ten qualified teachers who apply. Applications must be received by Dr. Margaret Grant, Director of Home Economics, State University College, 1300 Elmwood Avenue, Buffalo, New York 14222 by May 1, 1964. Dr. Helen Cawley, Professor of Home Economics, at the College will direct the workshop.

WORKSHOP IN STUDIES IN HUMAN GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

August 10-21

This workshop is planned to inform students of the most recent developments in Growth and Development, and to challenge students to implement changes as a result of these developments. Dr. Harris for years has engaged in research in this area, and his week as consultant to this workshop should prove most exciting. Elementary teachers, secondary teachers, and college instructors will find workshop activities and discussions stimulating and informative.

WORKSHOP IN PROGRAMMED LEARNING

August 10-21

The theory and methodology of this newer dimension to effective instruction will be explored in this workshop. Participants will find Dr. Bilsky's approach practical, as he guides them to a discovery of both strengths and weaknesses of programmed instructional materials.

WORKSHOP IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

June 29 – July 17

Planned for administrators and soon-to-be administrators, this workshop will be directed so that theory is soon put in proper perspective, and participants can wrestle with practical problems. An attempt will be made to share ideas that will aid administrators in more effectively and efficiently fulfilling their many roles.

NEW ENGLAND STUDYTOUR

August 10-21

The sixth Literary Studytour of New England is being organized as a Post-Session graduate and undergraduate course by Dr. Benjamin Gronewold, Professor of English. The Studytour group will leave from Buffalo for Boston, Massachusetts by air on Monday, August 10, and will return by air on Friday, August 21. Registration is limited to 25. The cost is approximately \$155 plus tuition and fees. Applications are available in the Summer Session Office.

CONSERVATION WORKSHOP

August 10-21

Dr. George A. Laug and Dr. Theodore Eckert are planning the second conservation workshop for teachers and administrators during the Post Session. Two hours of graduate or undergraduate credit may be earned. The group will enjoy excellent facilities during the two-week period at our College Camp at Franklinville, New York. Field trips will be an integral part of the instructional program. The cost will be approximately \$100 including room, board, tuition and fees. The group will not exceed 35 persons. Applications are available in the Summer Session Office.

SPECIAL LANGUAGE DISORDERS INSTITUTES

The College is sponsoring three 2 week workshops for professionals from the fields of speech pathology and audiology, psychology, psychiatry, medicine, rehabilitation and special education during the summer session. DEVELOPMENTAL LANGUAGE DISORDERS INSTITUTE June 29 – July 10 with Betty Gallagher, Ph.D., Professor of Speech Pathology and Audiology State University College at Buffalo and many outstanding authorities in the United States serving as consultants. SEMINAR IN STUTTERING July 13 – 24 with Oliver Bloodstein, Ph.D., Assoc. Professor of Speech, Brooklyn College, and SEMINAR IN VOICE DISORDERS July 27 – August 7 with G. Paul Moore, Ph.D., Past President American Speech and Hearing Association and Chairman, Department of Speech, University of Florida. Each two week workshop will offer two sem. hrs. of graduate credit. Further information may be obtained from Dr. Horace Mann, Director of Exceptional Children Education Division at the State University College at Buffalo.

SUMMER CAMPUS SCHOOL PROGRAM – Experience – Expansion – Exploration

The program has been planned to enable children to have exciting adventures in learning from pre-school through Junior High School. The Campus School will be an observation center for summer school students and will be open to teachers, administrators and citizens of the community.

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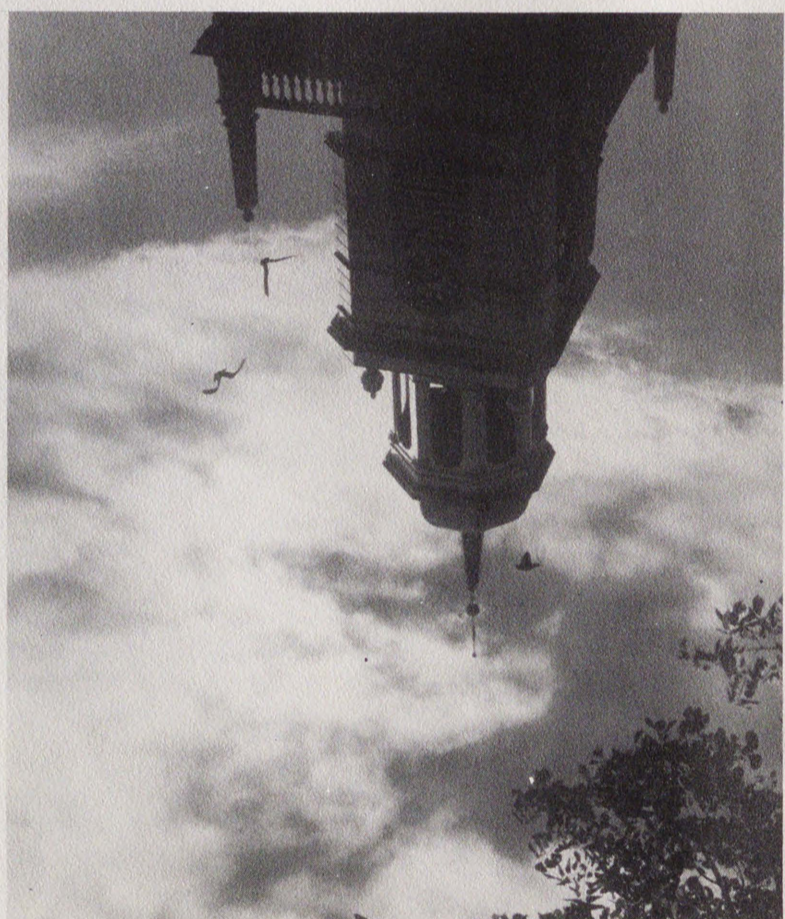
