



Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in e Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to evin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's los of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent lanue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. It is over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt in ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends thin the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness"
