

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.
Two story frame house with Craftsman styling. Gable roof with wide eaves and oversized brackets. Large gabled dormer with three three-light over single-pane windows on front facade. Entranceway with bracketed overdoor on south side of house. Enclosed porch across front of house has a gable roof. Eight SIGNIFICANCE four light over single pane windows in porch. Boxed 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1919 paneled columns and paneled
ARCHITECT: balustrade in porch. Stone foundation.
BUILDER:
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical example of a frame house with Craftsman styling. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
